

What is MEMCA and the MEMCA Certificate?

The MEMCA (Michigan Early Middle College Association) Certificate provides verification among the Michigan Department of Education, the school district, and the higher education partner that the graduate has successfully completed each of the following:

- a) The State of Michigan Merit Curriculum requirements
- b) A member school's MEMCA-approved College Readiness Curriculum
- c) A minimum of 15 college credit hours (non-remedial courses)

AND one of the following options:

- 100 hours of verified community service
- A minimum of 40 hours of verified career exploration, internship, job shadowing, or clinical experience
- Or a combination of the two that equals 70+ hours
- MEMCA must endorse the EMC's Career and College Readiness Curriculum before the school awards the certificate to the student

The Michigan Department of Education therefore accepts these students as early college graduates from their approved EMC program or high school.

Early Middle College





What is an Early Middle College?

An Early Middle College (EMC) is designed to offer students the opportunity to earn a high school diploma and either an associate degree, the Michigan Early Middle College Association (MEMCA) technical certification, an industry certification, or 60 transferable college credits at the same time.

These credits may be used toward a four-year degree from a Michigan public or private university, an advanced certificate, an associate degree from a community college.

What are the costs involved for Early Middle College?

Students participating in Early Middle Colleges have the opportunity to acquire college credit at no cost or significantly reduced costs (fees vary from district to district).

What are the benefits of Early Middle College?

- Reduces student and parent student loan debt
- Allows the student the opportunity to earn a credential, expanding employment possibilities right out of high school
- Prepares students for college coursework to make a smooth transition toward pursuit of additional college credits
- Supports a student's positive dual enrollment experience and deep college readiness skill development/career preparation through wraparound services provided by both the district and the college partner(s)



How does an Early Middle College Work?

Participation in an EMC may begin as early as the 9th grade. Students must declare their intent to participate no later than the beginning of grade 11.

EMC participants follow a deliberately designed 5-year educational course of study. Students work toward earning a college degree and/or a certificate by overlapping district-approved graduation course requirements with college dual enrollment pathways of study. College courses may be taken on a college campus, a college satellite campus, on a high school campus, in a career education center, or via a blended format (part on-line and part classroom).

The student's Educational Development Plan (EDP) must reflect the 5th year of instruction and is signed by the student, the parent, and school official.
