Contracting with the Federal Government

The statutory goals:

- 23% of all prime and subcontracts for small businesses (SB)
- 12% of prime and subcontracts for small disadvantaged businesses (SDB) including 8(a)
- 5% of prime and subcontracts for woman owned small businesses (WOSB/EDWOSB)
- 3% of prime and subcontracts for Historically Underutilized
 Zone small businesses (HUBZone SB)
- 3% of prime and subcontracts for service-disabled veteranowned small businesses (SDVOSB)



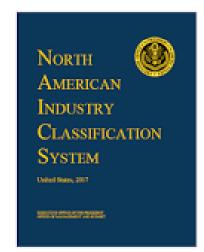
Are You a **Small** Business?

- For your small business to serve as a prime contractor or subcontractor, you'll need to legally qualify as a small business and register as a government contractor
- What Determines "small"? (First Criteria)
 - Only SBA determines size
 - A business entity organized for profit, located in the United States, and which operates primarily within the U.S
 - Or which makes a significant contribution to the U. S.
 economy through the payment of taxes or use of
 American products, material or labor (13 CFR Part 121)



Are You a **Small** Business?

- What Determines "small"? (Second Criteria)
 - North American Industry Classification
 System Code (NAICS Code)
 - http://www.sba.gov/size/
 - Manufacturer or Wholesaler = Number of Employees
 - Services = Annual Gross Sales

- SBA Hubzone set asides
- SDVOSB set asides
- WOSB/EDWOSB set asides

Self Certifications and pre certifications

- Women-owned small businesses (pre certify)
- Economically disadvantaged woman owned (pre certify)
- Small disadvantaged business (self certify)
- Service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses (pre certify)
- HUBZone program participants (pre certify)
- 8(a) Business Development Program (pre certify)



SBA 8(a) Business Development Program



What? The SBA's 8(a) Business Development program helps eligible socially and economically disadvantaged individuals grow their businesses through one-on-one counseling, training workshops, matchmaking opportunities with federal buyers, and other management and technical guidance.

Why? To help provide a level playing field for small businesses owned by socially and economically disadvantaged people or entities, the government limits competition for certain contracts to businesses that participate in the 8(a) Business Development program.



8(a) Program Qualifications

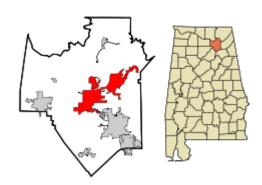
- Be a small business.
- Not already have participated in the 8(a) program
- Be at least 51 percent owned and controlled by U.S. citizens who are economically and socially disadvantaged
- Be owned by someone whose average adjusted gross net worth of \$850,000 or less
- Be owned by someone with \$4 million or less in assets
- Have the owner manage day-to-day operations and also make long-term decisions
- Have all its principals demonstrate good character
- Show potential for success and be able to perform successfully on contracts



HUB*Zone* Program

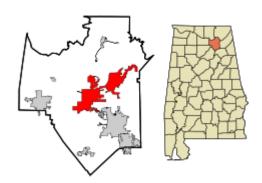
Historically Underutilized Business Zone Eligibility

- Small business (principal office) located in a HUBZone
- www.sba.gov/hubzone
- At least 51% owned & controlled by U.S. citizen/s
- At least 35% employees reside in a HUBZone
- Verified in www.sam.gov and Dynamic Small Business Search



Benefits of the HUB Zone Program

- Sole source contracts if the contract is under \$4.0M for service businesses and under \$6.5M for manufacturing businesses
- Restricted competition Any dollar amount and if there are two or more bids
- 10% price evaluation preference in free and open competition



Women-Owned Small Business Federal Contract Program

The Women-Owned Small Business (WOSB) program authorizes contracting officers to set aside certain federal contracts for eligible:

- Women-owned small businesses (WOSBs)
 or
- Economically disadvantaged womenowned small businesses (EDWOSBs)



Requirements for WOSB and EDWOSB Set Asides

Contracting officers may set aside contracts for WOSBs and EDWOSBs if they meet the following requirements

	WOSB Set Aside	EDWOSB Set Aside
Industries	 NAICS code assigned to solicitation, IFB or quote is in an industry in which WOSBs are substantially underrepresented 	 NAICS code assigned to solicitation, IFB or quote is in an industry in which WOSBs are underrepresented
Rule of two	 Contracting officer has reasonable expectation that 2 or more WOSBs will submit an offer * Note: All EDWOSBs are WOSBs 	 Contracting officer has reasonable expectation that 2 or more EDWOSBs will submit an offer * Note: Not all WOSBs are EDWOSBs
Award price	Contract can be awarded at fair market price

Eligibility Requirements for WOSBs

- Meet small business size standard for primary NAICS code and contract
- At least 51% unconditionally and directly owned by women who are
 U.S. citizens*
- The woman must manage the day-to-day operations
- The woman must make the long-term decisions for the business
- A woman must hold highest officer position
- The woman must work at the business full-time during normal working hours
- No minimum amount of time the business has been operational



Eligibility Requirements for EDWOSBs

Same requirements as WOSBs plus:

- Personal net worth is less than \$850,000 excluding:
 - Ownership in business and primary personal residence
 - Income reinvested or used to pay taxes of business
 - Funds reinvested in IRA or other retirement account*
 - Transferred assets within two years if to or on behalf of immediate family member for select purposes
- Adjusted gross income average over three years is \$450,000 or less excluding income reinvested or used to pay taxes of business
- Fair market value of assets is \$6.5 million or less excluding funds reinvested in IRA or other official retirement account



WOSB program certification

- There are two ways to certify for the WOSB program
 - Pre-Certify with SBA with supporting documents
 - Free, no cost
 - Register in SAM as WOSB or EDWOSB
 - Compile and upload all required documents to the repository
 - WOSB.Certify.sba.gov
 - Third-Party Certification with supporting documents
 - Register in SAM as WOSB or EDWOSB
 - Obtain certification from an SBA-approved Third-Party Certifier
 - Compile and upload all required documents to the repository
 - Represent status in SAM.gov
