6	First item, roll call. Let the record
7	reflect that we do have a quorum present. Also,
8	Dr. McMahan was unable to be here at the meeting this
9	afternoon. So, if there's no objection, I will ask
10	that he receive an excused absence for this afternoon's
11	meeting, without objection.
12	Item 2 is the approval of the agenda that was

15	MS. WALKER-GRIFFEA: No.
16	MR. McGHEE: I see none. I move approval of

18	MS. WALKER-GRIFFEA: Second.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: Without objection, the

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1	indicating that he disapproved of our decision to
2	cancel the November meeting.
3	And, Mr. Cline, when that when the minutes
4	are posted on our website, if you could make sure that,
5	on that particular page, that the word "counsel" is
6	stricken out and replaced with the word "cancel".
7	MR. CLINE: Yes, sir.
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: And indicate that that's a
9	correction based upon this afternoon's RTAB meeting.
10	Are there other corrections or additions to
11	the minutes of December 9th?
12	MR. McGHEE: Just one. As I look at the
13	attendees from the City, we have a Council Member,
14	Council Member Van Buren. And then in the "Others
15	Present", we have Eric Mays listed but he should be
16	recognized as a Council Member.

18	made as well.
19	MR. CLINE: Okay.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: Other corrections or

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: Those in Tavor, please say
2	"aye".
3	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Opposed?
5	The minutes of December 9 are approved as
6	corrected.
7	Item 2, Unfinished Business, I believe there
8	is none pending from prior meetings.
9	Item 3, New Business, Mayor and Council. I
10	don't see the mayor here.
11	MS. HENDERSON: The mayor will be unable to
12	attend. She is in a meeting right now that and she
13	cannot attend right now.
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay. Thank you.
15	Council President Nelson?
16	Good afternoon.
17	COUNCILMAN NELSON: Good afternoon, everyone.
18	Just so that I can touch on that, as well, first of
19	all, I'll thank the State for their assistance in our
20	distribution centers and we had local Council-people
21	support in that program, along with the Mayor and to
22	ensure that every household receive water. I
23	personally have been out there delivering water and
24	filters myself. So we want to thank each and every one
25	of our partners for helping us with that.

1	I want to thank Ms. Lundquist, Jody, and her
2	staff for the audit that was presented to us this week
3	and I think we will be presenting it to you also. But,
4	again, I had a senior City Council person that's been
5	on the Council for 30 years say he has never seen one
6	put together as they had presented the other night, in
7	his 30 years; it was on time and delivered to the
8	State. It was a very
9	You know, in banking, in my profession, I was
LO	thinking all this, that it was well put together and a
L1	lot of hard work went into that. I want to thank her
L2	and her staff for doing that, to make sure that we stay
L3	within the guidelines of where we're supposed to be.
L4	We do know there's still some challenges ahead of us
L5	but we're willing to hang in there and work together.
L6	And so I want to thank this RTAB for hearing
L7	us and working with us and the State and our partners.
L8	We're in this together and we thank you from the Flint
L9	City Council.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Council
21	President.
22	The next item would be the approval of
23	resolutions and ordinances from City Council meetings.
24	We'll begin with City Council meeting of December 14th.
25	We have, as Attachment 2, Resolutions 956 through

1	965.1. Any questions or comments about any of those
2	resolutions?
3	MR. McGHEE: I have none.
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: If not, is there a motion
5	that those resolutions be approved?
6	MR. McGHEE: So move.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: Is there support?
8	MS. WALKER-GRIFFEA: Second.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: Those in favor will please
10	say "aye".
11	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Opposed?
13	Motion is adopted.
14	Next is a resolution from Special City
15	Council meeting of December 30th, Resolution 967. I'm
16	going to ask either the City Administrator or the
17	Finance Director to give us the background on that
18	particular resolution.
19	MS. HENDERSON: As relates to that
20	resolution, what we can say is exactly what is in that
21	resolution. Because we this is pending litigation.
22	So, after coming out of the Executive Session, the
23	Council approved this. So, because this is a pending
24	litigation, what is in that resolution is the only
25	thing that I can give provide to you all at this

1	time.
2	However, at the next RTAB meeting, if this
3	has been resolved, we can discuss it at that time.
4	However, at this time, that's all I would be able to
5	say about it.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you.
7	Questions or comments regarding
8	Resolution 967?
9	Is there a motion, then, that Resolution 967
10	from the Special City Council meeting of December 30th
11	be approved?
12	MR. McGHEE: So move.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: Is there support?
14	MS. WALKER-GRIFFEA: Second.
15	THE CHAIRPERSON: If no discussion, those in
16	favor please say "aye".
17	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: Opposed?
19	Motion is adopted.
20	The next item is City Administrator Items.
21	Ms. Henderson?
22	MS. HENDERSON: I'd like to go ahead and
23	provide the update.
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you.
25	MS. HENDERSON: And this does appear online

1	as well.
2	And these are provided on the City's website.
3	This is the second quarter update. And I will go into
4	that but I just wanted to go ahead and provide that for
5	you all.
6	Some Administrative Items are that we
7	Pete Bade, who was the Chief Legal Counsel, he did
8	resign and he his last day was December 31st. So
9	Anthony Chubb has been appointed Interim Chief Legal
10	Counsel, Anthony Chubb right here, so that you all know
11	who he is.
12	And Charlie McClendon, he was serving as
13	well, Anthony Chubb was serving as interim HR Director,
14	also as Deputy Legal Counsel as well. So now he
15	strictly serves as the Interim Chief Legal Counsel.
16	And also, Charlie McClendon has been appointed as the
17	Interim Human Resources Director and this is
18	Mr. McClendon.
19	This is something that the Mayor and I worked
20	out, just for that interim period. So we're glad to
21	have them accept those positions and things are running
22	smoothly under their leadership in both of those
23	respective departments.
24	We presented the Capital Improvement Plan to
25	the Planning Commission last night. They have a review

1	period so they will be reviewing that and asking
2	questions about that for the next for over the next
3	two weeks, and then we should have that back. And that
4	is something that I will present to the RTAB, at which
5	time that is approved.
6	Also, we did provide the audit. Just as
7	President Nelson said before, staff really worked very
8	hard on that under the lead of Ms. Lundquist, as the
9	CFO. And we did not have any findings on this audit
10	and it was very a very good audit, and we would like
11	that to become the standard for the City of Flint. And
12	we're glad that we have someone leading that charge and
13	all the departments working together to make those
14	things happen.
15	And with the in the next RTAB meeting we
16	have we'll have Yeo & Yeo, who are the who is the
17	audit firm that conducted this audit, to come to the
18	RTAB meeting and present. And, at which time, you may
19	ask questions about the audit, if you have anything to
20	ask about that. So you have that.
21	Also, with the Financial Report, I will have
22	Ms. Lundquist to come up and answer any questions that
23	you may have about that. And then, also, I felt it was
24	important, with the dialogue of in the last meeting,
25	that I talk about some of the challenges that we are

1	racing, as far as with the the water as well.
2	One question that was was asked, I think
3	that was Dr. McMahan, about, like, when what are
4	what are the predictions, what are we facing
5	financially; but, basically, when would cash be
6	depleted if we continue how we're going at this point
7	even with the previous decision of Judge Hayman, that
8	we are able to charge the rates that we have, that we
9	had set before, and, then, also, we can issue shutoff
10	notices at this time, of which we have not, however,
11	that is, we're in discussion about that, at this point.
12	The projected date, if cash flows are the
13	same, meaning if we have the same amount of customers
14	that are paying their bills, which is, of course, low
15	at this point, and then we're also billing
16	approximately \$617,000 less per month on the
17	water/sewer bills because the water/sewer bills, you
18	pay that in one bill.
19	With all of that, we project that, in
20	December of 2016, if things continue and there is not a
21	significant change, that we would be out of cash in
22	those funds, and which would be Fiscal Year 2017, and
23	that would be the second quarter.
24	We are working on a number of things with the
25	Mayor, with of course within the Finance Department,

1	with the CFO, we're working on things. We are still
2	we still continue to be under a spending freeze as
3	well, so we are taking the necessary steps to try to
4	see if we can lengthen that time out or, even, we are
5	asking for some things from the Governor. The Mayor is
6	spearheading that. And we are getting a lot of the
7	information, things that could help us with that.
8	But that those are our projections so I
9	wanted to put that on the record because that question
10	did come up.
11	So, at this time, if you have any specific
12	questions about the Budget to Actual. And then I have
13	asked Ms. Lundquist to even provide more information
14	and I did present to you the Strategic Plan Update and
15	I also included information about the financials in
16	there and anything that
17	And a lot of the accomplishments and
18	challenges that we face with with the Water and
19	Sewer Fund, with any of the other departments, some of
20	the things, that we have a lot of those wins as well.
21	So it's not just about the Water Fund, the Police
22	Department, the Fire Department, Planning Department;
23	we have updates on all of those things and there are
24	some accomplishments, so I would like those to be
25	recognized as well.

1	So, at this point, I would ask Chair if I
2	could have Ms. Lundquist to come up and answer any
3	questions about the Budget to Actual Report and to add
4	some in some financial information to what I've just
5	stated to you as an overall picture of when the water
6	and sewer fund would not have cash, if things continue
7	as they are now, even with the judgment that we have in
8	place now. Thanks.
9	MS. LUNDQUIST: Good, afternoon. As the
10	City Administrator had alluded to, the City's finances
11	are continuing to be impacted by the Preliminary
12	Injunction Order that was issued by the
13	Honorable Judge Archie Hayman, that was voted upon by
14	both Council and the RTAB with the amendment of the
15	First Quarter Budget or the First Quarter Budget
16	Amendment, rather.
17	Our collections have been made down. We've
18	had a perfect storm of events. At this point, prior to
19	the lead water issue becoming such a public media
20	event, we were already impacted, financially, by the
21	water main lawsuit. As I said, that has been reflected
22	in the First Quarter Budget Amendment, it continues to
23	be an issue and is only exacerbated now by the
24	reduced further reduced rate in collections as a
25	result of public opinion about the lead water issue.

So it's tremendously unfortunate, we had
under the Preliminary Injunction Order, we were going
to be able to do shutoff noticing in November when the
September reduced rates become delinquent. So we did
issue our first round of shutoff notices in the middle
of November to the beginning of December, and those
were then due during the month of December.

We had only issued that one round of shutoff notices before postponing further processing as a result of the holidays. So that was both from consideration of City staff and our ability to process those shutoffs and the need of staff for those nonpayments. But, also, with regard to our citizens and our customers and the holiday season, we had postpone we would have otherwise resumed billing the first of the year. As far as doing that, obviously, that's a policy issue, so what was already a difficult situation that was made worse by the main water crisis that the City of Flint is facing.

We continue to be impacted by the reduced rates that happened and were implemented after the Preliminary Injunction Order that has not been amended, that will allow the City to charge our rates, as they were initially adopted, per the '15/'16 budget and Emergency Manager Order. Those have not yet gone into

1	effect but we do now have the authority to do so with
2	the signing of the Emergency Order which occurred on
3	Wednesday.
4	The cost of the funds, I have to commend the
5	City staff and the tremendous leadership we have with

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е City staff and the tremendous leadership we have with our Executive Team here in managing the budgets and being considerate of the financial position because, although not all of the funds are impacted by both the lawsuit and the water crisis, it's all connected. You know, we're all in this together. So I do commend them for that.

The impact of the water crisis is tremendous. It will create a tremendous need for resources. Financially, for us to be able to move forward with the infrastructure it appears that would need to be done to attenuate to the lead pipes and whatnot and the service lines. But we have to also be mindful that we have to continue to provide services.

So one of the items that is addressed in the water rate lawsuit, is the revenue bond. So the City is still required to charge rates and to set them at such a level that we can maintain the operation and maintenance of the system, as we meet our obligations, which we do have in the water fund.

So I would continue to encourage all of our

1	consumers to pay their bills and to be mindful that we
2	do keep a watchful eye on that. And then, regardless
3	of the water crisis, we have a sewer system that is not
4	impacted at all, you know, water in and water out, so
5	those that are flushing their toilets, that has to go
6	somewhere. And the City has to operate their sewer
7	system and that is a substantial portion of everyone's
8	benefit because water and sewer are together on each
9	monthly bill.
10	I thank you for your time today. I'd be
11	happy to answer any questions but I just wanted to give
12	you an overview of the fact that we are working to make
13	sure that we are able to meet State Statute guidelines
14	when it comes to driving the Bond Act and the Budget
15	and County Act.
16	And we're very proud of the Fiscal Year
17	'15/'16 Audit and the fact that it really should be
18	applauded, all of the hard work that was done by City

'15/'16 Audit and the fact that it really should be applauded, all of the hard work that was done by City staff, the leadership of the City Manager and the City Administrator in reducing those costs and in creating a structurally balanced budget.

We were always facing hard work, come Fiscal Year '18. Initially, prior to my arrival, Fiscal Year '17 had been discussed as a difficult year. When the budget will become, again, structurally imbalanced, we

1	have to keep, always, in mind that, for financial	
2	prudence, we estimate expenditures will increase and	
3	revenues will remain stagnant, at best.	
4	With everything that the City now is facing,	
5	I think, even assuming that revenues will remain	
6	constant is overly optimistic. So that not only when	
7	we praise our tough decisions for Fiscal Year '18, when	
8	we will be facing a millage renewal and whatnot, those	
9	decisions will have to be faced collectively by the	
10	staff, Council and Mayor and the RTAB for those.	
11	Thank you.	
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Questions for either the	
13	City Administrator or Ms. Lundquist?	
14	If there's no objection, we'll consider those	
15	reports to be received. I did note that I mean, I	
16	understand we're in a litigious society but I didn't	
17	understand how litigious until I saw listed here under	
18	the Law Department the case of Bigfoot versus the City	
19	of Flint. It appears that the City of Flint won, so	
20	congratulations.	
21	MR. CHUBB: Thank you.	
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: Next item is	
23	Public Comment.	
24	Mr. Cline, any	
25	MR. CLINE: No, we don't.	

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: one sign up for
2	Public Comment?
3	MR. CLINE: No, sir.
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Is there any further
5	business before this Board?
6	If not, is there a motion that we adjourn?
7	MR. McGHEE: So move.

RESOLUTION 2016-1

AMENDING EMERGENCY MANAGER ORDERS No. 3 AND No. 20

WHEREAS, Section 23(1) of Public Act 436 of 2012, the Local Financial Stability and Choice Act (the "Act"), provides that "[b]efore removing a local government from receivership, the governor may appoint a receivership transition advisory board to monitor the affairs of the local government until the receivership is terminated"; And

WHEREAS, Section 23(2) of the Act provides that "[a] receivership transition advisory board shall consist of the state treasurer or his or her designee, the director of the department of technology, management, and budget or his or her designee, and, if the local government is a school district, the superintendent of public instruction or his or her designee. The governor also may appoint to a receivership transition advisory board 1 or more other individuals with relevant professional experience, including 1 or more residents of the local government"; And

WHEREAS, Section 23(5)(h) of the Act authorizes a receivership transition advisory board to perform, in addition to duties specified in the Act, "any other duties assigned by the governor at the time the receivership transition advisory board is appointed"; And

WHEREAS, on April 29, 2015, the Governor appointed a Receivership Transition Advisory Board for the City of Flint (the "Board"). The Governor's appointment letter authorized

the Board to, among other things, "[r]ecommend amendments, modifications, repeal, or termination of Emergency Manager Order No. 20, or any other Flint Emergency Manager orders, to the State Treasurer."

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board as follows:

- 1. That it be recommended to the State Treasurer that Flint Emergency Manager Order No. 3 be amended to add a Paragraph 33 to read as follows:
 - 33. (1) Notwithstanding any provision of this Order to the contrary, but subject to any limitations contained in the City's charter, the Mayor is authorized to appoint a City Administrator and the head of each Executive Department of the City government (collectively the "Appointed Positions"), all of which appointees shall serve at the pleasure of the Mayor.
 - (2) Within 30 calendar days of a vacancy occurring in an Appointed Position, the Mayor shall submit in writing to the Board for its review and approval the minimum professional or occupational qualifications to be utilized by the Mayor to select a suitable interim or permanent appointee for the Appointed Position and the minimum and maximum salary range for the Appointed Position. Approval by the Board of minimum professional or occupational qualifications and the minimum and maximum salary range shall be conditions precedent to the exercise of the Mayor's authority to select an interim or permanent appointee for an Appointed Position.
- 2. That Paragraphs 15 through 20 of Flint Emergency Manager Order No. 3 be repealed.
- 3. That Paragraph 4(b), provisions 1), 3), and 4) of Flint Emergency Manager Order No. 20 be repealed.
- 4. That the continuing effect of the amendments to Flint Emergency Manager Order No. 3 and Flint Emergency Manager Order No. 20 contained in this Resolution are subject to disapproval and rescission by the Board within 90 days after the effective date of this Resolution.
- 5. That the minutes of the Board meeting at which this Resolution is adopted take notice of the adoption of this Resolution.

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- 6. The State Treasurer may approve this Resolution by executing a counterpart copy separate from that approved by the Board, each of which copies when executed shall be deemed an original, but all of which when taken together shall constitute one and the same Resolution.
- 7. This Resolution shall have immediate effect.
