The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has reviewed the results of a test run on your well water for PFAS. Your water was recently tested as part of the work the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) is doing to identify locations where per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are in well water near the (*site name*). Your water was tested because your home is near (*site name*).

Your water test results are found below:

Your water test showed a small amount of PFAS in your water. At this point, we do not know the extent of the contamination and are not certain the amount of PFAS chemicals in the groundwater will stay at low levels. While the environmental investigation is underway, MDHHS and (*LHD name*) are offering a filter to you for water uses where you might swallow your well water. These water uses include drinking, cooking, making baby formula or food, washing fruits or vegetables, and brushing your teeth. If you have pets, you could give them filtered water too.

Your results are below the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) lifetime health advisory level. The EPA set an advisory for two PFAS in drinking water, perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctane sulfonic acid (PFOS). The lifetime health advisory level is 70 parts per trillion (70 ppt or 70 ng/L) for PFOA and PFOS combined. The EPA has not set health advisory levels for other PFAS.

Getting water with PFAS on your skin will not harm you. PFAS do not absorb easily into the skin. You can bathe, do your dishes, launder your clothes, and clean with your water.

(*LHD name*) can provide you with a free filtration system. This filtration system is certified by NSF International to reduce PFOA and PFOS by 96 percent. Contact (*LHD Name*) at (*LHD Phone*) for a filtration system. You may install the system yourself, or (*LHD Name*) will arrange for a plumber to install it for you at no charge.

MDHHS along with local, state, and federal partners are reviewing the best available science on PFAS. MDHHS and *(LHD name)* will contact you if our recommendations change.

Several agencies are working on this issue, including:
