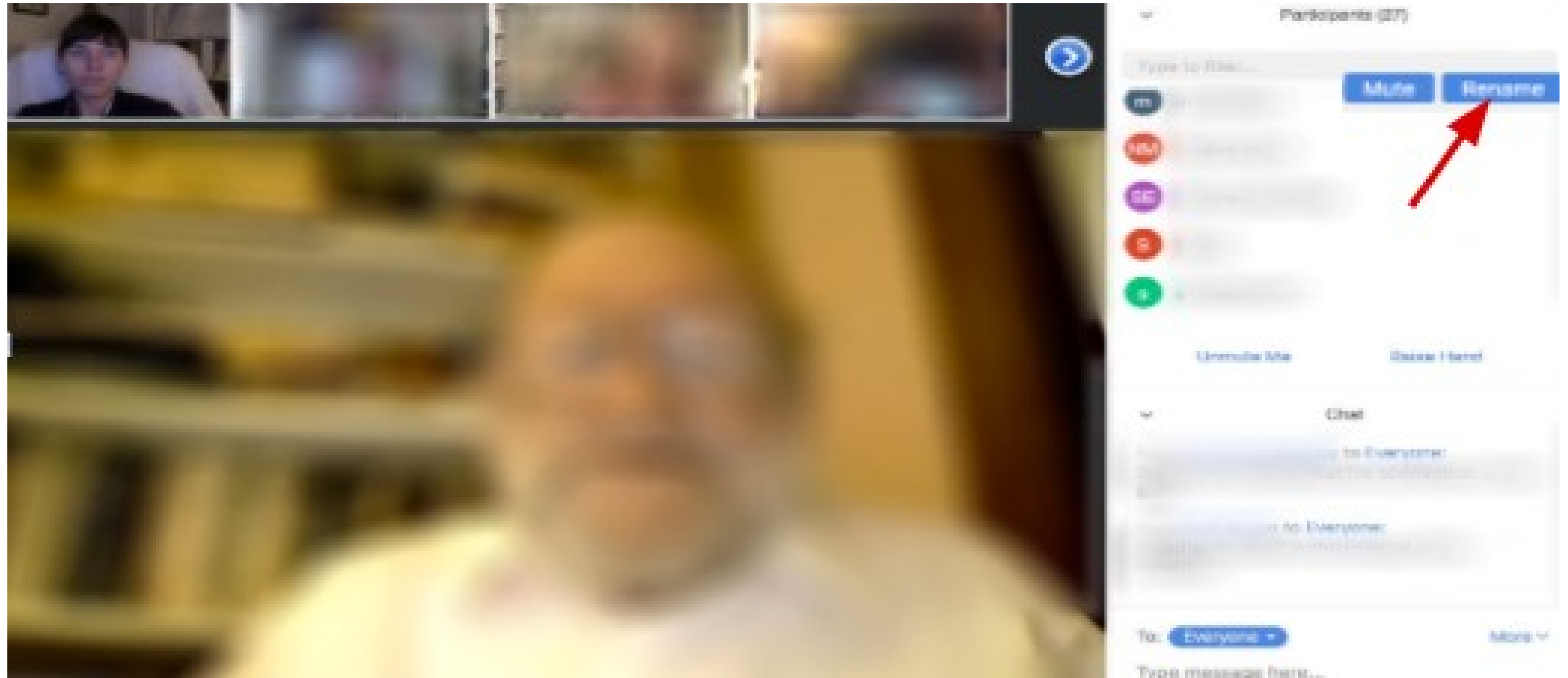

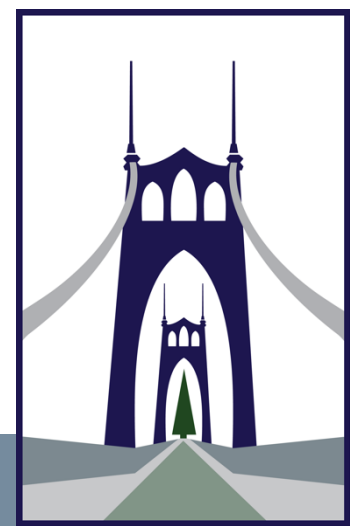


Participating in the Virtual Forum

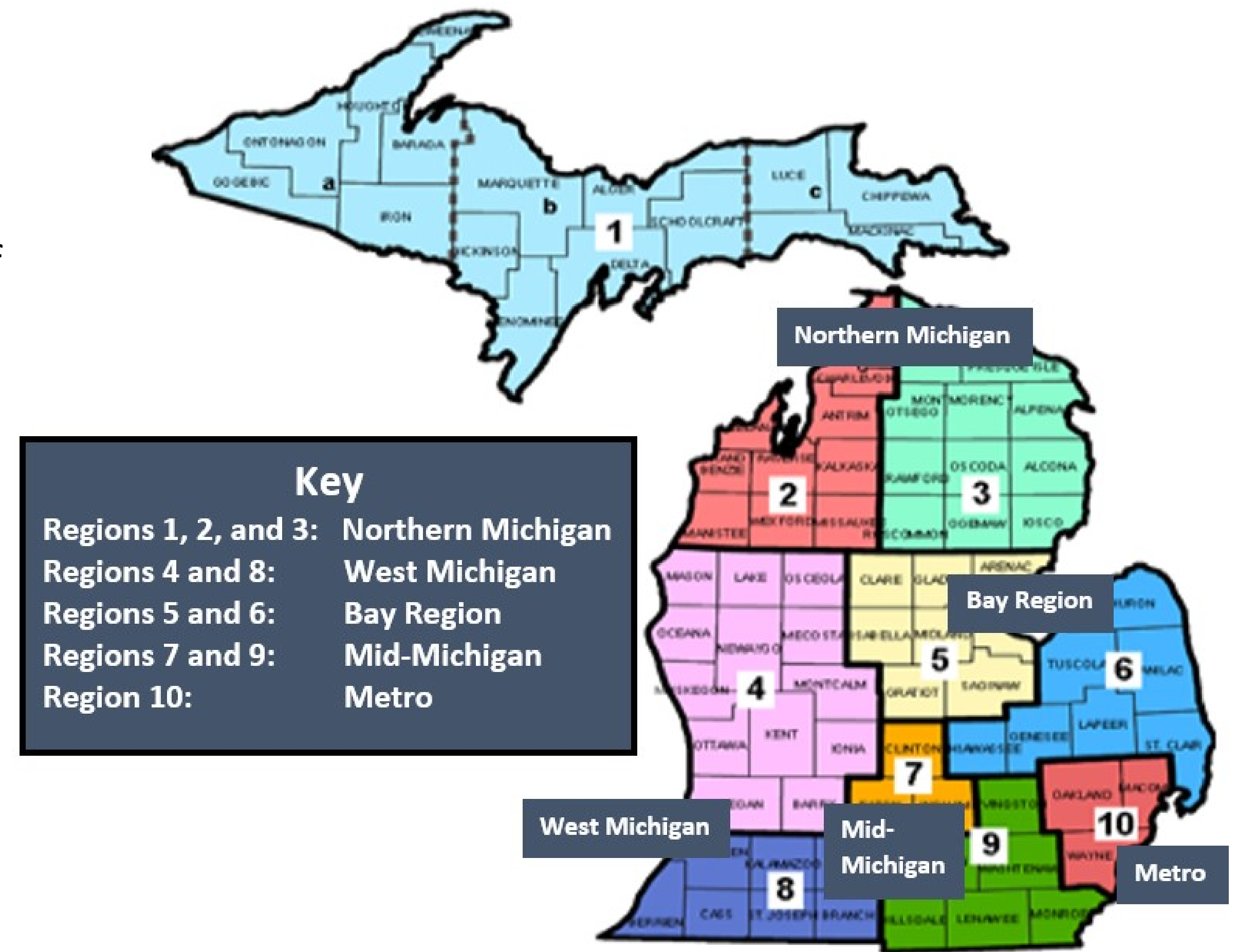
Stakeholder Forum Purpose and Objectives

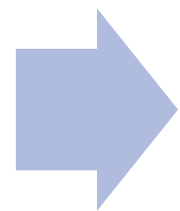

Vision for a Five-Year Health IT Roadmap: A brief history

2005

- Governor Jennifer M. Granholm announces efforts to explore the role of IT in healthcare transformation and improving care outcomes
- The Michigan Department of Community Health and Department of Information Technology are charged with convening stakeholders to develop a strategy

2006

- 200+ healthcare stakeholders are convened
- The “Conduit to Care” strategy document is published
- The legislature establishes the Health IT Commission
- Federal and state funding is secured to implement plan

Vision for a Five-Year Health IT Roadmap: Strategic planning during a global pandemic

2019

- The Health IT Commission adopts a resolution to update the “Conduit to Care” strategy
- The Michigan Health Endowment Fund awards funding for the development of an updated Five-Year Health IT Roadmap

2020

- The coronavirus pandemic puts strain on care delivery systems
- Engagement for the roadmap is reimagined for virtual spaces
- 650+ healthcare, social service and consumer stakeholders are engaged
- Virtual forums are scheduled

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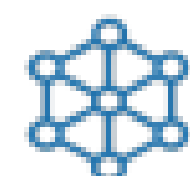

State Public Health Assessment – Key Findings (PLACEHOLDER)



Across all 10 Essential Public Health Services, discussions largely discussed the responsibility and actions of governmental public health. The public health system in Michigan would likely benefit from better identification of roles for all partners as part of the larger public health system.



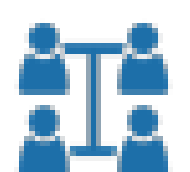
Partners identified various gaps in the data that support monitoring health status and identifying health problems, including as: data system interoperability challenges, timeliness of data, and multiple entry points at the state level to support data use.



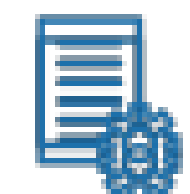
Michigan has multiple examples of positive responses to emerging health threats in recent years, but partners shared the perception that efforts are most often reactive due to a lack of resources (i.e. funding, training, evaluation, etc.) to support proactive public health practices.



System partners emphasized the importance of focusing on improving public health messaging to ensure culturally and linguistically appropriate information delivered through the different modalities needed to reach Michiganders of varying cultures, ages, ability, literacy, and income.



There are numerous examples across the public health system of strong partnerships that have worked together to identify and solve health problems. However, public health programs and partnerships largely exist in silos. System partners identified a need for additional partnership development across the public health system.



Michigan's Public Health System partners identified opportunity for improvement regarding shared decision making for state-wide policy development. Partners also emphasized the importance of moving toward a Health in all Policies approach.



Michigan's Public Health Code gives governmental public health the authority it needs to enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety. Partners identified a need for additional support at the local level (i.e. funding, professional development, legal council etc.) to fully support local health departments in exercising their legal authority.



Michigan's Public Health System must continue to focus on the implications of health inequities on population health to ensure Michiganders are connected to personal health services that are culturally sensitive and appropriate, meet the needs of vulnerable populations, and reduce inequitable health outcomes.



Michigan's public and personal health care workforce are crucial to the protection and promotion of Michiganders health and wellbeing, and therefore need to be adequately supported through educational opportunities, professional opportunities for advancement and growth, and competitive pay scales to retain a robust and educated workforce.

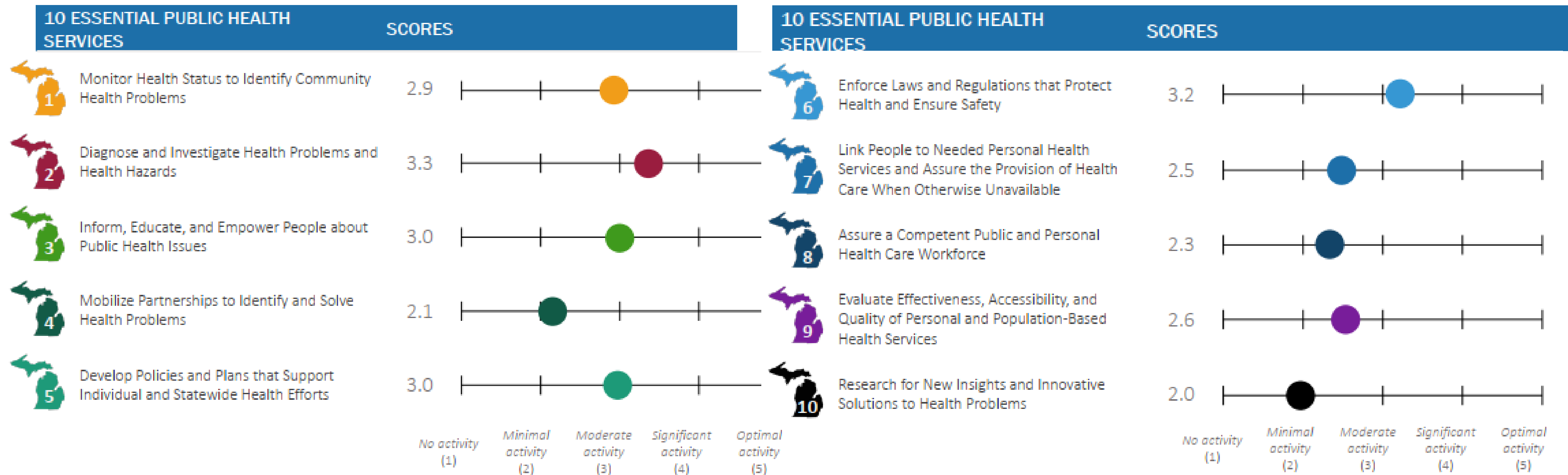


There is varying capacity across Michigan's Public Health System related to quality improvement, evaluation, and performance improvement. There is a strong need for more support and continued development opportunities for public health professionals at all levels of the public health system.



Michigan's Public Health System encounters many barriers to research and innovations, often due to barriers such as funding restrictions, siloed programming, staff capacity, and lack of access to academic institutions in some areas of the state. This creates the need for additional support and strategic planning to encourage research and innovation.

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Stakeholder Forum Title 23

Situational Scenario

- A rural area on the northwest side of Michigan has a population of 13,000
- There is limited access to health services; 41% of residence are at least 20 miles away from the nearest clinic
- In May, local public health officials report a COVID-19 workplace outbreak at a meat packaging plant
- Franklin Memorial is a small critical access hospital serving the area
 - Hospital administrators report they are running out of capacity in the ICU due to influx of COVID-19 patients
 - They also put out a request for desperately needed protective supplies and equipment
