ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE FOR GROWERS AND PROCESSORS OF MARIJUANA

GUIDANCE

In order to protect Michigan's environment, marijuana growing and processing operations may be subject to Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) regulations. The following is a summary of environmental regulations that apply to cannabis cultivation and processing. It is the responsibility of the licensee to comply with all regulations applicable to a grower's/processor's operations.

AIR

- <u>Permit to Install (PTI)</u> Every stationary source of an air pollutant is required to obtain an approved PTI *before* installing equipment. Some exemptions may apply. Go to <u>Michigan.gov/Air</u> then choose "Permits."
- <u>Renewable Operating Permit (ROP)</u> A ROP is required if your activity or process has the
 potential to emit at or above the major source threshold for any air pollutant. Visit
 <u>Michigan.gov/Air</u> (Permits) for more information.

MATERIALS MANAGEMENT

Permits, Licenses, Authorizations, Registrations, and Handling Procedures: Depending on the character and volume of waste generated, you may require a permit, license, or registration, and be subject to strict handling procedures for the following types of waste from your operations.

- Solid Waste Marijuana (cannabis) waste that is not a hazardous waste and does not
 release liquids can be incinerated at an approved facility, sent to a licensed municipal solid
 waste landfill after [insert LARA requirements], or composted at an approved site. A list of
 registered compost sites can be found at Michigan.gov/EGLECompost.
- Hazardous Wastes Items like grow bulbs, batteries, cleaning or extraction chemicals, plant
 debris contaminated with certain extraction chemicals (for example butane, alcohol, etc.),
 and pesticides are typically subject to strict management requirements under the hazardous
 waste regulations. For more information, please go to Michigan.gov/EGLEWaste, choose

- Liquid Industrial By-Products Michigan regulates non-hazardous liquid waste, separately
 from solid waste and hazardous waste. To learn more about those regulations, visit

 Hazardous Waste and Liquid industrial By-products Transport – The off-site shipment of hazardous waste and liquid industrial by-product requires a registered and permitted transporter. To find an authorized transporter, go to Michigan.gov/EGLEWaste, then choose "Transporters."

WATER

Depending on where you are constructing your facility and what your water body impact or water use may be, there are water regulations and permits required for marijuana growing and processing operations, including:
