

The migrant travel team is dedicated staff that is willing to give up their MI summer evenings, to work late hours two days a week. The team visits over sixty-five migrant camps in a six month period. We thank our home sites and employee families for allowing us to "Change Lives Because We Care".

The average time patients get seen at camps is between 5:00 pm - 11:00 pm once they complete their work day. Season starts April and ends last week in October.

The majority of MI agricultural workers don't speak English(Haitian-Creole/Spanish).
