REMINDERS

- NEVER buy a second-hand seat from a garage sale or resale store there is no way to know the seat's history or tell if it has been in a crash.
- Expired seats, seats involved in a crash, or damaged seat should not be reused.
- Crashed and expired seats should be labeled as such (silver sharpies work great), destroyed and discarded.
