Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity Michigan Rehabilitation Services PA 166 of 2020, Sec 1083(2)

Michigan Rehabilitation Services (MRS) served **19 individuals** through the MRS Farm Rehab Program. The program assisted agricultural workers with disabilities in acquiring or maintaining quality employment and independence. MRS utilized the \$50,000 in state appropriated funds to secure an additional **\$184,742** in federal matching funds to support the provision of vocational rehabilitation services to eligible agricultural workers with disabilities.

Funding was used for:

- Farm rehabilitation engineering services that included but were not limited to evaluations
 to identify the individualized assistive technology or accommodations needed by the
 worker to perform their work duties. These services included follow up to ensure the
 worker integrated and safely used the implemented accommodations into their work
 routine, the overall effectiveness of the implemented accommodations, and that no other
 accommodation needs were present.
- 2. Supporting workers with medical restoration needs and acquiring devices to assist them in improving communication with employees and customers, for example, hearing aids.
- 3. Identifying, acquiring, and implementing accommodations or assistive technologies to assist workers with mobility or lower extremity functional limitations. Some examples of implemented assistive technologies and accommodations include outdoor mobility carts, wheelchair seat elevators, man lifts, footrest, mini skid steers, ATV feeder, rolling sit/stand stool, modified tractor steps, handrails on equipment, power lift steps, back support spring, drive through gates, safety ladders, gooseneck dump trailer, custom ramps, and livestock handling systems.
- 4. Identifying, acquiring, and implementing accommodations or assistive technologies to assist workers experiencing upper extremity functional limitations. Some examples of implemented assistive technologies and accommodations include rearview camera systems, tire changing machine, swivel tractor seats, power wheelbarrows, rearview mirrors, egg cooler, power gate openers, wagon hitch kits, customized summit trellis system, electric powered pruners, and hay handling systems.
- 5. Assistance was also provided to a farmer with a visual impairment with the assistive technology of an automatic tractor guidance system needed for operating a tractor.
