

# Animal Shelter Rabies Basics

## What is it?

-  Rabies is a fatal disease that is caused by a virus that affects the brain.
-  Both people and animals can develop rabies if they are exposed to an infected animal.
-  Rabies is commonly spread through saliva, bites, scratches and contact with wounds, the eyes, nose, or mouth.
-  There is no treatment for rabies in animals; however, additional action may be needed to prevent the disease from spreading.
-  In Michigan, rabies is most commonly found in bats and skunks.

## How do I prevent it?

1. Minimize	2. Recognize	3. Report
<p>Vaccinate dogs, cats, and ferrets against rabies. Rabies vaccination is required to own or import ferrets <u>older than</u> 12 weeks and to import cats and dogs 12 weeks <u>or older</u>.</p> <hr/> <p>Verify rabies vaccination and bite history for dogs and cats on intake.</p> <hr/> <p>Train staff in the use of proper safety restraint and personal protective equipment, especially when handling difficult animals or during animal testing and disposal.</p> <hr/> <p>Eliminate opportunities for shelter animals to interact with wild animals.</p>	<p>Animals infected with rabies may act strange or aggressive. They may also twitch, stumble, be weak, have seizures, drool, or have difficulty swallowing.</p> <hr/> <p>Often, wild animals infected with rabies will appear tame rather than aggressive.</p> <hr/> <p>Euthanize and test suspect animals. Do not damage the head, as it's required for testing.</p>	<p>All bites to humans are required to be reported to your local health department within 24 hours.</p> <hr/> <p>As a reportable animal disease, rabies is required to be reported to the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development at 800-292-3939.</p>
