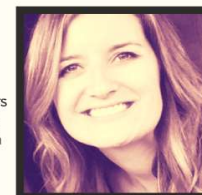

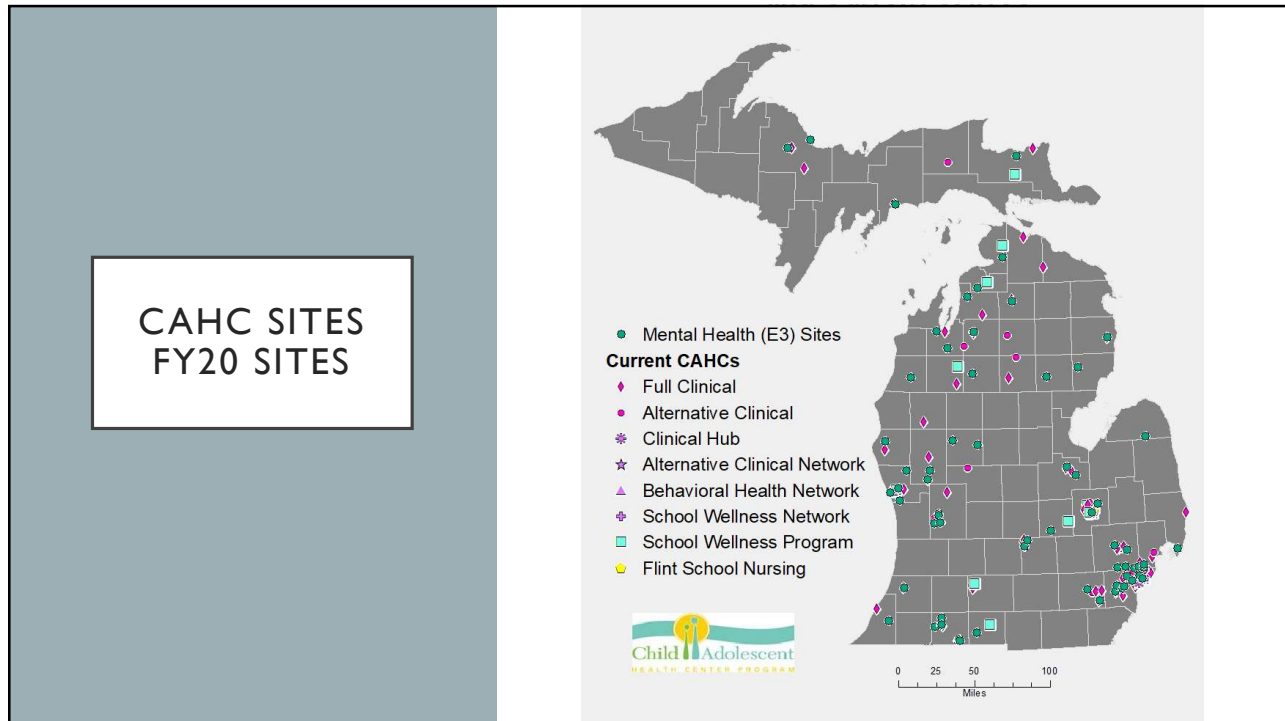
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## HISTORY OF ADOLESCENT HEALTH SERVICES

The timeline shows key milestones in Michigan's adolescent health services:

- 1981:** First teen health centers were established in Michigan.
- 1985:** Governor Blanchard & State Health Director Gloria Smith commissioned the Five-Year Adolescent Health Plan.
- 1987:** \$1.25m appropriated for teen health centers and planning grants.
- 1988:** RFP Issued, Grants issued to 26 teen health centers. A lot of funding and dis-funding, program growth, and changes happened...
- 2018:** We celebrated our 30th Anniversary! 82 CAHCs, 18 SWPs + 7 Nursing Sites.
- 2019:** 61 new E3 (Expanding & Enhancing Emotional Health) sites.
- 2020:** 12 new CAHC and SWP sites, 10 new E3 sites.

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# PROGRAM OVERVIEW

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
## CHILD & ADOLESCENT HEALTH CENTERS ARE...

- Comprehensive primary care and behavioral health sites
- Offer services for all clients ages 5 to 21 years
- Open year-round, even during school breaks
- Available at one accessible location
- Comprised of an integrated team




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- Clinical vs. Alternative Clinical
  - Differences are:
    - Minimum weekly provider hours
    - Number of clients served annually
- School-based locations
  - Serve ages 5 to 21 years
  - Must have “teen only” hours if serving clients ages 5 to 9 years
- School-linked locations
  - Serve ages 10 to 21 years
  - Can provide some services not allowed on school property




DIFFERENCES  
IN CAHC  
MODELS

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CAHCS ARE  
NOT...

- CAHCS are not school nursing programs
- CAHCS are not only acute care or rotating clinics
- CAHCS are not a place for all ages






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## SCHOOL WELLNESS PROGRAMS ARE...


-  A hybrid model bridging the gap between a full-service school-based or school-linked health center and the traditional school nurse model
-  Open full time during the school year
-  Comprised of an integrated team (nurse + mental health provider) and may include support staff

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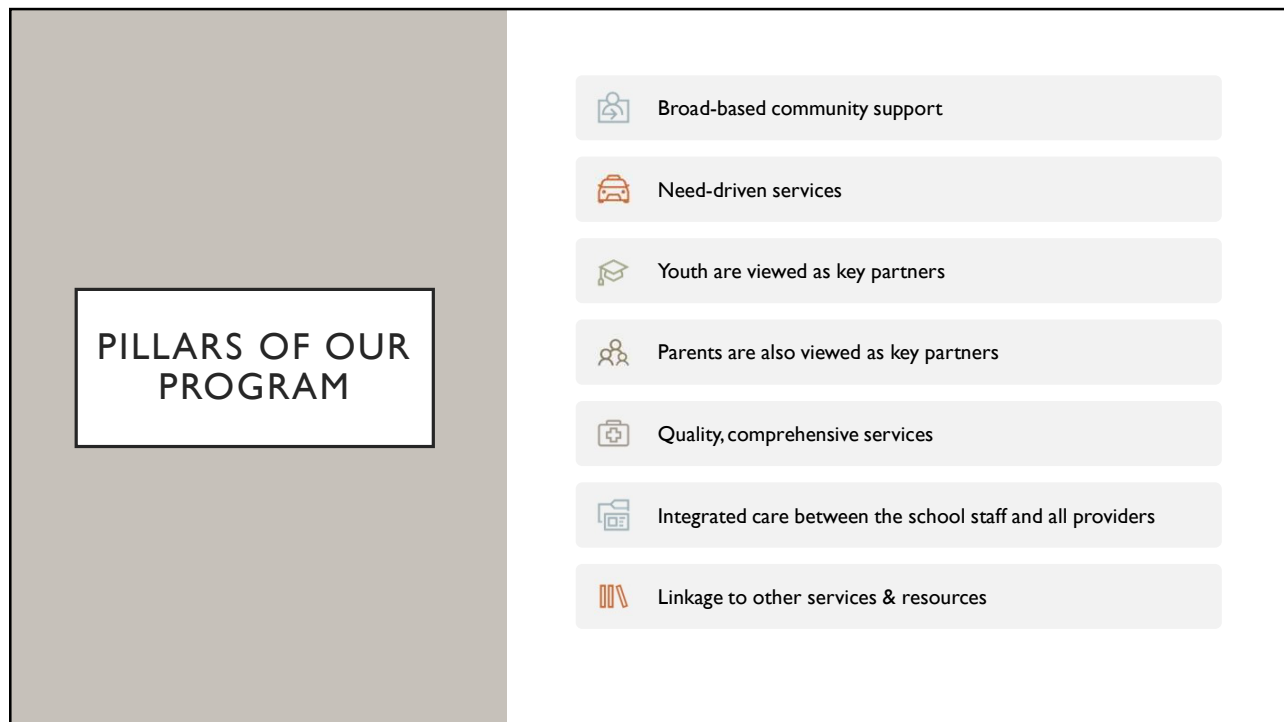


## SCHOOL WELLNESS PROGRAMS ARE NOT...

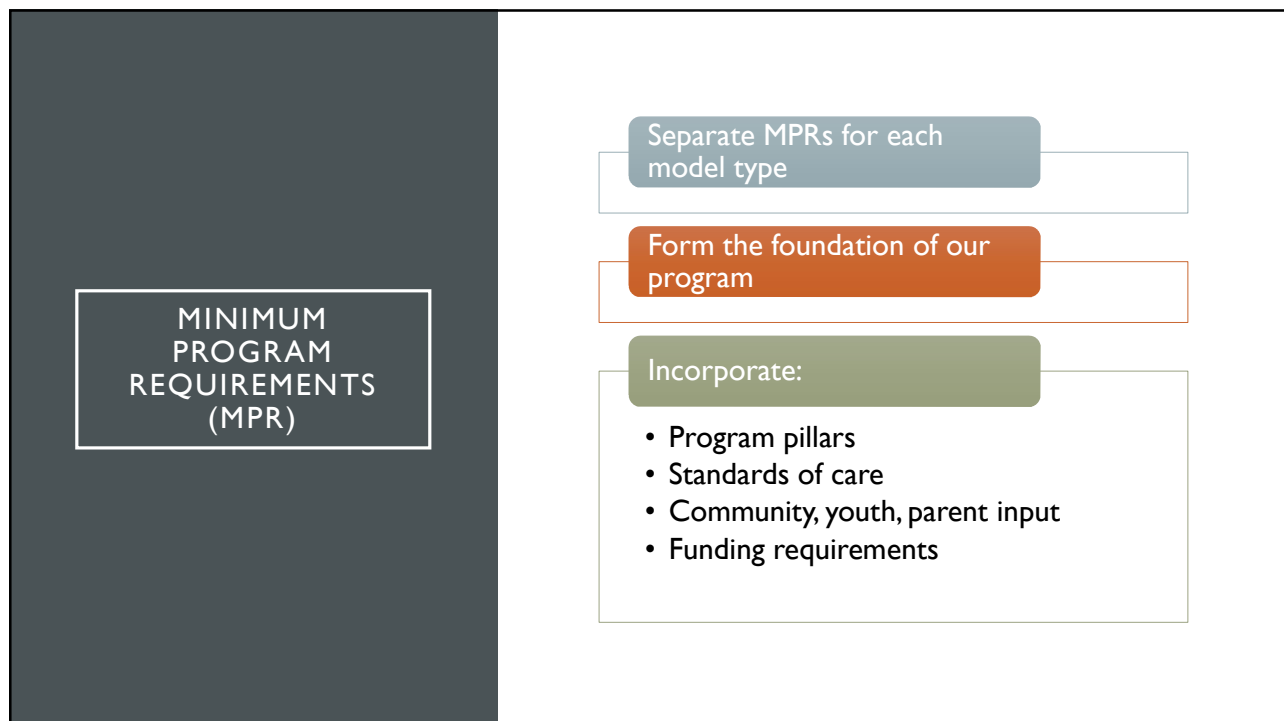
- A primary care program
- Limited to traditional school nursing practices
  - SWP nurses operate under the standing orders of a physician, allowing for an expanded scope of practice
- Limited to acute care
- A place for all ages
  - SWPs are funded to serve individuals 5-21 years of age
  - The priority and focus should always be on reaching the students in the school in which the SWP is located



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**ASSURANCES**

- CAHC/SWP services shall not supplant existing school services
- Services provided shall not breach the confidentiality of the client
- Shall not provide abortion counseling, services, or make referrals for abortion services
- If on school property, shall not prescribe, dispense, or otherwise distribute family planning drugs and/or devices

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## HOW ADOLESCENT HEALTH SERVICES ARE FUNDED IN MICHIGAN

- Our base allocation is in the Michigan Department of Education School Aid Budget
- State School Aid funding allows for services for ages 5-21 years of age only, except:
  - Clients up to 26 years of age if eligible to receive special education services
  - Infants and children of clients (i.e. teen and young adult parents)

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## FUTURE OF YOUR FUNDING: WHAT WE KNOW

- Uncertain times due to state budget deficit
- We realize you have questions and concerns
- CAHC program has strong bipartisan legislative support
- MDHHS will continue to monitor the budget closely and keep all sites updated with any changes
- FY20 allocations are based on amount applied for in RFP
- Carryover is not anticipated

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## FY21 NON-COMPETITIVE APPLICATION PROCESS


- All sites will need to reapply for FY21 funding through a non-competitive process within EGrAMS
- Details will be discussed in future program communications as soon as possible
- Minimum items will include workplan, budget, budget narrative
- 30% in-kind or local match is required in FY21

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# REPORTING

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**FOUR REQUIRED OBJECTIVES**




By June 30, 2020, a finalized staffing plan with a timeline for hiring new staff will be submitted.



By July 15, 2020, a Community Advisory Committee (CAC) will be formed or designated.



By August 15, 2020, a comprehensive service delivery plan that is responsive to both the minimum program requirements and the health needs of the target population will be developed and approved by the CAC.




By August 30, 2020, the program location will be finalized, with a detailed plan and timeline for construction and renovation, including anticipated costs, along with a financial plan with sources secured for construction.

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## TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE ON FIRST REQUIRED OBJECTIVE

- By June 30, 2020, a finalized staffing plan with a timeline for hiring new staff will be submitted.

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## EGRAMS REPORTING

First reporting due July 30, 2020

- Due within 30 days after close of the month/quarter

Reimbursement

- Newly funded sites will need to submit FSRs, via EGrAMS, in order to be reimbursed for expenditures

Local Health Departments

- Report financials quarterly
- Receive 1/12 allocation each month
- EGrAMS workplan reporting is **not** required


Other fiduciaries

- Report financials monthly
- Reimbursed for what was spent
- EGrAMS workplan reporting is required quarterly
