Mr. Whiston asked audience members to introduce themselves. Mr. Whiston welcomed Judge Walter Shapero, the husband of Mrs. Kathleen Straus.

Mr. Whiston thanked Mrs. Kathleen Straus and Mr. John Austin, who are completing their terms of office on the State Board of Education. He said Mrs. Straus is completing 24 years of service, and Mr. Austin is completing 16 years of service. He said they will be honored during the meeting and at a reception immediately following the meeting.

Mr. Whiston thanked Chief Deputy Superintendent Norma Jean Sass, who will be retiring shortly. He said she has worked tirelessly on an actionable plan to elevate Michigan to a Top 10 education state.

Mr. Whiston wished a joyful holiday season to those present.

B. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION HONORING KATHLEEN N. STRAUS

Mr. Whiston said John C. Austin and Kathleen Straus, esteemed Board members, are concluding their terms of office on the State Board of Education. He said Mrs. Straus has been on the Board for 24 years, holding the office of President for 16 years, and she was also Secretary and National Association of State Boards of Education Delegate. He said Mr. Austin has served on the Board for 16 years, holding the offices of President, Vice President and Treasurer. Mr. Whiston said John and Kathleen are extremely dedicated public servants who have made sacrifices for the betterment of public education. He said there will be a reception honoring them immediately following the meeting.

He said it has been an honor to serve the people of Michigan.

people in the schools, and the wonderful Department staff who are unsung heroes behind the scenes. She said she is thankful for the support and friendships she enjoys.

VII. CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Whiston called the Committee of the Whole Meeting to order at 10:06 a.m.

VIII. <u>PRESENTATION BY MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL RIGHTS DIRECTOR</u> <u>AGUSTIN V. ARBULU</u>

Mr. Agustin V. Arbulu, Director, Michigan Department of Civil Rights; and Ms. Vicki Levengood, Communications Director, Michigan Department of Civil Rights; presented.

Mr. Whiston welcomed Mr. Arbulu and Ms. Levengood, who shared information via a <u>PowerPoint presentation</u>.

Board member comments included the effect of media on the number of incidents reported, proactive approach, Native American mascots inventory update and moratorium on spending to fund such items, current bullying incidents, bringing incidents to light rather than suppressing them, and policy decisions with implications that perpetuate the problem.

IX. <u>PRESENTATION ON SCIENCE, TECHONOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND</u> <u>MATHEMATICS (STEM) BY EAST LANSING HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS</u>

Ms. Samantha White, Ms. Taylor Murray and Ms. Katie Knox, Students for Females in STEM, East Lansing High School, presented.

Mr. Whiston said the student presentation will focus on the activities of the group they formed at East Lansing High School – Students for Females in STEM.

Information was shared via a PowerPoint presentation.

Board member comments included online courses, advocacy on the national level regarding STEM, and involvement with the Michigan Department of Education.

X. PRESENTATION ON TOP 10 IN 10

Ms. Norma Jean Sass, Chief Deputy Superintendent; presented on the Top 10 in 10.

Mr. Whiston said Department of Education staff continue to work with stakeholders to develop Michigan into a Top 10 education state within 10 years, and share information at monthly State Board of Education meetings. He said Ms. Sass will share information on developing the plan and moving the work forward.

Information was shared via a <u>PowerPoint presentation</u>. A document, Top 10 in Review, was distributed.

Mr. Whiston left the meeting at 11:15 a.m. to attend a meeting with Governor Snyder. Mr. Austin chaired the meeting in Mr. Whiston's absence.

Board member comments included binders of Top 10 information for Board members, closing the gap faced by African American males, learner-centered supports, parent engagement meetings in the evening rather than the daytime, need for a timeline of anticipated goals, Multi-Tiered System of Support, clarification of goals to raise student achievement across the board including groups with achievement gaps, putting it into practice from a teacher's perspective and personalized learning for teachers, and participation in all grade levels.

XI. <u>PERSONAL PRIVILEGE – EILEEN WEISER</u>

Mrs. Weiser said the Senate Education Committee is convening a hearing on House Bills 5409-5417 regarding seclusion and restraint. She said the hearing is at 12:00 p.m. during the State Board of Education meeting. She said she will circulate a statement of support that Board members may sign, if they choose, and it will be delivered to the hearing.

XII. PRESENTATION ON EVERY STUDENT SUCCEEDS ACT PLAN

Dr. Venessa Keesler, Deputy Superintendent of Educator, Student, and School Supports, presented on the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Plan.

Mr. Whiston said the presentation provides an overview of the ESSA Forums that the Michigan Department of Education has been conducting across the state. He said the presentation outlines the ongoing work with additional indicators in the accountability system along with the transparency dashboard. He said aligning these indicators to key areas of the Top 10 in 10 plan ensures measurement and reporting of elements critical to Michigan's success as a state.

Information was provided via a <u>PowerPoint presentation</u>.

Board member comments included evaluation of the effectiveness of a school or the community, student engagement measures of dropping out of school or student mobility, timeline for submission of Michigan's ESSA plan, school quality school community measure of wrap-around services, use of transparency dashboard to elevate transparency, support for schools to partner with communities, and educator engagement and professional learning opportunities.

Mrs. Tracy Horodyski, 2016-2017 Michigan Teacher of the Year, presented the Report of the Michigan Teacher of the Year.

Mrs. Horodyski shared information on her visit to Ganiard Elementary School in Mt. Pleasant, and offered the Board an opportunity to decorate lunch bags for Kids Food Basket, a charity on the west side of the state.

XXIII. APPROVAL OF STATEMENT AND GUIDANCE ON DEVELOPING A POLICY FOR PREVENTION OF SUSPENSION AND/OR EXPULSION OF CHILDREN BIRTH THROUGH AGE 8 IN EARLY EDUCATION AND CARE PROGRAMS

Mr. Whiston said at the September 14, 2016 Board meeting, staff presented the draft Statement and Guidance on Developing a Policy for Prevention of Suspension and/or Expulsion of Children Birth Through Age 8 in Early Education and Care Programs. He said following the Board meeting, the statement and guidance was released for public comment, revisions were made, and Board approval is requested.

Ms. Kaitlin Ferrick, Director, Head Start State Collaboration Office, reviewed the comments that were received and how they were incorporated into the policy document.

Dr. Pugh said children currently undergo multiple developmental screenings, and she asked if data could be accessed among health providers to eliminate multiple screenings. Ms. Ferrick said there is a separate project that is working on that issue.

Ms. Ramos-Montigny moved, seconded by Mrs. Weiser, that the State Board of Education approve the Statement and Guidance for Developing a Policy for Prevention of Suspension and/or Expulsion of Children Birth Through Age 8 in Early Education and Care Programs, as attached to the Superintendent's memorandum dated November 29, 2016.

Mr. Whiston said the Office of Special Education has received requests from organizations asking that their Special Education Advisory Council (SEAC) designees be changed. He said the Board is being asked to approve the changes.

Ms. Joanne Winkelman, Supervisor, Program Accountability Unit, Office of Special Education, provided information on the proposed changes.

Ms. Ramos-Montigny asked if there were concerns. Ms. Winkelman said there were no problems. She said changes are needed due to people changing jobs, and organizations designating alternates.

Mrs. Straus stressed the need for diversity, and Ms. Winkelman said that is a current topic of discussion by SEAC members.

Dr. Pugh suggested the addition of a member with a public health background in the area of lead poisoning.

Ms. Ramos-Montigny moved, seconded by Mrs. Straus, that the State Board of Education approve the changes to organizational, memberat-large and Ex-Officio representatives on the Special Education Advisory Committee, as described in the Superintendent's memorandum dated November 29, 2016.

XXV. STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Mr. Martin Ackley, Director, Public and Governmental Affairs; Dr. Casandra Ulbrich, Chair, State Board of Education Legislative Committee; Ms. Lupe Ramos-Montigny, National Association of State Boards of Education (NASBE) Delegate; Mrs. Kathleen Straus NASBE Governmental Affairs Committee; and Mrs. Eileen Weiser, Education Commission of the States; presented the State and Federal Legislative Update.

Mr. Ackley said House Bills 5409-5417 regarding seclusion and restraint were reported to the floor from the Senate Education Committee. He provided an update on the status of pending legislation.

Dr. Ulbrich said the Legislative Committee discussed Senate Bill 567 regarding the post Labor Day start date for schools. She said the Committee did not propose a statement, but is inviting discussion by the full Board, if desired. Dr. Ulbrich said she does not believe the legislation is moving during this session, so it does not seem to be urgent that a Board statement be adopted at this time. Ms. Ramos-Montigny and Mrs. Weiser said they agree with Dr. Ulbrich.

Ms. Ramos-Montigny said NASBE is asking for delegates to the Public Education Positions Committee and Governmental Affairs Committee, and Board members should contact Ms. Ramos-Montigny if they are interested in serving.

Mrs. Straus she does not have a report on the Governmental Affairs Committee.

Mrs. Weiser said the Education Commission of the States has an Every Student Succeeds Act Thinkers Meeting, and a draft paper will be released the week of December 18, 2016. She said there may be reinterpretations of the regulations after January.

Mr. Whiston said the Governor's 21st Century Education Commission met on December 12 and areas under discussion include governance, school accountability, teacher preparation and school funding. He said recommendations are anticipated at the end of January or beginning of February.

Dr. Ulbrich provided details on the Kathleen Straus Scholarship that has been established at Wayne State University. Mrs. Straus said she is very honored by the scholarship and those that have made contributions.

Dr. Zeile said he has been treated with acceptance and made to feel part of the Board process, and he is thankful to Mr. Austin and Mrs. Straus for their kindness.

Mrs. Weiser said issues were resolved well, thoughtfully, and cohesively. She thanked Mrs. Straus and Mr. Austin for their part in the wonderful journey.

RESOLUTION HONORING

JOHN C. AUSTIN

WHEREAS, John C. Austin was elected to the State Board of Education in November 2000 for an eight-year term from January 1, 2001 - January 1, 2009; and subsequently was re-elected for a second eight-year term from January 1, 2009 – January 1, 2017; and

WHEREAS, John earned a Masters in Public Administration from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and a Bachelor of Arts from Swarthmore College in Economics and Political Science; and

WHEREAS, John is currently serving his third term as President of the State Board of Education, and previously served as Vice President and Treasurer, as elected by his peers; and
