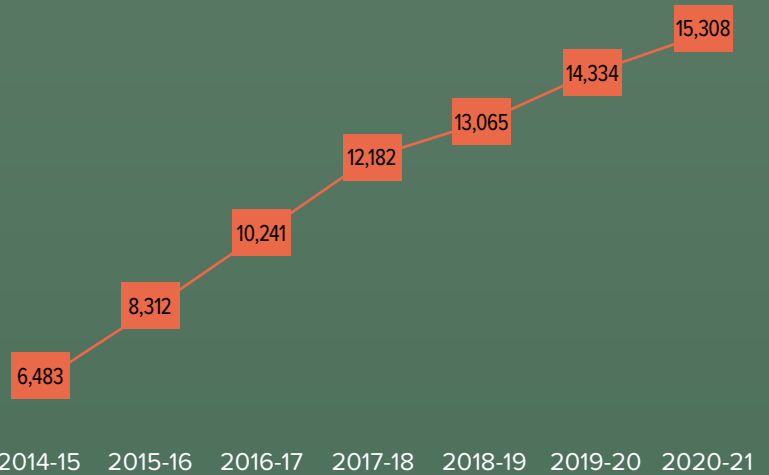


Michigan Early Middle Colleges

An **Early Middle College (EMC)** is a Michigan Department of Education (MDE) approved five-year program of study. EMCs work closely with postsecondary partners to provide students with an opportunity earn a high school diploma and one or more of the following EMC outcome awards:

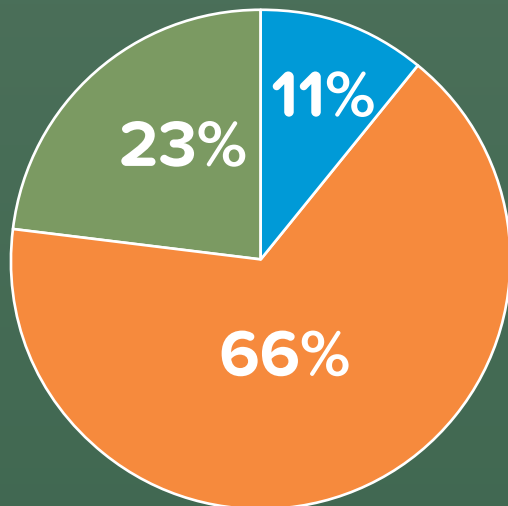
- 60 transferable college credits
- An associate degree
- A professional certification
- The Michigan Early Middle College Association (MEMCA) technical certificate
- Participation in a registered apprenticeship

EMC STUDENT ENROLLMENT

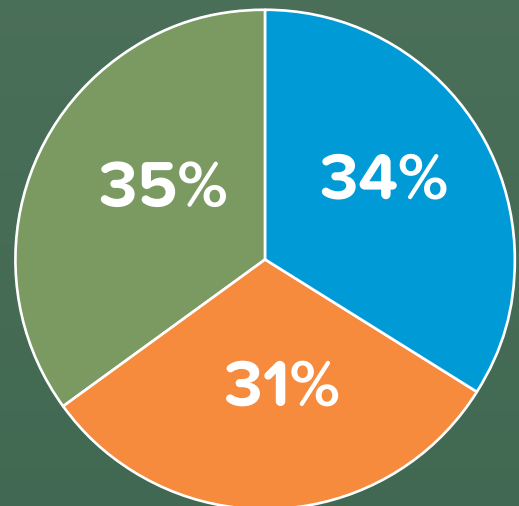

PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION OF EMC STUDENTS ENROLLED BY EMC TYPE, 2020-21



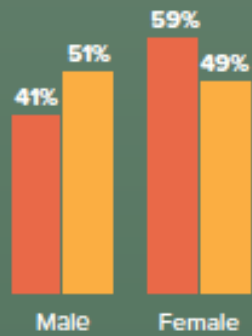
Early Middle College High School means a stand alone public high school, where 100% of the pupils are enrolled as EMC pupils.

Early Middle College Program is a high school program designed to serve less than 100% of the high school population.

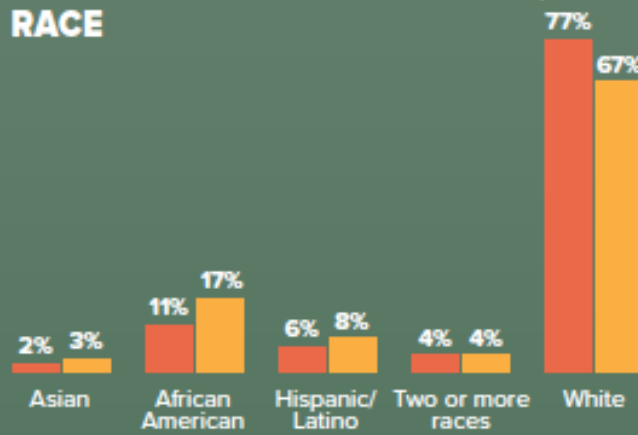
Early Middle College Consortium Program is comprised of multiple school districts with one coordinating agency.

EMC & MICHIGAN STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS, 2020-21

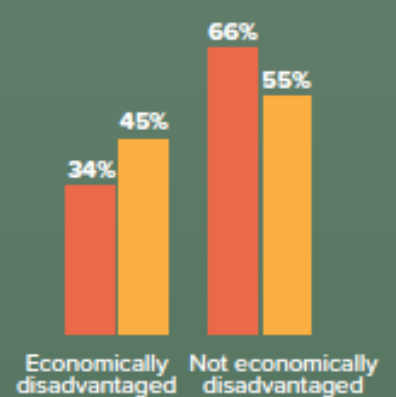
GENDER

ECONOMIC STATUS



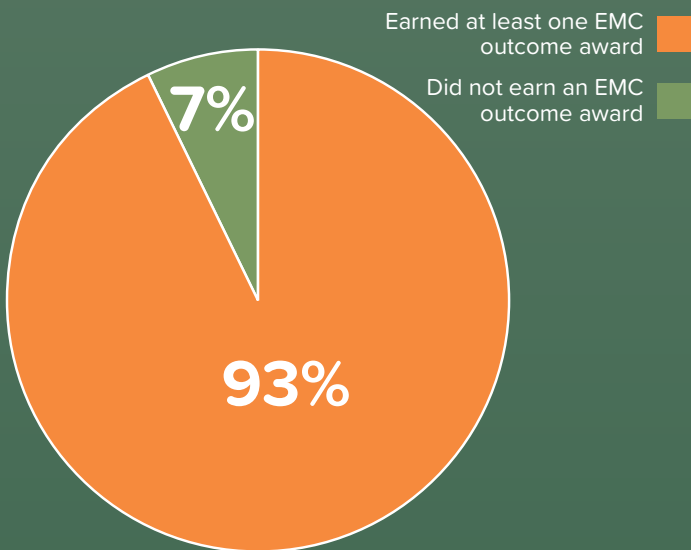

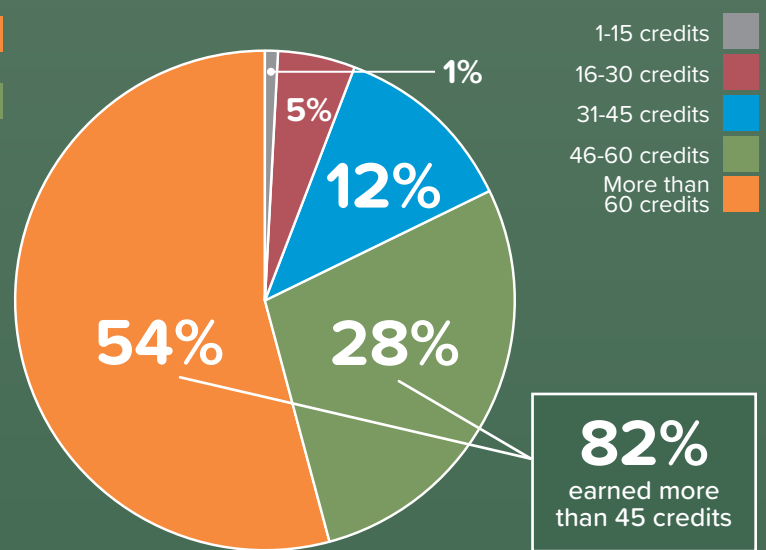

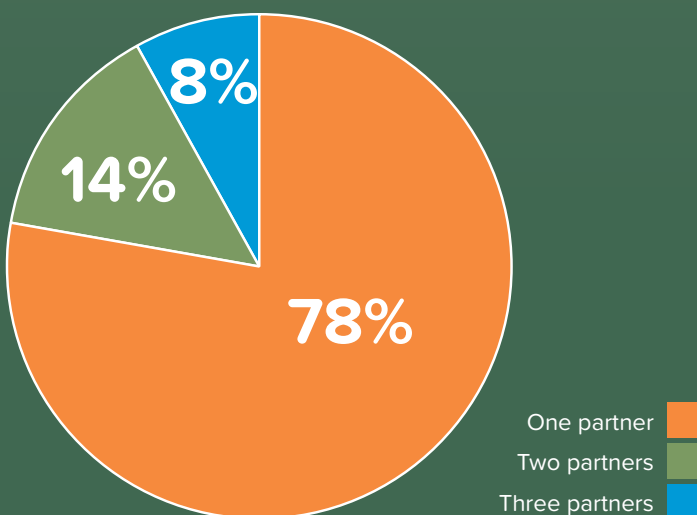
