Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) In Michigan

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program is a federal program that works to improve the health of low-income elderly people at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA Foods. It provides food and administrative funds to 22 agencies in Michigan to supplement the diets of these groups. The USDA allocates each state's caseload based on available funds.
