5	do roll call?
6	MR. DOSTINE: Sure. Rob Bovitz.
7	MR. BOVITZ: Here.
8	MR. DOSTINE: Joan Brophy.

10	MR. DOSTINE: Jeff Sykes.

12	MR. DOSTINE: You have quorum, Mr. Chair.
13	MR. SYKES: Thank you. All right. So, I will
14	entertain a motion to approve the agenda as presented.
15	MS. BROPHY: So moved.
16	MR. FLATEN: Mr. Chairman?
17	MR. SYKES: Yes sir?
18	MR. FLATEN: If I could, if I may
19	MR. SYKES: Absolutely.
20	MR. FLATEN: Something I would like added to the
21	agenda.
22	MR. SYKES: Okay.
23	MR. FLATEN: We have a letter from Mr. Wycoff
24	regarding special bonding council.
25	MR. SYKES: Oh yeah, okay.

1	MR. FLATEN: I'd like to have that added to the
2	agenda, and then when it comes up, we can discuss it.
3	MR. SYKES: All right, what part do you want to
4	do this? New business?
5	MR. FLATEN: Please.
6	MR. DOSTINE: That would be appropriate.
7	MR. SYKES: Okay.
8	MR. DOSTINE: First item under new business,
9	perhaps.
10	MR. SYKES: We'll do that as first item under
11	new business.

16	MR. SYKES: Okay. So we have a motion to add an
17	item to the agenda. All those in favor say aye. Aye.

22	MR. SYKES: The motion has passed. I'd like to
23	remind the audience that if they intend to speak during
24	the public portion, to come on up and sign in at the

1 Next is the approval of RTAB minutes from 2 September 13th, 2016. So I'll entertain a motion to 3 approve those minutes. 4 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 5 MS. BROPHY: Support. 6 MR. SYKES: Any further discussion? 7 (No response) 8 MR. SYKES: Seeing none, all those in favor of 9 the motion say aye. Aye. MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 10 11 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 12 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 13 (No response) 14 MR. SYKES: This motion too is passed. 15 Next item is old business, and I see that there 16 is none. So we will move on to new business. So first, 17 why don't we go ahead and start with the new item that was 18 just added? Would you like to discuss that issue 19 regarding bond counsel? 20 MR. FLATEN: Sure. Basically, the reason for 21 this request is that, I think you're all familiar with the 22 Downriver Utility Wastewater Authority? And we now have 23 our -- that group is putting together an agreement to buy

In order to buy that plant, it's going to have

the treatment plant from Wayne County.

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to be financed, and we will be selling bonds. And with this letter, we'd like to see here, by approving John Caymans, in a special bond counsel, is to review our entire financial situation, including debt and so forth. Any bonds that we have outstanding, and bonds that we may own.

We want to have all that reviewed, so that when it comes time for DUWA to put their prospectus together for the issuance of bonds, that our position will be such that it will not conflict with things that they would want to do. In order to sell the bonds, to take over the system.

Because what happens there is everybody's bond rating is going to be examined. And when it comes to ours, we want to make sure that ours is in -- we're in the best possible position, so there's no finger pointing later on, that the debt issues that DUWA would want to issue may, there may be a conflict generating from us. So we're protecting our position.

The other reason is, is that when you are a bond holder with the DUWA, you are an owner of the system.

That being an owner of the system, sure, you have the debt to pay, you've got operating costs, maintenance costs, asset acquisition costs to pay.

But if you're a non-owner of the system, in

1 other words, a customer of that system, there will be a 2 rate that you will pay, and there will be a surcharge on top of that rate, making the customer's cost greater than 3 4 what the owner's cost is going to be. That's the reason. 5 MR. SYKES: I think that's a pretty important 6

decision that needs to be made, and so it --

MR. FLATEN: They're getting ready to, you know, the letter will be approved, I believe, Thursday, to go to the county, to take the system over.

> MR. SYKES: Right.

MR. FLATEN: And then it'll be a matter of time, after that, when we'll start doing all the finance work to get the bonds together.

MR. SYKES: All right. Given that it's a pretty significant decision, it seems appropriate to bring in some outside expertise.

MR. FLATEN: I understand. This is coming to you this morning; there's a council meeting tonight. is all contingent upon your vote -- will be contingent upon what the council does tonight.

MR. SYKES: I appreciate that.

Okay, so I'll entertain a motion to approve the hiring of bond counsel.

MS. BROPHY: So moved.

MR. BOVITZ: Support.

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1 MR. SYKES: All right, any further comments? This is a disclosure; I have a 2 MR. BOVITZ: 3 personal relationship with Mr. Caymans; we both serve on 4 the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society board, so I don't know 5 if that affects my decision, but I just wanted to disclose 6 that. 7 MR. SYKES: Okay. Thank you for that. those who approve the motion to hire bond counsel say aye. 8 9 Aye. MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 10 11 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 12 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 13 (No response) 14 This motion has passed. MR. SYKES: 15 Next we have approval of resolutions and 16 ordinances for city council meetings. The first 17 resolution is from the regular city council meeting of 18 August 30th, 2016. I'd like to please note that 19 Resolution 267 was previously approved by this board. 20 with that, I'll entertain a motion to approve the 21 remaining resolutions from the August 30th meeting. 22 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 23 MS. BROPHY: Support. 24 MR. SYKES: Any further discussion?

1 MR. SYKES: Seeing none, all those in favor of 2 the motion say aye. Aye. 3 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 4 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 5 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 6 (No response) 7 MR. SYKES: All right, this motion is passed. Next is resolutions from the regular city council meeting 8 9 of September 13th. Again, I'd like to note that 10 Resolution 281 was previously approved by the board. So I'll entertain a motion to approve the remaining 11 12 resolutions from the regular city council meeting of 13 September 13th. 14 MR. BOVITZ: Well, with the exception of 15 Resolution 278.16 16 Oh, correct, yeah. So let's go MR. SYKES: 17 ahead and ask if Mr. Flaten can provide some additional 18 information to the board on the adoption of the new water 19 and sewer rates. 20 MR. BOVITZ: We can approve the minutes without the resolution, first, and then get, is it separate? 21 22 do --? 23 MR. SYKES: Okay, we can do that. 24 MR. BOVITZ: Okay, so my motion stands that

we'll entertain -- the motion will be to the remaining

1 resolutions, excluding the first one that you referenced, 2 was the 281.16, that was approved at the last meeting. 3 But the motion that is to approve the remaining 4 resolutions with the exception of 279.16, which is the 5 adoption of the new water rates. 6 MR. SYKES: All right, thank you. Thanks for 7 being clear on that. I'll support. 8 MS. BROPHY: 9 MR. SYKES: Okay. Any further discussion? 10 (No response) MR. SYKES: Seeing none, all those in favor of 11 12 the motion say aye. Aye. 13 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 14 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 15 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 16 (No response) 17 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed. 18 So we'll move to Resolution 279, which is the 19 adoption of the new water and sewer rates. So Mr. Flaten, 20 if you could provide some information to the board 21 regarding this? 22 MR. FLATEN: I'm going to defer to Tim to answer 23 those questions. 24 MR. SYKES: Okay. Okay. Thank you, Tim. 25 MR. SIDOWSKI: Water and sewer rates are

established by the city controller. I have set the rates based on current consumption citywide, and from U.S. Steel. Our largest user is U.S. Steel; that uses 54 percent of the city's metered sold gallons.

They have dropped their consumption by over one third. So when they, when you speak about your largest user dropping by a third, it affects your water and sewer rates. Because our fixed costs are so high now, due to Detroit Great Lakes Water Authority and our fixed costs for excess flow.

The ready to serve has increased, and you'll also know sewer has increased to compensate for those losses, because the fixed costs don't go away. So I have to increase the rate to pay for the fixed costs, due to the consumption at U.S. -- consumption loss at U.S. Steel.

Which they are aware of; they're not happy, but even though with the rate increase, they are paying, I believe, \$200,000 less than they would be paying this year. And when I showed them that on paper, I didn't get a response back, so, I guess they --

MR. SYKES: So now, are the rate increases for all individuals, businesses, everything alike?

MR. SIDOWSKI: Yes, how the rate is calculated is I take all the fixed costs, I take bond payments, appreciation, fixed -- all our fixed costs, and I divide

it by ready to -- Residential Equivalent Unit. And everybody pays the same Residential Equivalent Unit, which is about \$36 a quarter.

And, U.S. Steel pays a Residential Equivalent Unit for every 125,000 gallons of use. So theirs is almost 5,000 Residential Equivalent Units, when the rest of the city's only 3800 Residential Equivalent Units. So they get a big fixed charge because they're using most of the system.

And then, sewer increased because sewer costs are going up dramatically, and our fixed costs keep going up.

MR. SYKES: So, at a previous meeting, we had a discussion about the purchase of water, and then the ability to bill for that water, and that there is a loss, there's a significant loss of water? Is it the purchased water that's considered when determining the rates?

MR. SIDOWSKI: It is the purchased water that's considered determining the rates. The city bills 800 million gallons of water a year.

MR. SYKES: Right.

MR. SIDOWSKI: And it purchases 1.1 billion gallons a year, so it's losing 300 million gallons of water each year.

MR. SYKES: All right. So, that's another real

important reason why, in previous meetings where we've looked at meters, in trying to get our arms around that lost water, is to be able to keep these rates down. And finding where that lost water is going, it's got to be a big piece of that.

MR. SIDOWSKI: The city has found several water main breaks that have been dumping straight into the sanitary sewer system. I believe we've stopped two meter leaks in the pits at U.S. Steel, and three water mains. And our monthly consumption has dropped by ten million gallons a month, just on those five breaks.

MR. SYKES: Wow.

MR. SIDOWSKI: And I believe there's several more that the city knows about that they have stopped recently, and need to fix. And then, obviously, from that amount of water, it's not only residential, because residential only uses 15 percent of our billed gallons.

So it's not even possible to have a 300 million gallon leak on a residential side; it's got to be water sewer mains that are leaking directly into sanitary storm sewers, throughout the city. Water -- the infrastructure is so bad, it's just leaking.

MR. SYKES: Okay.

MR. SIDOWSKI: So.

MR. SYKES: Thank you. Do you guys have any

questions?

MR. BOVITZ: Well, the public hearing that we had a few months ago on the millage increase, they tried to put it in residential terms about what it will cost the average homeowner. Now, there's really no way to say what is the average homeowner here, because you're not going by square footage of the house or the property values; you're going by water consumption.

So at the public hearing on September 13th, did any of the come up? Was there any concern by residents about how much it would raise their bill?

MR. SIDOWSKI: There was -- not brought up by the residents; it was only passed four to two by the council. Two of the members believed the rates were too high already. Four of them said that if we didn't increase the rates, the city would not be able to pay its financial obligations and that was a no brainer, that you have to pay your obligations, and voted for the increase.

But the two that voted in dissent said that they were too high already. I believe I -- I know I've, in a rate proposal, I broke out what the quarterly rates, based on the national averages. A single person uses about, it costs about \$88 per quarter. And a two family is about \$100 a quarter.

MR. BOVITZ: So it's not that dramatic of an

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         increase, but the bulk of the bill's going to be paid by
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         industry, it sounds like?
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                  MR. SIDOWSKI: Bulk of the bills are paid by
        U.S. Steel.
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                  MR. BOVITZ: All right, so that would be the
         answer then, if residents would have a concern?
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                  MR. SIDOWSKI: Most of our residential goes
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        delinquent anyway, and we only collect about 25 percent of
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        what goes delinquent for water and sewer.
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                  MR. BOVITZ: Okav.
                  MR. SIDOWSKI: U.S. Steel pays for the water and
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        sewer system, ultimately. They don't go delinquent, they
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        pay on time.
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                  MR. SYKES: Any other questions?

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1 (No response) 2 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed. Next are claims and accounts from regular city council meeting 3 draft minutes, September 27th, 2016. I'll entertain a 4 5 motion to approve the claims and accounts from this 6 meeting. 7 MS. BROPHY: So moved. 8 MR. BOVITZ: Support. 9 MR. SYKES: Any further discussion? 10 (No response) Seeing none, all those in favor of 11 MR. SYKES: 12 the motion say aye. Aye. 13 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 14 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 15 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 16 (No response) 17 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed. So, next we 18 move onto the city administrator items. 19 First is the approval of city council minutes, 20 which was addressed in new business. Next, we have 21 approval of the budget to actual report of August, 2016. 22 I will say that it looks like this is caught up; 23 that's -- I really appreciate that, that's -- I think 24 that's a good -- thanks, Tim, I really do appreciate that.

So with that, I'll approve -- a motion to -- I'll

1 entertain a motion to approve the budget to actual report 2 for August, 2016. 3 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 4 MS. BROPHY: Support. 5 MR. SYKES: Any further discussion? 6 (No response) 7 MR. SYKES: Seeing none, all those in favor of 8 the motion say aye. Aye. 9 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 10 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 11 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 12 (No response) 13 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed. Next, we 14 have a number of items. Approval of Resolutions 260, 261, All of these items were addressed in new 15 and 262. 16 business, so we'll move on to the approval of Resolution 17 288, which is the municipal roofing project. 18 I'd point out that this item occurred during a 19 council meeting outside the normal review period of 20 today's board meeting. The city administrator is 21 requesting to bring this item forward to the board early. 22 Mr. Flaten, I see you're here already to talk about this. 23 I appreciate that. 24 It's a project that definitely MR. FLATEN:

needs to be done here. What we did, is we used a firm to

gather our specifications for the roofing project, which is a thermal ply solution, basically.

We sent out bid notices or specifications went out, under Eye Square, which is a company that reaches out to roofing companies, or contractors, and they carried our specs. We received nine proposals back; we had a pre-bid meeting first, so that they could see what the specs were. We invited them here, there were nine companies that came. One company left their specs on the table and left.

Eight of them took the specs, came back to us within two weeks with a bid. Only three companies did apply through submitting bids. We reviewed those bids, and we accept the bid of CEI, in the amount of \$265,000 and change.

The other bids were at 309, and one was at, I believe, three -- I got it -- the other bid, one was at, yeah, 265 was the major bid. Then there was one that came in at \$339,949, which included a ten percent contingency that we applied for that, just in case something may happen. The other one came in at \$360,000.

They also bid on doing the entire roof, but then they also broke it into four sections. The difference between CEI and the remain -- and the other two companies, was, their bid was the same whether they did the entire roof, or if they did in four sections.

1 CEI gave a discount to do the entire roof, and 2 then if they were to do it in sections, they also quoted prices per section. So it turned out to be that by 3 4 picking up CEI as our bidder, we saved some money. 5 The original budget included \$400,000 for 6 contract expense. So we're saving some money there. 7 I appreciate that. Thank you. MR. SYKES: 8 you guys have any other questions? 9 MR. BOVITZ: And so there's been experience 10 working with this company? They're reliable, and --? They are very reliable. We also 11 MR. FLATEN: 12 just, Bob, because you know downriver. Holbrook was one 13 of the other bidders. And he was the one that came in at the 339, that's with the ten percent on it. 14 15 MR. BOVITZ: So it was an honest bid? It was 16 actual, it wasn't someone just trying to get a contract, 17 right? 18 Right, no. Well, we had an attempt MR. FLATEN: 19 at that, but that individual was, you might say, shot 20 down. MR. BOVITZ: Well, low bidder's never the best 21 22 value. 23 MR. FLATEN: Well, this one didn't want to apply 24 the specifications that we had set aside. He said, why do

we, you know, he said, I can do it for less if I don't

have to adhere to your specs. He was told you can pick up your packet and go home. Which he did.

But yes, CEI is very reputable. Holbrook, I know from personal experience on other projects that I've done with him, he's very reputable. It's just, in their case, they were slightly higher than CEI.

And the other company's got a great reputation too. And I called around to different cities, where they had done work, and they are all recommended. It just came down to the low bid, that met total specs.

MR. BOVITZ: And just so you know, because you've only been here for a few months, but, the City of Ecorse, with its relationship with Wade Trim, and the Canon Associates, and Hennessy Engineers; these are all reputable companies, and I'm sure they're giving us the best value and the best price, too. And Rizzo, with the waste disposal.

MR. FLATEN: Right.

MR. BOVITZ: So let's just keep the goodwill going.

MR. FLATEN: Yeah, well, we're trying. I mean, when we take this -- it's always been, even in a prior life, you might say. It's always the thing with me on a bid, that they meet specs. And that you call around and check their references, and then you call some that may

1 have used them and didn't have a perfect reference from 2 them, but it wasn't a real blemish on their record, 3 either. 4 MR. SYKES: Well I'll say that was a great 5 question and even a better answer. I appreciate that, I really do. Anything -- do you have any questions? 6 7 MS. BROPHY: No. 8 MR. SYKES: Okay. Thank you. All right, I'll 9 entertain a motion to approve Resolution 288, the 10 municipal roofing project. MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 11 12 MS. BROPHY: Support. 13 MR. SYKES: All those in favor, say aye. Aye. 14 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 15 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 16 MR. SYKES: Opposed, the same. 17 (No response) 18 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed. Last is the 19 employee confidentiality agreement, and this was addressed 20 in new business. So with that, Patrick, can you check out 21 whether there's any public comment? 22 MR. DOSTINE: Okay, Mr. Chair, there are no 23 requests at this time, for public comment. 24 Thank you. Any board comment? MR. SYKES:
