**Executive Summary:**

Section 221 of Public Act 121 of 2024 requires the following:

*Sec. 221. (1) Grants supported with private revenues received by the department are appropriated on receipt and may be expended by the department for the purposes specified within the grant agreement and as permitted under state and federal law.*

*(2) Not later than 10 days after the receipt of a private grant appropriated in subsection (1), the department shall notify the chairpersons of the subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office of the receipt of the grant, including the fund source, purpose, and amount of the grant.*

*(3) The amount appropriated under subsection (1) must not exceed \$4,000,000.00.*

Pursuant to these requirements, this report has been prepared and issued electronically to the House and Senate appropriations standing committees to meet the no later than 10 days after the receipt of a private grant reporting requirements. ## **FY 2025 Private Revenue Report Michigan Qualified Interpreter Program Census**

The Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) received a grant of \$40,000 to identify the need for qualified interpreters (QIs) within the Deaf, DeafBlind, Hard of Hearing, and Deaf Disabled communities. The department plans to conduct a statewide survey expected to launch next year.

LARA received the grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund, which approved [65 grants](#) totaling \$13,776,934 at its November Board meeting. The Health Fund works to improve the health of Michigan residents, with a special focus on children and older adults, while reducing the cost of health care. The grant money LARA is receiving is part of a multi-phase project that will assess the needs of the communities, where QI service gaps exist, and how the department can better address the needs within these communities.

The planning phase of the survey has already begun, and LARA's Bureau of Community and Health Systems will distribute the survey across the state in early 2025. Focus groups and interviews will then be conducted, both in person and virtually. Data from the survey and interviews will ultimately be analyzed to determine how many QIs may be needed in certain communities. The survey will be designed for both English and American Sign Language.
