APPENDIX I

CSHCS MEDICAL DIAGNOSES and POSSIBLE RELATED SPECIALTIES

This table is meant to be used as guidance in determining possible specialists that may be related to a specific diagnosis and then added to the provider list for a specific child.

General Information

- Almost all families will be connected to a Regional Pediatric Center set of providers, both clinics and physician specialists
- Hospitals are included
- Most preferred specialists are pediatric subspecialists; as the child gets older (i.e. late teens), more adult providers would be utilized
- For exceptions to allow primary care physicians to be authorized, see 22.6-A
