

## Getting started

To use all of the Great Start to Quality search features, you may want to think about the following items in advance:

1. There are three types of licensed and registered child care and preschool, choose the one that best fits the needs of your family:
  - a. Child Care and Preschool Centers – Usually multiple rooms or classrooms, this category includes child care, preschool, nursery school, Head Start and Great Start Readiness Programs.
  - b. Family Child Care Homes – A home where early learning and care is provided for up to 6 children.
  - c. Group Child Care Homes – A home where early learning and care is provided for up to 12 children.
2. What time do you need child care or preschool?
3. How much can you afford to spend per week?
4. If you receive child care payment help from the state, does the provider or program accept those payments?
5. Do you need transportation? (Some child care or preschool facilities provide pick-up and drop-off. Others will transport school-age children to or from school.)
6. Are you looking for a provider or program that's close to home, work or another family member?

**PLEASE REMEMBER:** To find the very best child care or preschool, you should visit more than one program with your child if possible. These steps can help you make a good choice:

>> Ask about important concerns such as policies on visitors, discipline, activities, training and safety.

>> Check references, review licensing reports, check the Star rating at [www.GreatStartToQuality.org](http://www.GreatStartToQuality.org) and ask other parents.

>> Make a decision that is best for your child and commit to being involved.

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## What is Great Start to Quality?

Great Start to Quality is Michigan's tiered quality rating and improvement system that makes it easy for you to identify quality child care and preschools, helping you get the best for your child and the most for your money.

## Why does quality matter?

Children start learning from day 1 – long before kindergarten – so quality child care and preschool programs can help them succeed in school, work and life.

## What can Great Start to Quality do for you?

Great Start to Quality makes it easy for you to identify quality child care and preschools, helping you get the best for your child and the most for your money. The easy-to-use website, [www.GreatStartToQuality.org](http://www.GreatStartToQuality.org), helps you find and compare early childhood programs and providers, by rating child care and preschool providers on a scale of one-to-five stars based on state quality standards for care, safety, professionalism and early learning.

## Finding child care is easy

[www.GreatStartToQuality.org](http://www.GreatStartToQuality.org) is the one-stop resource to see quality ratings of all licensed and registered child care and preschool providers in Michigan. Free and available 24/7, you can search in the ways that are most important to you. Use the Zip Code to search for care near where you work or nearer to home. You can even search for providers who accept payments from the state or children with special needs from peanut allergies to handicap-accessible play areas.

## What are the options for child care and preschool?

Most young children in Michigan are in child care or preschool settings, so it's important for these experiences to be the very best. Here are some of the options to consider:

### State-Licensed Programs

Child care and preschool centers – These provide early learning and care in a center-based setting, including child care, preschool, Head Start and Great Start Readiness programs.

### Group child care homes

These provide early learning and care in a home-based setting for up to 12 children.

### State-Registered Programs

Family child care homes – These provide early learning and care for up to six children in a home-based setting.

## Other Options:

### Unlicensed Providers

Are adults (at least 18 years old) enrolled by the Office of Great Start to care for up to four children at the same time, either where the children/child lives or in the provider's home. If care is delivered in the provider's home, the provider must be related to the children/child by blood, marriage or adoption.

## Is every child care and preschool rated in Great Start to Quality?

Licensed and registered programs, including Head Start and Great Start Readiness Programs, are rated. Unlicensed providers – often relatives who receive payments from the state for taking care of a child – are not rated, but they have access to resources to improve their quality through the Great Start to Quality Resource Center.

## Extra support for families and providers

Every community has access to one of the 10 Great Start to Quality Resource Centers in Michigan. Parents can find assistance in their search for quality child care and preschool and information about assistance to pay for care. Resource Centers also have a lending library of books and other learning materials for families to use with their children.
