

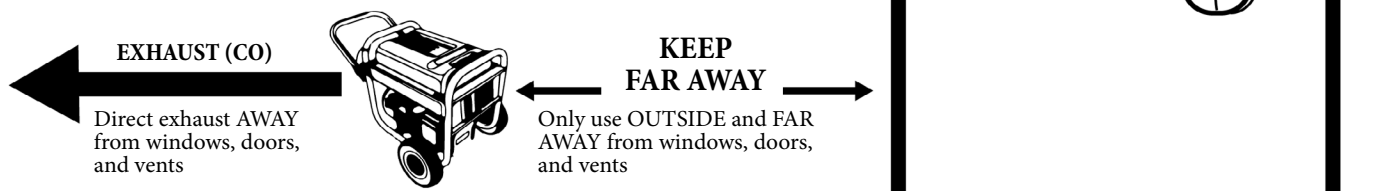
# How to Safely Use a Portable Generator

Generator engine exhaust contains VERY HIGH LEVELS of carbon monoxide (CO) poison gas. You CANNOT SEE, SMELL, OR TASTE CO but it COULD KILL you in minutes.

## DO!

### PROTECT YOURSELF FROM CO POISON-RELATED ILLNESS AND DEATH

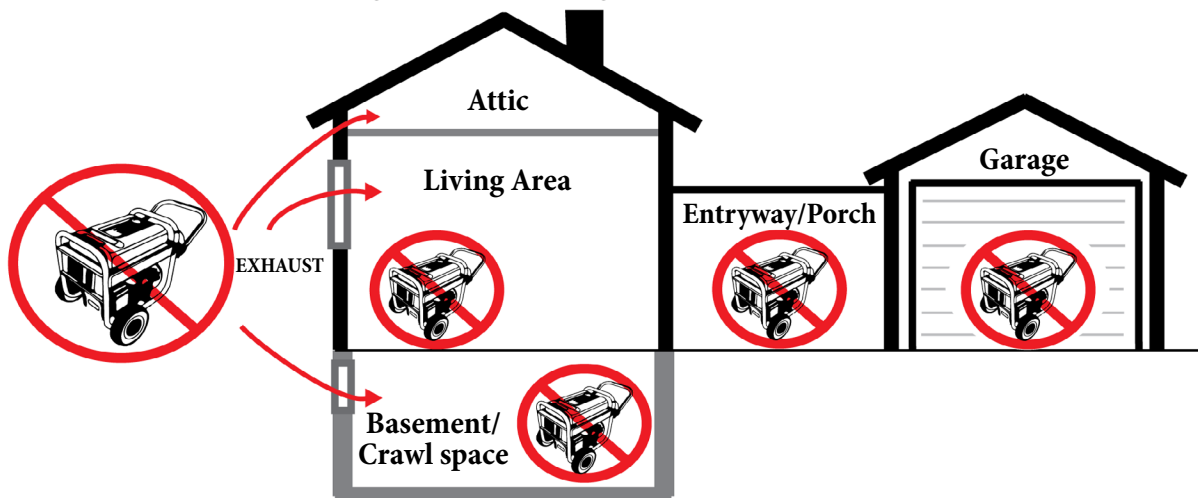
- Read and follow generator operator's manual before operating
- Install carbon monoxide detectors/alarms inside your home
- Locate generator to reduce risk of carbon monoxide getting inside the home



## DO NOT!

### OPERATE GENERATOR IN ANY OF THE FOLLOWING LOCATIONS:

- Anywhere inside your home
- Outside near windows, doors, and vents
- Partially-enclosed spaces, even if using fans or opening doors and windows for ventilation



## KNOW THE WARNING SIGNS OF CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

### Headache - Shortness of Breath - Fainting - Nausea - Dizziness - Weakness

Symptoms of low level CO poisoning can be similar to those caused by other illnesses such as a cold, flu, or food poisoning. If you experience any of these symptoms, you may have CO poisoning. Get outside to fresh air immediately and call 911 for emergency medical attention. High levels of CO can rapidly cause you to lose consciousness before you can get fresh air and call for help. DO NOT attempt to shut off the generator before moving to fresh air. Entering an enclosed space where a generator is or has been running may put you at greater risk of CO poisoning.
