2024 Coordinated Application

The Michigan Department of Education is excited to announce the 2024 Child Nutrition Coordinated Application is now available! The Coordinated Application provides one application for all Child Nutrition Programs.

If you are new to your organization/district/agency or the Coordinated Application, you will need to complete the steps in Messages 1 - 3 below.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW:

- The information from your previous application (CACFP and School Nutrition Program) will transfer over to the 2024 Coordinated Application. Please review the information and make any corrections as necessary.
- There is a new process for adding brand new sites to your application. Guidance on this process can be found in the Coordinated Application User Guide for Sites Names.
- If your district plans to apply or reapply for the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), CEP spring data will not be available in the application until May. Districts that are midcycle will have the current application display. If the CEP page is edited prior to the availability of CEPI spring general collection CEP school level data, the page will load with zeros. Communication will be sent out when the CEP page is ready for school year 2023-2024.

FIRST APPLICATION ACTION STEP: INITIATE APPLICATION

- The 2024 Coordinated Application must be initiated before it can be completed. If your organization/district/agency has an approved 2023 Coordinated Application, the NexSys level 4 and/or Level 5 users both have the authority to initiate the 2024 application. Instructions are below.
 - o Go to "My Tasks"
 - o Click on "Initiate Related Document"
 - o Select "CNP: Coordinated Application"
- If you don't see "My Tasks," you may need to set up your NexSys Dashboard.
 Instructions are below.
 - o Click on your name on the home page of NexSys
 - o Click on Edit Dashboard
 - o Click Add Panel
 - o Click on the drop-down carrot in the top section
 - Choose My Tasks and Announcements
 - o Click Save

IMPORTANT NOTE:

- 1. If your organization/district/agency is participating in the **School Nutrition Program** and/or the **Child and Adult Care Food Program**, the 2024 Coordinated Application MUST be submitted on or before the following dates to receive a claim for meals. **No exceptions will be made.**
 - Applications MUST be submitted by Thursday, June 29, for a July claim.
 - Applications MUST be submitted by Thursday, July 27, for an August claim.
 - Applications MUST be submitted by Thursday, August 31, for a September claim.
 - Applications MUST be submitted by Thursday, September 28, for an October claim.
- 2. If your organization/district/agency is participating in the 2023 **Summer Food Service Program**, the 2024 Coordinated Application MUST be submitted by May 9, 2023, to participate in the program.

Do not wait to get your application submitted! There are approximately 1,200 sponsors that participate in the Child Nutrition Programs. The Office of Health and Nutrition Services (OHNS) staff will be working diligently to get all applications approved in a timely manner. Applications will be approved in the order they are submitted, with exception for those needing a July claim.

Food Recall Resources

A food recall is a firm's voluntary removal of distributed food products from commerce when there is a reason to believe that products are adulterated or misbranded. Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) is notified of recalls affecting Michigan and help ensure that potentially harmful food products are kept off store shelves by conducting both routine and targeted recall audit checks. Michigan Farm to Early Care and Education (ECE)

ECE programs can use farm to ECE to help children learn better. Farm to ECE includes purchasing and serving local foods in meals and snacks, as well as experiences like gardening with children and other educational activities related to food, nutrition, and agriculture. Children and families eat more local fruits and vegetables when ECE programs participate in farm to ECE.

Farm to ECE can be beneficial in any setting, including:

- Licensed family child care homes
- Unlicensed family child care homes
- · Child care centers
- Head Start or Early Head Start programs
- Privately funded preschools
- State-funded preschools
- Preschool or child care based in K-12 schools/districts
- Tribal child care programs

Why use farm to ECE?

- Improve children's eating behaviors, including their willingness to try new foods
- Develop children's awareness and knowledge of healthy eating, where food comes from, seasonality, gardening, and agriculture
- Serve more healthy foods in early care and education settings
- Connect with community partners to increase resources such as garden supplies, food vendor sources, and buying capacity
- Support local farmers and food businesses
- Deepen family engagement through gardening opportunities, sharing family recipes and food preferences, and influencing healthy eating in families
