

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

**LEASE FOR PRIVATE PROPERTY**

M-61, Gladwin, MI 48624. The Lease is effective upon obtaining State Administrative Board approval and required signatures. The annual per square foot rental rate for this space beginning August 1, 2022, is \$5.10 (\$850.00 per month). This rate does not include gas, water and sewer, janitorial services and supplies, snow removal, the replacement of tubes and bulbs or dumpster service. This Lease contains one 5-year renewal option with an annual per square foot rental rate of \$5.58 (\$930.00 per month). This Lease contains a Standard cancellation clause with 90-days' notice. The Attorney General has approved this Lease as to legal form.

**Purpose/Business Case:**

This new Lease will provide space for the DNR to store their equipment.

**Benefit:**

This Lease will allow for the DNR to continue to have garage storage space in the Gladwin area; as they are no longer able to remain in the space they currently occupy. The rental rate is within current market rates for comparable space.

**ADDENDUM TO SUB-LEASE FOR PRIVATE PROPERTY**

11. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY, BIG RAPIDS - Addendum No. 1 to Sub-Lease No.11466-2013 approved by the State Administrative Board on December 17, 2013, between Michigan Works! West Central, as Sub-Lessor, and the State of Michigan by the Department of Technology, Management & Budget for the Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity as Sub-Lessee, for 4,239 square feet of space located at 14330 Northland Drive, Big Rapids, MI 49307. This Addendum provides for adding an additional 5-year renewal option at the same current rate. This Addendum is effective upon obtaining State Administrative Board approval and required signatures and continues to the termination date of December 31, 2026, or any extension. The annual per square foot rental rate for this space beginning January 1, 2022, is \$13.42 (\$4,740.62 per month). This rental rate includes all public utilities and janitorial. This Lease contains an Either-Party cancellation clause with 120-days' notice. The Attorney General has approved this Addendum as to legal form.

**Purpose/Business Case:**

The purpose of this Addendum is to renew the sub-lease for an additional five years at the same existing rental rate.

**Benefit:**

There will be no need to consider relocating and/or spending money to relocate. Rental rate stays the same and is within current market rates for comparable space.

**CONVEYANCE OF SURPLUS STATE REAL PROPERTY**

12. THE DEPARTMENT OF TECHNOLOGY, MANAGEMENT & BUDGET (DTMB) recommends the conveyance of the surplus and vacated real property known as

the former MSP L'Anse Post property to Roza Business Services, Inc, a domestic for-profit corporation, located at 48823 Fourth Street, Dollar Bay, MI 49922 in consideration of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars and 00/100 (\$55,000.00). Roza Business Services, Inc. has already made a down payment of Five Thousand, Five Hundred and 00/100 Dollars (\$5,500.00) towards the purchase price. The subject consists of a vacant building of 1,940 SF sited on two parcel which are approximately .29 acre in area combined and are further described below. The Office of the Attorney General has approved the quitclaim deed as to legal form.

## Legislative Background

2016 Public Act 512 (the "Act") authorizes the Department of Technology, Management, and Budget to convey the former MSP L'Anse Post Property which is legally described as follows:

Parcel 1: A parcel of land located in the Village of L'Anse, Michigan, starting at the Iron Pin marking the S.E. Corner of the N.W. 1/4 of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 9, T 50 N, R 33 W, thence N 0° 18' W 883.1 feet to a point on the tangent of U.S. 41, thence S 44° 18' 30" E 750 feet, thence N 44° 18' 30" E 75 feet to the point of beginning, thence N 44° 18' 30" E 125 feet, thence S 44° 18' 30" E 75 feet, thence S 44° 18' 30" W 125 feet, thence N 44° 18' 30" W 75 feet to the point of beginning, containing approximately 0.22 acres more or less.

Parcel 2: A parcel of land located in the Village of L'Anse, Michigan, Part of the S1/2 of the NE1/4 of the NW1/4, Section 9, T50N, R33W. Described as follows: Commencing at the SW corner of said NE1/4 of the NW1/4, Sec. 9; thence N0°-18'W a distance of 883.1 ft; thence S 44°-18'30"E a distance of 750.0 ft; thence N45°-41'-30"E a distance of 200.0 ft; thence S 44°-19'E, a distance of 15 ft. to the P.O.B. of described parcel; thence N 45°-41'E a distance of 48.5 ft; thence S 44°-19'E a distance of 17.4 ft; thence S89°-19'E, a distance of 18.0 ft; thence S 0°-18'W a distance of 42.0 ft; thence S 45°-41'W a distance of 31.7 ft; thence N 44°-19'W a distance of 60.0 ft. to the P.O.B. Described parcel contains 0.07 acres more or less.

All subject to restrictions, reservations, rights-of-way and easements of record.

The property description is approximate and is subject to adjustment as the State Administrative Board or Attorney General considers necessary by survey or other legal description. The conveyance includes all surplus, salvage, and scrap property or equipment as of the date of the Act.

The state shall not reserve oil, gas, or mineral rights to the Property; however, if the purchaser or any grantee or any successor develops any oil, gas, or minerals, they shall pay the state ½ of the gross revenue generated from the development.

The net revenue received from the sale of the Property must be distributed as follows:  
100% General Fund.

**Purpose/Business Case**

This conveyance satisfies all requirements and other criteria set forth in 2016 P.A. 512 which authorizes it. The subject property was offered for sale via a competitive Request for Proposals (RFP) process managed by the DTMB Real Estate Division. Rosa Business Services, Inc.'s offer for the subject property is consistent with its fair market value as determined by an independent fee appraisal less the estimated value impact of subsequent, ongoing and significant water damage to the building. The offer is also consistent with the terms of the RFP.

**Benefit**

This conveyance earns \$55,000.00 in revenue for the General Fund, less DTMB's expenses for closing, marketing, surveying and appraising the property. It also relieves the Dept. of Michigan State Police of all liability and responsibility for the property. Finally, this conveyance returns the property to local property tax rolls for the first time since 1937 for parcel 1 and since 1971 for parcel 2.

**Risk Assessment**

Failure to approve this sale would preclude the opportunity for the State to end its ownership obligations for the subject property which is surplus to the State's needs and prevent it from being returned to productive private sector reuse.

**Commitment Level:**

The proposed conveyance of this surplus property is by quit claim deed approved for use by the Office of the Attorney General and would be permanent.

**Risk Assessment:**

There is no known risk to the State associated with this conveyance of surplus property.


