

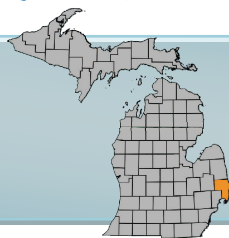
# Michigan Areas of Concern

## Project Highlight: St. Clair River



Marysville Living Shoreline Project | Nov. 2012-June 2013

**Project Type:** Restoration  
**Location:** St. Clair County



**GLRI Funds:** \$1.5 Million  
**Local Match:** \$300,000

### Project at a Glance

In the winter of 2012, the City of Marysville completed a “living shoreline” project on the banks of the St. Clair River. These types of projects involve habitat restoration, establishing native plant

life and structures that resist erosion, but function like natural shoreline.

To accomplish this, the city replaced a failing vertical seawall on the St. Clair River with a reinforced rocky shoreline and an improved walkway and boardwalk. The rocky shores provide spawning and nursery habitat for Great Lakes fish, while wetland and upland prairie vegetation planted this year will benefit birds and other wildlife.

A total of 1,885 feet of steel seawall was removed, creating a more naturalized shoreline. Additional plantings in spring 2013 will create a transitional area between the deep waters of the St. Clair River and the wetland and upland areas along the shore.

### Local Perspective

*“This project has proven beneficial to both the City of Marysville and the Great Lakes Basin as a whole. Without GLRI funding, our hazardous, failing seawall along the St. Clair River would not have been replaced nor would a ‘living shoreline’ have been established. The project enabled us to build more than 400 feet of elevated boardwalk plus create a more natural shoreline conducive for the re-establishment of aquatic plant life and fish habitat.”*
