My name is Dennis Foote and I reside at 29639 Priest St. Dowagiac. I am submitting comments in opposition to the Silver Creek Siting Application and MDARD's decision.

I am a concerned property owner, writing to express significant concerns about the proposed site suitability determination for the new industrial egg-laying operation in Cass County, Michigan, Silver Creek. I believe MDARD failed to properly apply the GAAMPs, and MDARD should have denied the siting application. My concerns are as follows:

I grew up in Sister Lakes and owned a Pier business here for many years. When we had children, we purchased a home and raised our children here also. Unforeseen medical issues caused us to move away for a short time. Last year our dream property on Priest Lake came on the market, so we decided to purchase it as our retirement home with plans for it to be a lake retreat for our children and their families and generations to come. My original plan was to retire in Florida, but we decided to stay local so generations to come could enjoy the beauty of this community.

Our property is just outside the ½ mile radius of the proposed facility so it could potentially drop our property value as much as 50% or more. 

A property that was near the volunteer fire department that we are both members of, a local church that hosts outdoor services, a family farmer with cattle across the street, several vegetable farms, and a gravel pit. Fast forward 10 years, we have invested our savings, our time, and so many of our resources into creating a home that is perfect for our family. What we love most about our house and the property we live on is the environment that surrounds us. It's quiet, it's full of wildlife, and it's the perfect place to relax after a long day of our stressful jobs in public service.

Each year we host our son's birthday party outside where friends and family come to celebrate his latest trip around the sun. The kids look forward to racing each other up and down the water slide that we rent from a local business, the adults gather around the pole barn with our favorite foods (firemen sure do love to eat), and we cherish each other's company as we make another year of memories here in Silver Creek Township. It is devastating to me that an individual from another community can propose an industrial operation in our neighborhood and potentially destroy the things we look forward to most.

What I don't want to and should not have to do is consume more of my resources to ensure that my family is safe and that we can enjoy our property in ways that we always have. Our drinking well here is just over 60 feet deep, when discussing with the Health Department who would be responsible to monitor the quality of it, they stated that as the property owner, I would be responsible for this. There is great potential for runoff into surface water and groundwater contamination. The same goes for air quality, it's not just the smell that concerns me, it's the quality of the air that my family and I breathe. These critical factors as well as environmental impact, management of production waste, odors, potential health risks, social impacts, and economic impacts to other members of the community were not considered by MDARD comprehensively. The proposed site is inappropriate for an egg layer operation.

Silver Creek Poultry's application to MDARD was subpar, lacking evidence, research, and facts to be complete. In addition to the concerns listed in the appeal, I have concerns about the gravel pits. When sand and gravel extraction occur below the water table, groundwater naturally fills the gravel pit, forming a lake. The creation of gravel pits can therefore affect groundwater quality, which is especially important in areas that use groundwater as a source of drinking water. Silver Creek Poultry is proposing to site its operation on an abandoned gravel pit. That gravel pit has a pond of some sort on the south side. MDARD has done no investigation of the connection this pond, or other sections of the gravel pit property, may have to groundwater and our drinking water. Gravel pits and quarries can affect groundwater and surface water and may have lasting effects on ground and surface waters. At a minimum, MDARD should conduct a baseline analysis of the site before reviewing the Silver Creek Siting Application, but it did not do that. We have submitted several public records requests for this information, but it has not been released.

I, along with hundreds of other individuals of Protect Sister Lakes urge you to withdraw your site suitability determination and deny Silver Creek's siting application. Decisions of this magnitude should not solely focus on the economic benefits to one farm - but must

give equal weight to environmental sustainability, public health, and community well-being of an entire area. Allowing this application would do the exact opposite. Like the great Martin Luther King Jr. once said, "The time is always right to do what is right."

Thank you for your time and consideration. We urge MDARD to withdraw its decision and deny Silver Creek's Siting Application.

My name is Father Arul Lazar and I am the presiding Catholic Church Administrator of the Collaborative of Holy Maternity of Mary, in Dowagiac and Sacred Heart of Mary, in Silver Creek Township which are both based out of the Kalamazoo Diocese. I am submitting comments in opposition to the Silver Creek Poultry LLC's Siting Application and MDARD's decision to approve.

I have many concerns about the approved site suitability determination made by MDARD for the new industrial egg-laying operation that is to be built in the field across from Sacred Heart of Mary Church. I believe MDARD failed to properly apply the GAAMPs, and MDARD should have denied the citing application based on a number of underlying factors. Many of which will have a direct and lasting impact on the future of Sacred Heart of Mary and the surrounding community.

Firstly, Sacred Heart of Mary and its Parish Hall/Pavilion and Rectory are located on the East side of the proposed operation. I'm concerned that with the prevailing winds from the Northwest, West and Southwest, it will be negatively affected. According to research we have read, a Concentrated Animal Farm Operation, CAFO, is likely to produce even more hazardous odors, toxins and particulates, which have the potential to affect our parishioners during the summer months when Mass is held in our outdoor Pavilion.

Sacred Heart of Mary is one of the oldest parishes in the State of Michigan (established 1838) and is designated by the State of Michigan as an historical site. The land was donated by Leopold Pokagon, and it was also through his efforts that a permanent church was built and a priest assigned to serve the area residents. We have approximately 265 registered families and our summer Mass attendance can be between 1500-1800 between the two Masses. Our year-round membership is cut dramatically in the winter, so we heavily rely on the revenue generated from our summer parishioners to sustain/maintain our services and facilities.

Because we are only able to accommodate 220 worshippers inside the Church, the Parish built a pavilion in 1978 to accommodate our fellow residents living in or visiting Sister Lakes and the surrounding area during the summer. Before the pavilion was built these visitors would bring their own chairs and sit outdoors on the lawn in the front of the church and later by the cemetery to celebrate the Mass. This has been the practice for almost 70 years and represents the need to preserve our sacred space to allow for our parishioners' and visitors' right to practice our faith under the First Amendment. If visitors are not able to attend our outdoor Masses, due to the noise, odor or general health problems that might affect them, they have very few options in the area where they can worship.

Below are additional areas of concern that I believe should receive consideration when making a final determination on whether or not the site selected for Silver Creek Poultry LLC is an appropriate placement near Sacred Heart of Mary Catholic Church:

-Site suitability determination: The site that has been selected is inappropriate for an egg laying operation. MDARD's "Critical Factors" such as environmental impact, management of production waste, odors, potential health risks, social impacts, and economic impacts to other members of the community were not fully considered or at best, were incompletely documented.

-The selected site is "not acceptable" for livestock production and not a Category 2. The proposed site does not fulfill the requirements to be assigned a Category 2 livestock production facility under the GAAMPs guidelines, given the high potential for environmental and public health risks.

-Deficiency of notice: The church, several households and businesses were excluded from Silver Creek Poultry LLC's public notice and from MDARD's review.

-GAAMPs' "Additional Considerations" were not met which include: Silver Creek's proposed proximity to residence and high-use public areas/businesses (e.g. Sacred Heart of Mary, daycare, the wedding reception business, the outdoor drive-in movie theater, etc.) Furthermore, there were a number of drinking/well water sources that were not identified by Silver Creek Poultry LLC or MDARD during the application process. In light of these concerns, we urge MDARD to withdraw its initial site suitability determination and deny Silver Creek's siting application. As a concerned citizen, I believe that decisions of this magnitude should not solely focus on the economic benefits to one farm - but must give equal weight to environmental sustainability, public health, and community wellbeing. Allowing this application would do the exact opposite.
