
Bill Aimed at Red Tape on 'State of Emergency'

LANSING, Mich., April 6.—(AP)—
A bill to give the Governor expanded power to maintain law and order in time of public disaster or unrest, without actually declaring martial law, has been introduced by Senators Charles N. Youngblood, of Detroit, and Harry F. Hittle, of Lansing.

Other senators said it was sponsored by the State Police and was an outgrowth of legal complications which arose during the race riot in Detroit in 1943.

The bill would permit the Governor to declare a state of emergency and to place strong controls over public activities in the area specified.
