The purpose of this modification is to provide additional investigation, monitoring and site restoration to address environmental contamination. The site consists of residential properties but is bordered by a facility with a confirmed leaking underground storage tank (UST) system. Releases from the former UST system have impacted residential drinking water wells. The agency conducted a pilot study and concluded that additional efforts are needed to address impacts on a residential drinking water well and soil vapor risk evaluation. This work includes select residential well replacement; sampling of select groundwater monitoring wells bi-annually for 5 years; installation/sampling of 4 soil gas wells; collection of soil gas samples for 4 quarters; repairs to select monitoring wells; well abandonment; site restoration; and reporting. The work is needed to protect public health, safety, welfare, and the environment.

### LEASE FOR PRIVATE PROPERTY

17. DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES, NEWBERRY – Renewal Lease No. 11041-2019 with the County of Luce, 407 West Harrie Street, Newberry, Michigan 49868, as Lessor, and the State of Michigan by the Department of Technology, Management & Budget for the Department of Natural Resources, as Lessee, for 19,625 square feet of land located at 5340 Co Rd 399, Newberry, MI 49868. The Lease is effective upon obtaining State Administrative Board approval and required signatures. The annual rental rate for this space beginning January 1, 2021, is \$375.00. This rate does not include public utilities, trash removal, or building maintenance. This Lease contains four 5-year renewal options with annual rental rates of \$380.00, \$385.00, \$390.00, and \$395.00 respectively. This Lease contains a Standard cancellation clause with 90- days' notice. The Attorney General has approved this Lease as to legal form.

#### **Purpose/Business Case:**

The purpose of renewing this ground lease is to maintain and secure use of the land underneath an airplane hangar that is owned by the Department of Natural Resources.

#### **Benefit:**

The use of this land supports the Department's aeronautical programs in the Upper Peninsula. This lease further encourages the Department's partnership with the local units of government.
