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





OVERVIEW: Under federal quality control rules, the threshold for sanctions for active error rates is set at 105% of the national average. States are in liability status the first year a state's lower confidence boundary exceeds the national sanction target threshold. States are sanctioned and assessed financial penalties for the second consecutive year in which the state's lower confidence boundary exceeds the national sanction target threshold. Michigan was in sanction status in FY 2006 - FY 2008. The FY 2009 error rate put Michigan in first-year liability status. From FY 2010 through FY 2014 Michigan was not in liability or sanction status.

*Data for FY 2007 - FY 2014 are final federal rates. Data for FY 2015 - FY 2017 is not listed since final federal rates are not yet available.



That is: \$918 -\$200 = \$718 X 80% = \$574.



FIP Group of Three Percentages Based on Each Year's Federal Poverty Thresholds for a Family of Three




FIP Family of Three Payment Adjusted to Show Purchasing Power in FY 2008 Dollars








Payment Adjusted to Show Purchasing Power in Fiscal Year 2008 Dollars for One Person Case







CHILDREN'S PROTECTIVE SERVICES - COMPLAINTS INVESTIGATED


Fiscal Year 2008 - Fiscal Year 2017

















Relative Placements as a Percentage of 12-Month Successful Program Outcomes: FY 2007 - FY 2016






Average Monthly Caseloads and Unduplicated Annual Caseloads: FY 2008 - FY 2017



Total Number of Beds Available for Children by Care Setting FY 2008 - FY 2017






Note: Totals are final, year-end adjusted amounts (source: OCSE-34a)



* There were recession impacts on collections in FY 2010 and FY 2011 and a decrease in TANF collections and federal tax refunds in FY 2013. There was a 20,000 TANF and Foster Care caseload drop from FY 2012 to FY 2013, which according to the OCSE-157 Federal Report, is likely to have contributed to the decline in TANF collections in FY 2012. It's further noted in the OCSE-157 Federal Report, there was a decline in tax offset collections.


Combined Value of Identified Fraud and Cost Avoidance¹ Fiscal Year 2012 - Fiscal Year 2017

SSA-OIG tracks and quantifies Cooperative Disability Investigations conducted by MDHHS-OIG agents. Since FY 2012, the value of OIG Enforcement Division program integrity efforts (fraud detection, cost savings, and disqualfications) increased from \$112.1 million to \$160 million in FY 2017, an increase of \$47.9 million (nearly 43%).

Combined Value of Medicaid Provider Fraud, Overpayments and Cost Avoidance¹ Fiscal Year 2011 - Fiscal Year 2017




OIG efforts directly impact Medicaid provider fraud, overpayments and cost avoidance. Overpayments are identified through audit and investigative activities where Medicaid provider payments are compared to supporting documentation (e.g., medical records, prescriptions, etc.) to ensure payments were made in accordance with policy and state and/or federal law. OIGs cost avoidance calculations estimate the reduction in future Medicaid payments as a result of action taken (e.g., provider suspensions, Medicaid policy enhancements, and payment processing edits, etc.). Due to the merger of the DCH and DHS OIGs, the leveraging of investigative efforts and efficiencies has produced a 79 percent increase in FY 2017 over the previous year.

FY 2011 - FY 2017




Recoupment Specialists establish client, agency and fraud claims on behalf of the Department. From FY 2011 through FY 2017, claims established against households increased 123.7%.

Employment Outcomes¹ FY 2008 - FY 2017



<u>Note:</u> Several factors likely contributed to lower employment outcomes after FY 2012. First, FY 2012 was the last year of ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) funds. Without those additional funds and support, rehabilitation tapered off nearly 13 percent. A reduction in force within MRS was also taking place in FY 2012. Ultimately, there were fewer field and MRS central office staff.
