

MICHIGAN PROFESSIONAL SURVEYORS LICENSING GUIDE

ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSING

- Complete a degree in professional surveying or a related degree with professional surveying courses. The following requirements must be satisfied:
 - Mathematics – 12 semester/18 quarter hours
 - Humanities and communication – 10 semester/15 quarter hours
 - Law and business – 10 semester /15 quarter hours
 - Further development – 6 semester/9 quarter hours
 - Basic science – 18 semester/27 quarter hours
 - Engineering science – 8 semester/12 quarter hours
 - Engineering – 13 semester/20 quarter hours
 - Surveying – 30 semester/45 quarter hours
- Pass the Fundamentals of Surveying examination (FS)/Part I administered through the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES). The cost of the examination is \$225. For additional information, please visit www.ncees.org.
- Pass the Principles and Practice of Surveying (PS)/Part IIA examination administered through the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES). The cost of the examination is \$350.
- Pass the Principles and Practice of Surveying (PS)/Part IIB examination administered through PSI Services, LLC (PSI). The cost of the examination is \$96. For additional information, please visit www.psiexams.com.
- Complete four (4) years of experience if bachelor's degree is possessed or three (3) years of experience if a graduate degree in surveying is held.
 - Experience must be verified by the applicant's employers or supervisors.
- Submit an online application at www.michigan.gov/mylicense.
 - Applicants must be of good moral character. The fee due at the time of application is \$85.

*Records unavailable from a foreign country in relation to education or experience shall be allowed upon submitting the following to the department:

(a) A notarized affidavit approved stating the total number of years of education received, the name of the school or schools attended, the dates each school was attended, the degree obtained, the courses taken, the grades received, and the names of each former employer.

(b) A notarized statement approved from a governmental official testifying to the unavailability of the necessary records.
