 MI-Access Grade Level and Alignment Changes for Science

MI-Access Test Administration Manuals Now Available

The 2022 MI-Access Test Administration Manuals (TAMs) are available on the MI-Access web page (www.michigan.gov/mi-access) under the **What's New** and **Current Assessment Administration** sections.

All staff involved in the MI-Access administration should download the TAMs that are relevant to their role(s) in testing, become familiar with them, and follow the policies, procedures, and guidelines the TAMs include. This is important to ensure a valid, equitable, and trouble-free administration.

The two TAMs are:

- 2022 Functional Independence (FI) TAM provides specific administration information for both student-facing online testing and for students taking the paper/pencil version of the tests.
- 2022 Supported Independence (SI) and Participation (P)
 TAM provides specific information for the administration of the tests and the process for entering scores into the online answer document after testing.

Important Reminders:

- All students taking the FI English language arts (ELA)
 assessment must take the paper/pencil form of the
 Expressing Ideas test, whether or not they are testing online
 in the other parts of the assessment. That is, there is no online
 version of FI Expressing Ideas. For the student to receive a
 valid score, they must complete both the Accessing Print and
 the Expressing Ideas areas of the ELA assessment.
- The MI-Access FI online test directions are embedded in the testing engine and are available when a student is logged in and begins the test. By default, the online directions are set up to begin text-to-speech upon login. Printed directions are not available for any online FI test.

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- MI-Access FI paper/pencil test directions are included in the Test Administration Manual.
- SI/P assessments are administered using paper/pencil materials during test observations, but the responses of both the Primary and Shadow Assessment Administrators must be entered online. For step-by-step instructions on this process, refer to the SI/P Online Answer Document Instructions for Score Entry located on the MI-Access web page and in the SI/P TAM.

New M-STEP Designated Supports

Students taking the M-STEP in Spring 2022 will have access to new Designated Support options:

 Arabic and Spanish Glossaries (Embedded Online Designated Supports for M-STEP mathematics only)

These Designated Supports are useful for students who have literacy in Arabic or Spanish and who have intermediate to high English proficiency. When an online glossary is enabled, the student will select the References button to access a list of selected English words for selected test questions and the corresponding Arabic or Spanish translation.

Note: Not all words in a test question are provided for students in the glossaries; this is why students should have an intermediate to high English proficiency level to benefit the most from this Designated Support.

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 Stacked Spanish Social Studies (Embedded Online Designated Support for M-STEP social studies)

This Designated Support, which is useful for students who are literate in Spanish, provides both a Spanish and an English version of the test question. Students utilizing the online stacked Spanish translation will hear the Spanish text read aloud to them by the computer using "human voice audio". Therefore, students taking this form of the assessment will need headphones. The students may replay the audio as many times as they would like.

New Multiplication Table Guidance

Educators may ask the Office of Assessment and Accountability (OEAA) to provide the Multiplication Table for the M-STEP mathematics assessment (only available for use in grades 4-7).

However, before the request is made, IEP/504 teams must use the recently released Multiplication Table Guidance Document (https://www.michigan.gov/documents/mde/Multiplication_Table_Guidance_1_746034_7.pdf) to guide their decisions regarding the assignment and use of the Multiplication Table Accommodation for the M-STEP assessment.

Students who do not have an IEP/504 and who use this Accommodation will be flagged for review by OEAA. MI-Access Grade Level and Alignment Changes for Science

The MI-Access science assessment is changing in 2022. These changes in MI-Access science grade level and content alignments have been under consideration in past years and are now a reality for Spring 2022.

Starting this spring, MI-Access Functional Independence, Supported Independence, and Participation science assessments will be given in grades 5, 8, and 11 (formerly given in grades 4, 7, and 11).

This change aligns the grade levels at which both Michigan's general assessment (M-STEP) and the alternate assessment (MI-Access) are given.

All MI-Access science assessments are aligned to the alternate content expectations (essential elements) that were finalized in the spring of 2020. Each assessment measures the corresponding essential elements' level of complexity (range):

- MI Access Functional Independence = High Range
- MI Access Supported Independence = Medium Range
- MI-Access Participation = Low Range

MI-Access science is no longer aligned to the 2007 extended benchmarks.

At the main MI-Access page, click the red "Michigan's alternate content expectations" link (top of the page). Then click on the "science and social studies" link and follow the individual grade level alternate content expectations links.

Note: Individualized Education Program (IEP) teams should consider making amendments to IEPs to reflect these changes for 2022.

Coordinator Planning Kit Arriving Next Week

Your school will be receiving a Coordinator Planning Kit next week. The kit includes a sample set of manuals for all assessments – that is, for SAT with Essay, PSAT 10, PSAT 8/9 for Grade 9, and PSAT 8/9 for Grade 8. Discard any manuals for assessments you do not plan to administer at your school.

If your school is administering the SAT, the planning kit will be addressed to the SAT test coordinator. If your school has different test coordinators for the PSAT-related assessments, the materials from the kit are to be distributed to the other coordinators, as needed.

The manuals in this kit provide previews of the assessments for test coordinators, so coordinators can start their planning early. Full shipments of all manuals, forms, and other supporting materials for your school will arrive as part of the preadministration and test materials shipments, arriving March 23-25, 2022.

Coming Soon

- The Coordinator Planning Kit arrives in schools March 1-3, 2022.
- Required online training will be available starting March 2, 2022.
- The Nonstandard Administration Report (NAR) will be available March 14, 2022 in SSD Online.
- Preadministration and test material shipments arrive in schools March 23-25, 2022. If your school is on spring break that week, the materials will be delivered March 29-31, 2022.



REMINDERS

College Board Training

All test coordinators are required to complete the online College Board training each spring, even if they completed the training in the fall of 2021 or in prior years. On March 2, 2022, test coordinators for the SAT with Essay, PSAT 10, and PSAT 8/9 will receive an email with a link to access the required training. When the training becomes available, beginning on March 2, it can be accessed online (http://professionaltraining.collegeboard.org).

The Michigan-specific training is divided into three modules: one for coordinators, one for proctors, and one for SSD coordinators. The user must select their role-specific training. While there are separate role selections, users should note that the "SSD coordinator" training module is the same as the "coordinator training" module. Any SSD coordinator who is acting as a proctor on test day should complete the proctor training rather than the coordinator training. The proctor module is specific to test day activities related to proctor responsibilities.

The coordinator is responsible for training test day staff. This table describes options for coordinators to accomplish this staff training. Use of the online training requires a College Board Professional Account. If necessary, an account can be created on the College Board website (www.collegeboard.org).

Test Coordinator	Online coordinator training is required every spring.	Click on the link in the March 2 email, or go to http://professionaltraining.collegeboard.org
SSD Coordinator	Online SSD coordinator training is optional but highly recommended. The SSD Coordinator must be trained by the test coordinator in some way.	Access the training link, then choose training for "SSD coordinator" (same training as the test coordinator training) or for "proctor"
Backup Coordinator	Online coordinator training is optional but highly recommended. The Backup Coordinator must be trained by the test coordinator in some way.	Access the training link, then choose training for "test coordinator"
Proctor	Online training module for proctors is optional but highly recommended. Proctor(s) must be trained by the test coordinator in some way, either individually or in a group environment.	Access the training link, then choose training for "proctor"

Testing Staff Requirements

The ACT WorkKeys test coordinators are responsible for selecting their test day staff, using the guidelines detailed in the ACT Test Coordinator Information Manual (https://www.act.org/content/dam/act/secured/documents/pdfs/state-district-test-coordinator-paper-test.pdf) posted on the ACT state testing website (http://www.act.org/stateanddistrict/michigan) on the WorkKeys on Paper page in the Administration stage.

Test day staff include:

- ACT WorkKeys Test Coordinator has overall responsibility for coordinating test site operations and ensuring that all students testing at the school are testing under the same conditions as students at every other school
- Substitute Test Coordinator acts as the ACT WorkKeys Test Coordinator if the original coordinator is unable to serve on test day
- Accommodations Test Coordinator assists with administering accommodations and English learner supports
- Room Supervisors assist the ACT WorkKeys Test Coordinator in preparing for test day, checking in students, administering the tests, and returning all test materials

Proctors – assist the ACT WorkKeys Test
 Coordinator and Room Supervisors in preparing
 for test day, checking in students, administering
 the tests, and returning all test materials; also
 responsible for actively monitoring students
 during testing and reporting prohibited behavior.
 The number of proctors required in a testing
 room is proportional to the number of students
 testing.

The full list of responsibilities for each role listed above begins on page 16 of the <u>ACT Test Coordinator Information Manual</u>.

To protect school staff (including athletic coaches) and their relatives or wards from conflicts of interest or allegations of impropriety, there are strict guidelines on who may and may not serve as ACT WorkKeys testing staff. These guidelines begin on page 14 of the ACT Test Coordinator Information Manual. Student's scores will be cancelled if any of these policies are violated.

The MDE Assessment Integrity Guide, located on the MME web page (www.michigan.gov/mme) under the M-STEP Grade 11 Science and Social Studies section, provides additional guidance on the identification of testing personnel.



Training Your Testing Staff

The ACT WorkKeys test coordinator is required to hold a training session before test day to ensure testing staff understand their responsibilities and are prepared for test day activities. In addition, on each test day morning, the ACT WorkKeys **test** coordinator is required to hold a briefing session to discuss any site-specific information, last minute issues that arise, or any concerns staff members may have.

A Training Session Outline begins on page 14 of the ACT Test Coordinator Information Manual.

For Room Supervisors, a short training video, <u>Test Day Overview for Room Supervisors for WorkKeys</u>, is available on the <u>ACT state testing website</u>, on the **WorkKeys on Paper** page in the **Preparation** stage under **Train Your Staff**.

In addition, the Michigan Department of Education requires District and Building Coordinators to read the <u>Assessment Integrity Guide</u> (www.michigan. gov/mme – under **General Information**) and complete the Assessment Security online course through Michigan Virtual. This one-time training, with subsequent year refresher updates, is found at www.michigan.gov/mme under **What's New**.

Test Administrators, Room Supervisors, and Proctors must read the <u>Assessment Integrity</u> <u>Guide</u> (www.michigan.gov/mme – under **General Information**) and/or complete the Assessment Security online course through Michigan Virtual.
