

Outcomes:

1. Understanding of how to conduct an introductory archery class using a variety of equipment.

Recreational Archery Academy



What is it?

Archery Academy is an educational program that includes basic archery instruction and an understanding of how to implement existing beginning and intermediate archery and bowhunting programs.

Who is it for?

This program is for recreation program leaders and staff; parks and outdoor education staff and activity leaders; school teachers and instructional staff; nonprofit group leaders (YMCA, Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H etc.). Emphasis should be placed on groups that typically handle community recreation.

What are the goals?

1. To provide the attendees with the skills and training in all types and forms of archery and bowhunting
2. To provide guidance on how attendees can teach and/or offer all levels of archery programs from the first introduction to more advanced games.
3. To understand how to develop and utilize appropriate facilities in their communities.

What are the learning outcomes?

1. Equipment: Ability to teach basic archery classes utilizing three types of equipment; recurve, compound and crossbow.
2. Archery 101: How to fit beginning archery classes into current recreational programming.
3. Junior Olympic Archery Development Program:
 - a. Develop a year round program for recreation and/or competition.
 - b. How to use JOAD award system for teaching archery skills.
 - c. How to form and manage a JOAD club.
 - d. Understand competition formats and where to find clubs with which to compete (like a traveling team)
 - e. How to communicate with other instructors; locally, regionally and nationally.
 - f. How to acquire program materials and equipment.
4. After School Archery Program:
 - a. How to develop an 8 or 16 session program.
 - b. How to use award systems for teaching archery skills and learning different shooting games.
 - c. How to acquire program materials and equipment.

5. Explore Bowhunting:
 - a. How to develop an after-school, weekend or summer camp using just Explore Bowhunting.
 - b. How to utilize Explore Bowhunting as a part of other education programs.
 - c. How to acquire program materials and equipment.
6. League development/competition formats and scoring
 - a. How to develop an indoor league.
 - b. How to develop various outdoor leagues.
7. Working with local retailers
 - a. Where to find local retailers.
 - b. Understanding what different retailers can/will offer to assist with programs.
 - c. Understand how to approach retailers for assistance.
8. Range development
 - a. Understand facility design options suitable for any park size and budget.
 - b. Understand funding options available.
9. Where to find additional resources
 - a. What are the major state and/or national archery and bowhunting groups.
 - b. Where to find contractual instructors.
 - c. Where to find assistance in designing ranges.
