#### MEETING MINUTES May 12, 2021

#### PRESENT:

#### **CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL**

Chairperson Montri called the meeting of the Commission of Agriculture and Rural Development to order at 9:00 a.m. on May 12, 2021, noting today's meeting is being conducted electronically to protect the health of Commission members, staff, and the public due to the Coronavirus by limiting the number of people at public gatherings.

Commissioner Boring called the roll with the following Commissioners present: Commissioner Bergdahl in Skandia, Michigan; Commissioner Boring in Stockbridge, Michigan; Commissioner Meintz in Stephenson, Michigan; and Commissioner Montri in Bath, Michigan. Director McDowell, in Rudyard, Michigan, was also present.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION: COMMISSIONER MEINTZ MOVED TO APPROVE THE MEETING AGENDA FOR MAY 12, 2021. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER BERGDAHL. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

#### **APPROVAL OF MARCH 10, 2021, MEETING MINUTES**

MOTION: COMMISSIONER MEINTZ MOVED TO APPROVE THE MARCH 10, 2021, MEETING MINUTES. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER BORING. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

#### **NEXT SCHEDULED MEETING**

The next scheduled meeting is July 21, 2021. Commissioner Montri noted a face-to-face socially distanced meeting and outdoor tour for the Commissioners are being planned.

#### **COMMISSIONER COMMENTS**

Commissioners shared information relative to their farm operations and agriculture in their respective areas. Concerns were expressed around the escalated lack of available labor, increased cost of inputs due to high corn and soybean prices, dry weather conditions in the Lower Peninsula, continuing supply chain issues, lack of access to broadband in rural communities, and increased volatility for Michigan's 2021 agriculture season. Commissioner Montri expressed appreciation for the Implicit Bias Training being made available to the Commissioners.

#### **COMMISSIONER ISSUES**

Commissioner Montri introduced resolutions honoring Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) retirees Vijaya Pandit, a 25-year employee with the State of Michigan (SOM), David Pasutti, a 23-year SOM employee, and Vicki Chickering, a 30-year SOM employee. She acknowledged their tremendous contributions to the department.

MOTION: COMMISSIONER BERGDAHL MOVED THE RESOLUTIONS HONORING VIJAYA PANDIT, DAVID PASUTTI, AND VICKI CHICKERING BE ADOPTED WITH BEST WISHES FOR THEIR LONG AND HEALTHY RETIREMENT. COMMISSIONER MEINTZ SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

#### **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Director McDowell announced Ashley Steffen began April 5 as the department's new Legislative Liaison and shared details around her background. Ms. Steffen will join the meeting later today.

The Director shared details relative to the Michigan Propane Commission, UK Consul General and commodity organizations meeting, Governor Whitmer's recent meeting with farmers, Regional Conservation Partnership Program grants, and Making it in Michigan Agriculture Summit. He also provided a SOM return to work update.

Commissioner Montri noted she hopes efforts are ongoing to replace the Commission's fifth member. The Director acknowledged that need.

#### PUBLIC COMMENT (AGENDA ITEMS ONLY)

There was no public comment relative to agenda items.

#### FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INVESTMENT FUND REQUEST: Jamie Zmitko-Somers, **Division Director, Agriculture Development Division**

Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised four projects are being presented for Commission approval today. The first project today is Carbon Green BioEnergy LLC, which is looking to diversify their production due to growing demand. She introduced company official Gabe Corey, who shared details of the \$5,265,000 project, including its impact on Michigan agriculture. He also answered several questions from the Commissioners, including how they will continue to be a large volume processor of Michigan corn. Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised MDARD staff recommend the Commission approve a Food and Agriculture Investment Program performance-based grant of \$85,000 for Carbon Green BioEnergy LLC.

MOTION: COMMISSIONER MEINTZ MOVED TO APPROVE A FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INVESTMENT FUND PERFORMANCE-BASED GRANT OF \$85,000 FOR THE CARBON GREEN BIOENERGY LLC PROJECT AS PRESENTED. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER BORING. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

Ms. Zmitko-Somers noted the second project today is Cultured Ferments Company LLC, which is purchasing equipment for a new product line to meet customer demand. She introduced company official Cortney Lorenz, who shared details of the \$110,061 project, including impact on agriculture in Michigan. She also answered questions from the Commissioners, including review of their current and potential future markets. Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised MDARD staff recommend the Commission approve a Food and Agriculture Investment Program performance-based grant of \$10,000 for Cultured Ferments Company LLC.

MOTION: COMMISSIONER BORING MOVED TO APPROVE A FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INVESTMENT FUND PERFORMANCE-BASED GRANT OF \$10,000 FOR THE CULTURED FERMENTS COMPANY LLC PROJECT AS PRESENTED. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER MEINTZ. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised the third project is Coulter Farm Properties LLC, which is building controlled atmosphere rooms for apple and asparagus storage, as well as space for multiple commodity packing and storage. She introduced company official, Caleb Coulter, who shared details of the \$4,580,000 project, including its impact on Michigan's agriculture industry. He also answered questions from the Commissioners, including how it will help reduce food waste. Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised MDARD staff recommend the Commission approve a Food and Agriculture Investment Program performance-based grant of \$75,000 for Coulter Farm Properties LLC.

MOTION: COMMISSIONER BERGDAHL MOVED TO APPROVE A FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INVESTMENT FUND PERFORMANCE-BASED GRANT OF \$75,000 FOR THE COULTER FARM PROPERTIES LLC PROJECT AS PRESENTED. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER MEINTZ. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

The final project today is Ackroyd's Scottish Bakery, which is relocating into a larger facility and expanding their production to meet product demand. She introduced their president, Megan Ackroyd, who shared details around the \$1,200,000 project, including its impact on agriculture in Michigan. She also answered questions from the Commissioners, including details of their diversity efforts. Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised MDARD staff recommend the Commission approve a Food and Agriculture Investment Program performance-based grant of \$50,000 for Ackroyd's Scottish Bakery.

MOTION: COMMISSIONER MEINTZ MOVED TO APPROVE A FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INVESTMENT FUND PERFORMANCE-BASED GRANT OF \$50,000 FOR THE ACKROYD'S SCOTTISH BAKERY PROJECT AS PRESENTED. SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER BERGDAHL. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

Ms. Zmitko-Somers advised July will be the last month to bring projects forward for the current fiscal year.

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#### **BUDGET UPDATE: Sylvia Renteria, Director of Finance and Budget**

Ms. Renteria discussed details around development of the FY (fiscal year) 2022 budget, noting differences between the Executive and House and Senate Subcommittee recommendations. Major discrepancies include the House version recommending only quarterly allotments of the department's budget, and the Senate greatly reducing FTEs. Both subcommittee versions contain deviations for MDARD from the Executive recommended budget.

Next steps include the May 21 Revenue Estimating Conference, general fund target establishment by both chambers, and the Conference Committee hearing to resolve differences in the budget recommendations. She also reviewed several current pending FY 2021 supplemental and transfer requests. The department will continue to work with the Legislature and the Administration to develop a fiscally responsible budget for the department.

#### STATE OF MICHIGAN DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION INITIATIVE: Poppy Sias Hernandez, Equity and Inclusion Officer, State of Michigan - Office of Governor Gretchen Whitmer

Ms. Hernandez provided an overview of the State of Michigan Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) initiative. This collaborative structure is focusing on how to improve DEI efforts statewide. Various components around this year's strategic plan were reviewed, the overall goal of which is to operationalize equity and inclusion across the state. Through training, coaching, and mentoring, leadership within all departments will be developed to improve impact of DEI efforts. Initiative updates will be provided each quarter and MDARD's Equity and Inclusion Officer (EIO) will share those with the Commissioners.

In response to Commissioners' questions, Ms. Hernandez clarified strategies around hard to reach populations and appointment of EIOs within state departments. Commissioner Montri noted the various questions demonstrate why this is a priority across the state, and thanked MDARD EIO Ashley Batteen and all department staff who engage in DEI efforts. She invited Mss. Hernandez and Batteen to review the Commission Policy Manual to assist in building DEI context into those policies.

The Director thanked Ms. Hernandez for her efforts in assisting the department in ensuring a clear, consistent message to its employees. He reinforced that this was a bedrock issue for the department.

#### SPOTTED LANTERNFLY UPDATE: Rob Miller, Invasive Species Prevention and Response Specialist, and Robin Rosenbaum, Plant Health Section Manager, Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division

Ms. Rosenbaum reported spotted lanternfly is likely to be the next invasive pest to arrive in Michigan. Mr. Miller reviewed specifics of the potentially significant threat from the spotted lanternfly and its impacts to agriculture and the public. Because the pest is difficult to eradicate, particularly in vineyards, it could have a significant impact on the state's grape industry. Spotted lanternfly can inadvertently be moved long distances on goods or conveyances and there is no way to prevent arrival of the pest in Michigan. He also shared details of MDARD's preparation through the inter-agency Michigan Spotted Lanternfly Readiness Team established in December 2019. Early detection and

response will be critical in managing the pest. MDARD and its partners will strive to eradicate initial introductions of the species through extensive delimitation survey, targeted broadcast application of insecticide, and creation of trap trees.

In response to questions from Commissioners, Mr. Miller advised the pest lays egg masses on most anything and may have arrived in the United States on shipments of stone from Asia. Thus far, grape is the only crop in which significant damage has been recorded; however, its unknown how spotted lanternfly will impact Michigan's specialty crops. The Commission requested future updates be shared with them as the situation progresses.

#### **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: Ashley Steffen, Legislative Liaison**

Ms. Steffen referred to the MDARD Legislative Update provided to the Commissioners and reviewed activities and current status around bills of interest to the department. She noted specifics of bills related to horse racing, industrial hemp, food licensing and registration fees, federal Restaurant Revitalization Fund, timelines for reporting of deaths and serious injuries on family farms, and allowing commodity group meetings to be held remotely. MDARD has been very busy working with the legislators and other affected agencies involved in the various bills introduced.

In response to question from Commissioner Meintz, Ms. Steffen advised the bills specific to horse racing are an attempt to revive the industry in Michigan.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

No public comment on non-agenda items was requested.

#### **ADJOURN**

MOTION: COMMISSIONER MEINTZ MOVED TO ADJOURN THE MEETING. COMMISSIONER BORING SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED BY ROLL CALL VOTE.

#### **Welcome New Commissioner**

I'm pleased to welcome Andy Chae who was recently appointed by Governor Whitmer as our newest Ag Commissioner. Andy is the owner of Fisheye Farms in Detroit where they produce diverse specialty crops such as melscun mixes, eggplant, cabbage and tomatoes. These products are then sold to multiple farmers markets, restaurants, and CSA programs. Welcome Andy!

#### Senator Tom Casperson Dedication Ceremony

On June 4, Director McDowell had the pleasure of joining family, friends, and local leaders in a dedication ceremony naming the Escanaba River Bridge after Senator Tom Casperson. It was a great turnout and a wonderful tribute for a man who cared deeply about Michigan agriculture and natural resources.

#### **MASDA Meeting**

On June 22-23, Director McDowell <u>virtually</u> participated in MASDA's summer meeting which was held in Lincoln, Nebraska. Topics of discussion included workforce and housing shortages, meat processing, weather related concerns, water quality funding, and food security. Attendees expressed appreciation for MDARD hosting monthly Midwest Ag Director meetings.

#### Neil Jones (Laboratory Division)

Last month, Neil Jones from our Laboratory Division reached a milestone in his career -- 50 years with the department! Congratulations Neil and the outstanding work he does every day.

#### Josh Neyhart Departure

Josh's last day with MDARD was June 25. He decided to pursue opportunities back home in Pennsylvania. The department is in the process of reviewing the Environmental Policy position and its duties. Posting should be done soon.

#### MDARD's 100th Anniversary

The law creating the Michigan Department of Agriculture, P.A. 13 of 1921, took effect on July 1, 1921. Beginning July 1, 2021, MDARD launched a year-long celebration of the department, its employees and programs, and Michigan's food and agriculture industry. Many activities are being planned including commemorative events, social media features, podcasts and more, and will continue through June 30, 2022. We've also created a special 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary logo that will be used by staff and on social platforms.

Governor Whitmer also signed a proclamation declaring the next 12 months as the "100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development." Happy Anniversary to us!

#### **Peterson Research Station**

The grand opening celebration and tour of the Peterson Research Station will be held on August 5 in Hart. This facility has been in the making for a few years and will be a welcomed opportunity for our food and ag processing on the west side of the state. I'm looking forward to touring this state-of-the-art facility.

#### **Return to Work Update**

In mid-June, MIOSHA issued the latest workplace guidelines. While MDARD had anticipated phasing staff back into the office on July 12, there are still many unknowns regarding our office work spaces that need to be resolved in conjunction with DTMB. To that extent, we will continue to have staff work remote until Tuesday, September 7. In the interim, we will use this time to better understand workplace requirements and prepare for a safe return.

#### **MAEAP Reauthorization**

Discussions continue to occur with staff, stakeholders, legislators, and the Governor's Office on improvements to the MAEAP program. Reauthorization is critical to ensure our efforts on water quality and monitoring are realized.

#### **Migrant Worker Rule Update**

Thanks to the successful and ongoing efforts to reduce COVID cases, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services rescinded the testing order for food and ag workers on July 1, thereby lessening the regulatory burden on our food producers and processors.

The Emergency Migrant Labor Housing Rules issued by MDARD remain in effect for the duration of the six-month term from date of issuance, expiring later this fall. These Migrant Housing Emergency Rules, in conjunction with MIOSHA's workplace emergency rules, help safeguard the health of this vital workforce. Keeping the established response plan requirements for this growing season provides our growers and processors guidance should a positive employee be identified.

MDARD and MDHHS continue to strongly encourage and advocate for our food and ag workforce to get the safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine. It is readily available across the state.

Recruitment, Professional Development, and Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Officer

Ashley Batteen has been selected as MDARD's Recruitment, Professional Development, and Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Officer. Ashley had been working in an unclassified role as the department's Recruitment & Professional Development Specialist for the past 18 months, and more recently as the Equity & Inclusion Officer. Through this effort she demonstrated that our department needs these three roles on a permanent basis. This is a big step for the future of MDARD. It also demonstrates MDARD's long term commitment to recruitment, professional development, and DEI. There have been many notable retirements and departures recently making this position even more key.

#### MDARD response to flooding (week of June 21 and 28)

Climate change is leading to more and more severe weather events, which makes things harder for agriculture and our farmers. Michigan fruit, as well as our asparagus crop, have had a few rough years with frigid temperatures, spring frosts, historic rainfalls, recent tornadoes, devastating flooding, and other weather events.

In late June, Michigan experienced significant rainfall/flash floods in certain parts of the state; resulting in Governor Whitmer declaring a state of emergency in Wayne County due to severe flooding. On July 1, the Governor sent a letter to USDA Secretary Vilsack urging him to expedite Michigan's disaster declaration request process. While final evaluation on possible damage in different areas of the state won't be known until farmers are done with harvest, this letter is an important first step in getting the process started.

A USDA Secretarial Disaster Designation makes farm operators eligible to be considered for certain types of federal assistance from the Farm Service Agency (FSA), including emergency loans and the Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus (WHIP+). Producers are encouraged to contact their local USDA-FSA office for additional information.

#### Office of Rural Development Update

The FY22 budget as passed by the House on June 24 did <u>not</u> include the Office of Rural Development. As for next steps, there still needs to be consensus with the Senate. MDARD continues to advocate for position.

#### **Horse Racing Advisory Commission**

The first organizational meeting of the Horse Racing Advisory Commission was held on June 30. The group will meet again on August 24. Joseph Rivet will be coordinating MDARD's efforts on this front.

Program

#### **Background**

Father and son duo, Ed and Chris Girrbach started making potato chips under the Great Lakes Potato Chips label in 2010. The company has experienced 20 percent year over year growth while sourcing almost 100 percent from Michigan potato growers. Great Lakes Potato Chips was named one of the top 50 Michigan companies to watch in 2014 and was voted the number one Kettle Chip in the country by the Chicago Tribune newspaper in 2015. Their growth protectory continues as they look to construct a new processing facility to meet the demand for their product.

#### **Project Description**

An investment of \$2,248,326 to construct a new processing and warehouse facility on three acres in Chums Village Industrial Park will allow the company to continue to service the rapidly growing demand for product both inside and outside of the Great Lakes Region. Five new positions will be created with this project.

#### Impact on Michigan's Agriculture Industry

The company's growth will greatly increase the need for Michigan grown potatoes and they will have the ability to increase distribution of product from seven to fourteen states in the next five years. Currently, the company is sourcing seven million pounds of Michigan potatoes annually. This expansion will allow capacity to double, with an estimated 10 million pounds of potatoes being made into kettle chips in 2021. Great Lakes Potato Chip's produces a line of kettle cooked potato chips in five packaging sizes (1 oz., 1.5 oz., 8 oz., 16 oz., 22 oz.) They also co-pack for several independent labels. Distribution in the U.S. and Canada through a network of Brokers and Distribution Companies includes Gordon Food Service, U.S. Foods, and Sysco. Major customers include Costco, Sam's Clubs, Meijer, Kroger, Spartan Foods, Jewel Osco, and hundreds of smaller independent grocers and delis.

#### **Additional Impacts**

The Traverse City community has a built a strong culture around food and agriculture and this project connects to the high value products the community supports and for which it is recognized. The company will be moving from an old non-energy efficient plant to a new, modern energy efficient facility with the most up-to-date lighting and insulation. The company offers health benefits, including dental, as well as life insurance, profit sharing, and a bonus program. They provide on-the-job training and competency specific training as needed. They develop and


promote from within the company. Additionally, they work with the local MIWorks office to hire workers who are currently unemployed or underemployed whenever possible.

#### **MDARD Staff Recommendation**

Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development staff recommend the Michigan Commission of Agriculture and Rural Development approve a Food and Agriculture Investment Fund performance-based grant of \$80,000 for EDSPROP LLC (Great Lakes Potato Chips).


