Subject: Disposition Reporting for Local Ordinance Violations

In an effort to report accurate criminal history records, the Criminal Justice Information Center (CJIC) is requesting that all dispositions reported for a local ordinance include the corresponding state Prosecuting Attorney's Coordinating Council (PACC) Code.

Michigan Compiled Law (MCL) 28.243, Section (2), states, "A law enforcement agency **shall** take a person's fingerprints if the person is arrested for a violation of a local ordinance for which the maximum possible penalty is 93 days imprisonment and that substantially corresponds to a violation of state law that is a misdemeanor for which the maximum possible term of imprisonment is 93 days."

Also, Section (5) of MCL 28.243, states, "An arresting law enforcement agency in this state **may** take a person's fingerprints on forms furnished by the commanding officer upon arrest for a misdemeanor other than a misdemeanor described in subsection (1), (2), or (4), and may forward the fingerprints to the department."

It is the court's responsibility to include the corresponding state PACC Code. These cases will reflect as an "Ordinance Violation" in the judicial segment of the criminal history record. If you need assistance in determining the correct corresponding state PACC Code, contact your city Attorney's office for assistance.

Ordinances that do not substantially correspond to a state statute are not reportable to the Michigan State Police (MSP). To have these arrest incidents removed from the Criminal History Record:
