Energy waste reduction at your business to lower your utility bills

Energy Waste Reduction (EWR) is becoming a top priority for Michigan businesses. Small changes add up to big savings. It's true: the cheapest energy is the energy you don't use.

Ways to save:

- Tune up your heating, ventilating and air conditioning system annually, and regularly change filters, especially during the heating and cooling season.
- Turn off lights and other electronic equipment when not in use, and turn on the power management function on office computers.
- Adjust lighting to actual needs, optimizing the use of free daylight, and install switch plate occupancy sensors in proper locations.
- Install window films and add insulation or reflective roof coating to reduce energy waste.
- Educate staff about energy use and consider developing an energy team to pursue energy waste reduction.
- Save an estimated 10 percent a year on heating and cooling with a programmable thermostat.
- Install ENERGY STAR qualified lighting, exit signs and electronic equipment.

- Consider buying a laptop for your next computer upgrade: it uses much less energy than a desktop computer.
- Conduct an energy audit to identify areas where building systems have become inefficient over time to bring them back to peak performance.
- Replace equipment with more efficient equipment.
- Cutting water use can cut energy bills, too:
 - Repair leaking pipes, fixtures, and seals.
 Small leaks add up to many gallons of water and dollars wasted each month.
 - Use water-saving faucets, showerheads, toilets and urinals to save water.
 - Install controls that turn off faucets automatically.
 - Use plants native to your climate that require minimal watering and possess better pest resistance with landscaping. If local code allows, consider diverting "gray water" for irrigation.
