CWD Surveillance

Chronic wasting disease (CWD) is a transmissible neurological disease found in deer, moose, reindeer/caribou, and elk populations. The disease is progressive and fatal. CWD causes weight loss and a decline in body control. To date, there are no reported cases of CWD in humans, cattle, or other domestic livestock.

Currently, after a privately-owned cervid (POC) dies, brain and lymph node samples must be submitted for testing. All POC facilities are required to submit samples. The number of samples submitted depends on the registration type and location of the facility. For more information, please visit www.michigan.gov/animaldiseases.

Identification Requirements

Two forms of ID are required in cervids by 12 months of age or before leaving the farm.

One ID must be a unique official ID. For official ID tags, contact MDARD. Farm or management tags must be unique within the herd

For ranches, purchased animals must have two forms of ID. Natural additions do not require tags.

CWD Testing

100% of animals 12 months old and older that died due to illness, injury, or euthanasia.

25% of slaughtered, hunted, or culled cervids or 100% if in a Special Surveillance Area. Up to 30 per year. Samples must be submitted to the herd veterinarian or the Michigan State University Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory (MSU VDL) within 30 days of death.

Additions to Herd

Inspections

DNR audits every three years. Other inspections by state personnel are completed on an as needed basis.
