Crayfish of Michigan


- Michigan has eight native, and two invasive crayfish species.
- Crayfish are also known as crawdads, crawfish and mudbugs.
- They are freshwater crustaceans found in lakes, rivers and even burrows underground.
- Crayfish are important prey for many fish, birds and mammals.
- One of the major threats to our ecosystems is the introduction of invasive crayfish.
- Invasive crayfish are often spread when released from aquariums, bait buckets and seafood boils.







- It is illegal to have live red swamp crayfish, common yabby crayfish, and marbled crayfish in Michigan.
- Rusty crayfish may be collected for personal use, but not commercially taken, possessed or sold.
