ESSA Puts Heavy Emphasis on Stakeholder Input

First Round of Stakeholder Feedback Open NOW

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) promises to dramatically change federal and state education landscapes. The Michigan Department of Education has the opportunity for additional flexibility under ESSA. But first we must establish our state's strategic vision and evaluate how the new law will affect our accountability, funding, school improvement, and grant-making systems.

ESSA also requires states to design these new systems with input from dozens of stakeholder groups, ranging from teachers to parents to community organizations. MDE's internal and external teams are carefully planning Michigan's approach to ensure that this input is meaningful. We are working with <u>over 100 stakeholder groups</u> in education, business, and civic circles to gather broad stakeholder input, in order to ensure that MDE staff get the information necessary to design the best systems for our students. Action Team Early Concepts are Ready for Review

Michigan's ESSA Action Teams have been meeting since June, discussing the "big ideas" and concepts related to each team's goals. Team leaders have put forward their teams' initial key ideas for initial discussion and review. This presents the first opportunity for stakeholders to provide feedback that will guide the next round of work moving forward.

Based on the work of each Action Team, the MDE has posted a survey on the <u>Michigan ESSA website</u>. Stakeholders from every sector can review the work to date and contribute feedback through that survey, which will be open through August 16.

The MDE will share the survey through its communications channels and website. We will also send targeted invitations to all external and internal advisory teams, virtual focus group volunteers, and ESSA Notes readers.
