Now Available: Webinar Recording How to Maximize the Exhibit A Grains Tool!

On June 11, 2020, Team Nutrition held a webinar to demonstrate the latest enhancements to the Exhibit A **Grains Tool.**

The Exhibit A Grains Tool allows you to search for your grain product as listed on Exhibit A and enter in the serving size from the product label. The tool helps you determine: 1) ounce equivalent (oz. eq) grains or grains/bread serving(s) for the grain product, 2) amount to serve to provide your desired grains contribution, and 3) with the new update, the amount to serve for a grain product in order to meet the minimum grains requirement by age/grade groups for specific child nutrition programs. This webinar provides a demonstration and in-depth practice for using the grains tool on the Food Buying Guide for Child Nutrition **Programs (FBG) Interactive Web-Based Tool. Participants** will also experience the Exhibit A Grains Tool on the Mobile App, which allows program operators to determine the grains contribution and the amount to serve on-the-go.

FDA UPDATES ON HAND SANITIZERS WITH METHANOL

- Methanol is an unacceptable ingredient for hand sanitizers and must not be used due to its toxic effects.
- FDA's investigation of methanol in certain hand sanitizers is ongoing and the agency will provide additional information as is becomes available.
- FDA updated the original list of more than 24 hand sanitizer products to avoid. It now has listed 75 such products to avoid.

Income Guidelines for National Free and Reduced Priced Meals for Schools and the Child and Adult Care Food Program are announced.

The Michigan Department of Education has announced the household income guidelines established by the United States Department of Agriculture for free and reduced-price meals and free milk through the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk, and Child and Adult Care Food Programs. The income guidelines are effective from July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021.

Families should contact their school, school district, childcare center, or family day care home sponsor to find out whether it participates in these programs.

Schools, childcare centers, adult day care centers, and family day care home sponsors will provide a form for applying for free or reduced-price meals. Only one application is required per household.

Adults, children, or foster children who are recipients of various programs such as Michigan's Family Independence Program, Food Assistance Program, or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, or who are enrolled in Head Start, an At-Risk afterschool center, or an emergency shelter automatically qualify for free meals. Households with incomes less than or equal to the following guidelines qualify for free or reduced-price meals or free milk.
