Philosophy of Leadership

The department achieves its mission through employees who distinguish themselves as leaders by their ability to earn respect, instill confidence, and strengthen morale by providing vision, accountability, and recognizing individual contributions and achievements.

Since 1917, the Michigan State Police (MSP) has provided primary law enforcement and quality support services to local, county, and state public safety agencies. With the unique positioning of statewide resources and services, the MSP is committed to providing highly trained personnel, high-tech equipment, and state-of-the-art technology to enhance public safety.

It is still true today that no one agency or governmental unit has the resources or personnel to do this job alone. Contained in this Services Guide are the resources offered by the MSP that are available to every local, county, and state agency. Working together, we can make Michigan a safer place for all of us.

Crime and Traffic

The Michigan State Police (MSP) personnel most visible to the public are the uniform troopers whose primary responsibilities are to deter criminal activity, arrest those who break the law, investigate crimes, and improve traffic safety.

Assigned to work locations statewide, with the authority to work across jurisdictional boundaries, these troopers provide a full range of services, including the investigation of crimes, apprehension of criminals, traffic patrol, community outreach, and the preservation of law and order throughout Michigan.

Traffic Safety and Enforcement

The MSP participates independently and cooperatively with local and county police agencies in traffic enforcement programs. These programs focus on impaired driving, safety belt use, careless driving, construction zones, and intersection enforcement.



Commercial Vehicle Enforcement



“Motor carrier” is the term used to define commercial trucking in Michigan. The motor carrier officers assigned to the MSP Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division are responsible for commercial vehicle enforcement, including the enforcement of trucking safety laws and weight restrictions, investigating administrative and maintenance procedures of local trucking companies, and providing local school districts with school bus safety inspections. Motor carrier officers also play an important role in Michigan’s homeland security efforts by ensuring the safe transport of hazardous materials and by monitoring the state’s vehicle border crossings between the United States and Canada.

Addressing Crime



Detectives

The MSP provides investigative services in each of Michigan’s 83 counties. Based at each post, MSP detectives conduct investigations in specialized fields such as cold case homicides, serial killings, fraud, felonious assault, and criminal sexual assault.



Investigative Support Teams

The MSP has multiple investigative support teams stationed at various locations across the state. Their primary objective is to find and arrest the most serious offenders fleeing the law, who are responsible for 50 percent of all crimes committed. The teams also provide surveillance support to local law enforcement, narcotics teams, and detectives.



Hometown Security Teams

Each Hometown Security Team consists of one sergeant, four troopers, and one motor carrier officer. They concentrate on highway crime and enhanced traffic enforcement by augmenting local police services with visible patrols. Their goal is to saturate areas with enhanced police presence in an effort to reduce crime and improve public safety by reducing serious traffic accidents. Each Hometown Security Team also has the ability to rapidly assist local communities in times of crisis.



Specialized Investigators

Michigan Cyber Command Center

The Michigan Cyber Command Center (MC3) partners with agencies at the federal, state, and local levels, as well as private sector businesses to provide cyber audit, detection, and criminal investigative resources. The MC3 also provides information regarding current cyber trends to citizens, businesses, and government agencies, to aid in the prevention of cyber anomalies upon Michigan network infrastructures.

Computer Crimes Unit

The Computer Crimes Unit conducts computer forensic exams to acquire digital evidence and initiate online investigations. Investigation types include fraud, identity theft, child pornography, cyber stalking, gambling, and computer invasion.



Traffic Crash Reconstruction

The MSP provides internationally accredited traffic crash reconstruction specialists who create forensic crime scene diagrams and provide complete traffic crash reconstruction services to determine the cause of a traffic crash. They also provide expert testimony in criminal courts throughout Michigan.

Fraud Investigation Section

By creating teams solely responsible for investigating various types of fraud, sometimes known as “white collar crime,” the MSP has been proactive in responding to this growing crime trend. Detectives in the Fraud Investigation Section receive specialized training in multiple areas of fraud including identity theft, mortgage fraud, healthcare fraud, and Bridge Card fraud.



Tobacco Tax Unit

The Tobacco Tax Unit identifies, investigates, and assists in the prosecution of individuals and businesses who are in violation of the state’s Tobacco Products Tax Act.

Gaming Section

This section assists the Michigan Gaming Control Board (MGCB) with the licensing and regulation of the MGM, Motor City, and Greektown Casinos in Detroit. They also provide criminal enforcement and public safety at each facility, while working cooperatively with the Detroit Police Department Gaming Division and the security and surveillance departments of each casino.





Meth Investigation Team

The Meth Investigation Team has statewide responsibility for identifying and investigating those individuals involved in the use, possession, distribution, and manufacturing of methamphetamine. Team members are trained to safely dismantle clandestine drug labs and provide meth awareness training to public safety personnel around the state.

Fire Investigators

The MSP has trained fire investigators assigned to locations around the state who investigate the origin and cause of fires, as well as fire-related fraud. They also respond to hazardous materials incidents and requests for imminent hazard abatement.

Multijurisdictional Task Forces

The MSP supervises numerous multijurisdictional task forces. Each task force is staffed by a combination of state, county, local, and federal law enforcement officers. These teams build on interagency cooperation and coordination to conduct investigations into narcotics, violent crimes, fugitives, cold case homicides, and auto theft.

Specialized Teams

The specialized support services of the MSP reduce liability, costs, and risk to officers by providing local law enforcement agencies with highly trained, specialized response teams with high-tech equipment.

Operations Unit

The Operations Unit serves as the 24-hour command center for the MSP. This unit also maintains a communications network with other state and federal law enforcement agencies. The following resources can be activated by making a request to the Operations Unit.



Mobilization of Troopers

A rapid deployment of troopers is available for civil disturbances, disasters, and labor unrest.



Emergency Support Team

The Emergency Support Team (ES Team) was created to address highly dangerous and critical incidents facing law enforcement. Team members are specially trained to respond to and resolve extremely difficult and/or dangerous tasks in the areas of hostage rescue, barricaded gunmen, high-risk arrest, search warrant service, dignitary protection, public disturbances, ship/boat boarding, and counter terrorism.





Canine Unit

The Canine Unit assists with tracking wanted or missing persons, and buried or submerged bodies; detecting explosives, narcotics and accelerants; crime scene searches; crowd control; and the locating of property.



Aviation Unit

The Aviation Unit provides statewide aerial assistance with barricaded gunmen, hostage situations, and major fire/arson scenes; aerial assessment of natural disasters and civil disturbances; location of marijuana, drug labs, and auto chop shops; surveillance; search and rescue using forward-looking infrared (heat detection capability), night vision goggles, and night sun (night-time illumination capability).



Dive Team

The Underwater Recovery Unit provides year-round direct support with the recovery of drowning victims, submerged evidence and vehicles, underwater inspections, marine security, and sonar identification.



Bomb Squad

From improvised explosives to weapons of mass destruction, the highly trained members of the Bomb Squad assess, render-safe, and/or dispose of explosive materials and devices. Bomb Squad personnel utilize advanced techniques and state-of-the-art technology, including robotics, to safely handle explosives and reduce the risk to officers and the community. The Bomb Squad can help investigators identify a suspect through post-blast investigation including device reconstruction and component classification. Bomb Squad members also provide support to tactical and hazardous materials operations, as well as training in device recognition and safety for law enforcement and public entities.



AMBER Alert

Michigan's AMBER Alert system is a voluntary cooperative effort between law enforcement and the Michigan Association of Broadcasters to quickly publicize cases of abducted or endangered missing children. Requests from law enforcement agencies for an AMBER Alert are handled through the Operations Unit.

Support Services

Forensic Science Division

The MSP maintains seven forensic science laboratories across the state to provide easy access to evidence analyses, as well as timely response to crime scene investigation and processing. The Forensic Science Division provides the following services:

- Biology
- Bloodstream Pattern Analysis
- Controlled Substances
- Crime Scene Response
- Firearms/Toolmarks
- Latent Prints
- Questioned Documents
- Toxicology
- Trace Evidence



Biometrics and Identification Division

The Biometrics and Identification Division utilizes sciences and technologies that are critical to the future of criminal investigation. This division helps position the department as a leader in biometrics, following the model being established by the federal government. Michigan is the first state with this concentration highlighted within its organizational structure.



Audio/Video Analysis Unit



The Audio/Video Analysis Unit provides specialty assistance with the gathering of technical data and the analysis and/or clarification of recorded evidence for law enforcement agencies. Forensic audio/video analysis is the scientific examination, evaluation and/or comparison of audio/video in legal matters. The Unit's mission is to provide the court with the most accurate representation of what was recorded at the scene of a crime, in a fashion that is understandable at all levels.



Criminal Investigative Analysis Unit

The Criminal Investigative Analysis Unit provides crime scene assessment and can develop offender personality profiles. The unit acts as a statewide resource for investigators and helps local agencies develop interview and investigative strategies. This unit also maintains computerized files for sex-motivated crimes and homicides.



Forensic Artists Program

Forensic artists are available at various locations around the state for use in depicting criminal suspects and identifying unidentified human remains. Composite sketches of wanted suspects and two-dimensional and three-dimensional drawings of unidentified human remains can be found online at: www.michigan.gov/forensic_artists.

Michigan Intelligence Operations Center (MIOC) for Homeland Security

The MIOC, which is Michigan's 24-hour fusion center, collaborates with federal, state, and local public safety agencies for the purpose of sharing information. By managing the flow of information and turning intelligence into actionable knowledge, the MIOC supports law enforcement, public safety, and the private sector by collecting information, fostering collaboration, issuing alert notifications, and developing and sharing information. In 2011, a node to the MIOC was established in the Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) region, called the Detroit & Southeast Michigan Information & Intelligence Center (DSEMIIC). The DSEMIIC focuses on the six-county region in southeast Michigan by providing investigative assistance to law enforcement agencies with a nexus to the region. Together, the two centers work as a statewide intelligence network, encouraging and facilitating the free flow of information among law enforcement agencies, public safety partners, and the private sector.



Critical Infrastructure Protection Unit

The Critical Infrastructure Protection Unit within the MIOC provides support to the owners and operators of critical infrastructure and key resources throughout Michigan. The unit facilitates information sharing between private and public sector partners, produces special event and infrastructure assessments, compiles and analyzes suspicious activity reports, and monitors open source information for threats against critical infrastructure sites.

Traffic Services Section

The Traffic Services Section seeks to maximize traffic safety in Michigan by providing training, education, and traffic safety expertise to law enforcement and the general public. Areas of responsibility include statewide training in Datamaster (DMT), Preliminary Breath Test (PBT), advanced roadside impaired driving enforcement (ARIDE), administration of traffic control orders, radar/laser, and in-car camera technology. This section also offers expertise in child passenger safety, construction/work zone safety, and the Michigan Vehicle Code.

Behavioral Science

The Office of Behavioral Science serves department members and the law enforcement community by providing counseling services to help officers and family members cope with concerns about their job, marriage, family, or other aspects of their daily lives. Individual and family consultation settings allow the Office of Behavioral Science to diagnose problems, make recommendations, offer therapy, and do follow-up consultation. Services also include help with stress reduction, critical incident debriefing, trauma treatment, and chemical dependency assessment.

Communications Section

The Communications Section has oversight of the MSP Regional Communication Centers, management of the department's radio and mobile data computer inventory, training for all users of the Michigan Public Safety Communications System (MPSCS), and management of the department's cellular phones, wireless devices, land line phone systems, and data network.



Communications Support for Events

The Mobile Office Unit maintains a deployment-ready pool of radios and provides assistance in the development of communication plans in support of large-scale emergencies or planned community events. Two mobile command vehicles, a mobile office/shelter, and enclosed trailer are equipped with the technology to establish an on-scene, mobile command center.





MPSCS Training

The Mobile Office Unit provides specialized training to public safety agencies on the use of the MPSCS to ensure efficient and effective interoperable communication among responders.



Regional Communication Centers

The MSP Regional Communication Centers (RCC) are located in Lansing, Detroit, Gaylord, and Negaunee. The RCCs are staffed 24/7 with highly-trained telecommunicators to respond to requests from law enforcement and citizens for public safety assistance. RCC staff disseminate administrative messages, dispatch MSP specialty teams, and coordinate MSP personnel response and resources during large-scale events and mobilizations.

Information Technology

The MSP is a leader in statewide criminal justice records management and maintains the latest technological equipment for information sharing among law enforcement agencies.

Michigan Criminal Justice Information Network (MiCJIN) Portal

The MiCJIN Portal provides law enforcement agencies with access to multiple information services via a single Web portal. Available services include:



Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN)

The LEIN is a statewide computer-based network that provides local, county, state, and federal agencies with information about stolen property and vehicles, wanted and missing persons, criminal history, and gun registration files. The LEIN is linked to the National Crime Information Center, Michigan Secretary of State, Michigan Department of Corrections, other states, and Canada.




Automated Pistol Registration System (APRS)

The APRS interfaces with the LEIN to automate the issuance of required forms needed for purchasing pistols, issuing licenses, and providing safety inspection certificates. The APRS searches the National Crime Information Center, National Instant Check System, and the Corrections Management Information System.



Statewide Network of Agency Photos (SNAP)

The SNAP is a statewide system for electronic collection and dissemination of digital criminal images including mug shots, scars, marks, and tattoos. These images are available to law enforcement agencies across the state for use in digital lineups or facial recognition searches.





Michigan Digital Image Retrieval System (MiDIRS)

The MiDIRS provides law enforcement officers with a secondary photo source if a mug shot is unavailable or out of date. The MiDIRS utilizes a direct connection to the Secretary of State's Drivers License Photo database.



Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR)


The MICR program is a valuable crime-fighting tool that identifies when and where crime occurs, what form it takes, and the victims' and offenders' characteristics.

Live Scan

Live Scan is an electronic fingerprint capture system that allows law enforcement agencies to immediately identify a subject by comparing fingerprints taken at the point of arrest with millions of fingerprints in the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) file within minutes.



Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS)



The AFIS provides computerized comparison of crime scene fingerprints and booking prints against the state's master fingerprint repository. If the AFIS is unable to match a latent (crime scene) print during a database search, it stores the print in an unsolved file. As subsequent fingerprint cards are received and entered into the system, they are compared against the unsolved file. If a hit is made, the submitting agency is notified.

Sex Offender Registry

The MSP maintains the state's sex offender registry. The Michigan Sex Offender Registry became available in 1996, and was made accessible via the Internet in 1999. To view the registry, go to: www.michigan.gov/psor.

Internet Criminal History Access Tool (ICHAT)

The ICHAT provides citizens with an easy and quick way to access the state's criminal history records database. This service is free to nonprofit organizations for the purpose of conducting background checks. There is a nominal fee for the general public to query the system. To access the ICHAT, go to: www.michigan.gov/ichat.

Traffic Crash Purchasing System (TCPS)

The TCPS is an online tool that allows involved parties and insurance companies the convenience of purchasing crash reports online at www.michigan.gov/crash. The Web site saves law enforcement agencies countless personnel hours previously spent responding to these requests.

Traffic Crash Reporting System (TCRS)

The TCRS is the central repository for traffic crash data in Michigan. Crash data is gathered from law enforcement agencies statewide and shared with traffic safety stakeholders with the goal of reducing crashes, injuries, and fatalities. The TCRS Web site offers law enforcement free online tools to generate reports, view statistics, track data performance, and retrieve crash images for crashes throughout Michigan. For access to the Web site or for custom reports requiring complex queries, contact the Traffic Crash Reporting Section.

Emergency Management and Homeland Security

By Executive Order, the Director of the MSP serves as the State Director of Emergency Management and as the state's Homeland Security Director. The commanding officer of the Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (EMHSD) serves as the Deputy State Director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security.

Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (EMHSD)

The EMHSD provides assistance to local agencies for natural and man-made disasters, and serves as the state's liaison with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The EMHSD also maintains Michigan's Emergency Management Plan.



Emergency Management and Homeland Security Training Center

The Training Center provides comprehensive, cost-effective training courses for public and private individuals in hazardous materials response, technical rescue, terrorism response, and preparedness. The center also coordinates federal training offered by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. Courses are conducted at the facility in Lansing and at various locations throughout the state.



Planning, Training, and Exercising

The EMHSD strives to maintain and improve the state's emergency response capabilities through effective planning, training, and exercising. Courses covering a variety of topics are available to individuals at all levels of the emergency management process. A listing of courses can be found at www.michigan.gov/emhsd-training.



Michigan Homeland Protection Board

The Michigan Homeland Protection Board was created by Executive Order as an advisory body to the Governor within the MSP. This board develops, implements, and revises an effective and coordinated homeland security strategy focusing on the indications and warnings of threats; the identification and protection of critical infrastructure; and proper response to emergencies and health issues.



FEMA Grants

The EMHSD distributes the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG), which funds local programs to build a baseline capability in emergency management. The EMHSD also distributes the Hazardous Materials Emergency Planning (HMEP) Grant, which distributes fees collected from shippers and carriers of hazardous materials to fund hazmat training for emergency responders and hazmat planning for Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC).



U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Grants

The EMHSD works closely with local emergency management programs to secure federal homeland security funding in an effort to prepare and develop capabilities for a safe and effective response to a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or Explosive (CBRNE) event. Grant monies are distributed according to the State Homeland Security Strategy (SHSS) and as mandated by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.



State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC)

The EMHSD is responsible for maintaining the SEOC, which is the command-and-control center for use by the Governor, State Emergency Management Director, and state agency representatives in the case of a state-level emergency or disaster. The Joint Information Center is activated in support of the SEOC to disseminate information to the media and public during a disaster or emergency.




Prevention, Education, and Coordination

State Executive Security Division

The State Executive Security Division is comprised of the Executive Protection Section and the Capitol Security Section. The Executive Protection Section is responsible for the personal safety of the Governor, First Family, Lieutenant Governor, and visiting dignitaries. The Capitol Security Section is tasked with physical protection of the Capitol building and various other state-owned buildings in the greater Lansing area. They patrol the grounds on foot, bicycles, and in vehicles. Capitol Security Officers ensure that elected officials, the general public, and State of Michigan employees are safe in and around state-owned facilities. Members of the Capitol Security Section are responsible for criminal investigation where the venue is on State of Michigan property.



Training Academy



The MSP Training Academy offers numerous learning opportunities for the criminal justice community such as supervisor and leadership development; emergency, pursuit, and precision driving; marksmanship and ordnance training; use of force training; computer technology training; and detective and investigator programs. 


Precision Driving Unit

The Precision Driving Unit provides training to law enforcement agencies across the country in driving skills, safety, maintenance, and equipment. The unit also conducts annual testing and evaluation of patrol cars and vehicles submitted by auto manufacturers. The published results are available to law enforcement agencies throughout the world and assist auto manufacturers in the development of future police vehicles.



Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP)



The OHSP, as Michigan's designated State Highway Safety Office, administers federal and state highway safety funds and coordinates programs to reduce traffic crashes, injuries, and fatalities on Michigan roadways. The division offers no-cost specialized training to law enforcement officers, including Standardized Field Sobriety Training (SFST), Advanced Roadside Impairment Detection Enforcement (ARIDE), and Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) training. OHSP supports workgroups that provide information for implementing the Data-Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety (DDACTS). Certification training is also available to become a child passenger safety technician.

Through a Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor, a Cops in Court training program is offered along with expert technical assistance with matters relating to traffic laws. In partnership with AAA Michigan, the OHSP-supported Regional Traffic Safety Committees (TSC) allow local law enforcement, traffic engineers, and others interested in traffic safety to network and share resources and best practices to address local traffic safety problems and challenges.

The Michigan Traffic Crash Facts Web site at www.michigantrafficcrashfacts.org provides historical and statewide crash data and information and offers a query tool to conduct local, regional, and statewide crash data analysis to identify traffic crash problems. Traffic safety education efforts are supported by seat belt convincers located regionally across the state, as well as brochures, posters, and costumed characters, all available at no cost.

Grants and Community Services Division (GCSD)

The GCSD provides oversight and coordination of federal, state, and private grants available to criminal justice agencies and acts as the state administrator for the Byrne Justice Assistance Grant. The GCSD also includes the Auto Theft Prevention Authority and Prevention Services Unit.



Community Service Troopers (CSTs)

CSTs deliver community-based prevention services and programs. Each CST is trained in areas such as juvenile law and procedure; child abuse and neglect; domestic violence; crime prevention; missing children; Internet safety; and Teaching, Educating and Mentoring (TEAM). Auto Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA)

The ATPA, which was created in 1986, assesses the scope of the problem of automobile theft, analyzes various methods of combating the problem, establishes a plan for providing financial support to combat automobile theft, and provides grants for theft prevention teams. The ATPA also administers and coordinates multijurisdictional task forces to solve auto theft problems unique to specific geographical areas.



State 911 Office

The State 911 Office is responsible for coordination and oversight of the State 911 Dispatcher Training Program and funds; maintenance of centralized 911 data collection and reporting; compliance reviews and facilitation of best practice standards; statutory notices on state and local surcharges to communications providers, counties, and Public Safety Answering Points; and assistance to members of the public, industry, and all levels of government with questions on 911.
