The Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity's Michigan Rehabilitation Services (MRS) is a state network of vocational rehabilitation professionals developing creative, customized solutions that meet the needs of program-eligible individuals with disabilities and businesses.

MRS works with local programs, intermediate school districts and regional educational services agencies to match students with disabilities ages 14 to 26 with paid work-based learning opportunities at the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Students are selected for the program jointly by MRS and local educators.

Working with the DNR as part of the Summer Youth Program offers participating students the opportunity to function as part of a team, gain valuable work and transition experience, and build connections with campers at Michigan state parks.


