Strategic collaborations offer powerful opportunities for developing community-healtheducational partnerships that can balance the educational requirements for standardsbased science curricula with responsiveness to community needs. This was demonstrated on a cold December day when two hundred 6th graders from six Flint Community Schools gathered to share the results of their community action projects with their peers, family members and community at the Riverfront Banquet Center in downtown Flint. The students have studied Type 2 diabetes in science class as part of a new, technology-rich curriculum aligned with the Next Generation Science Standards called, "Health in Our Hands: What Controls My Health?" Through project-based learning, students discovered how genetic risk factors and environmental factors, such as poor diet or lack of exercise, put them at risk for disease. For their final projects, students conducted a community action project to improve their school or neighborhood to help prevent or reduce diabetes. Students worked collaboratively to answer the question, "How can we work together to make our community healthier?"
