Centerline Rumble Strips Save Lives

Rumble strips are a low-cost measure used to address one of the most serious types of traffic crashes: a lane departure crash. They consist of a set of transverse grooves applied on the shoulder or centerline of a roadway. This pamphlet provides the benefits and performance of MDOT's centerline rumble strip effort.

Michigan's Guide for Aging Drivers and Their Families

This guide is a resource for Michigan's aging drivers, their family members, and caregivers. This guide helps with the understanding of how aging and aging-related changes in health status affect the ability to drive safely and provides references to where more information and services may be obtained.

What Are Road Safety Audits?

A Road Safety Audit (RSA) is a formal safety performance examination of an existing or future road or intersection by an independent, multi-disciplinary team. Learn about the eight step RSA process and who to contact with questions on performing an RSA in this pamphlet.

What is the Local Safety Initiative?

The Local Safety Initiative (LSI) is a FREE service to help local agencies identify safety issues and improve local road safety. The LSI can help identify safety improvement projects that may be eligible for funding through the Local Agency Programs Safety Call for Projects. The pamphlet explains the program and how to sign up for the LSI and who to contact.

What Are Local Road Safety Plans?

A Local Road Safety Plan (LRSP) is a formal document that defines key emphasis areas and strategies that impact local roads and provides a framework to accomplish safety enhancements at the local level. In the near future LRSP's will be developed in Michigan through MPO's or rural task forces. From this pamphlet learn more about the LRSP's and who to contact with questions.

What is Toward Zero Deaths?

Toward Zero Deaths (TZD) is a new statewide safety campaign based on the national strategy on highway safety intended to influence driver behavior and improve safety. While the state's SHSP goal is to reduce traffic fatalities from 974 in 2018 to 945 in 2022 our ultimate vision is Toward Zero Deaths on Michigan's roadways. Learn how to become a TZD participant and learn about the National Strategy.

Moving Michigan Toward Zero Deaths

This pamphlet discusses the various safety programs at MDOT such as Senior Mobility, Operation Lifesaver, Safe Routes 2 School, Traffic Incident Management and others. These programs represent the activities MDOT is involved in to improve safety on Michigan's roads.
