Foreign Exchange Students Are to Take the MME, PSAT 10 and PSAT 8/9 in Spring 2022

Foreign exchange students in grade 11 in Michigan schools are expected to take all three components of the Michigan Merit Exam (MME).

The <u>Who Must/Can Take the MME document</u>, found on the <u>MME</u> <u>web page</u> (www.michigan.gov/mme) under **General Information**, has been updated to address eligibility and testing requirements for students in grades 11 and 12 for the 2021-2022 academic year. District and Building Assessment Coordinators should review this document.

Foreign exchange students in other grades are included as enrolled students in their schools and are expected to participate in all state assessments based on their grade level. This includes the PSAT 8/9 and PSAT 10.

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Why Test Security is Essential for Ensuring the Validity, Accuracy of Test Results

The primary goal of test security – that is, the use of secure and standardized test administration practices, procedures, and policies before, during, and after testing – is to protect the integrity of the assessment and to ensure that results are valid, accurate, and meaningful.

Standardized Test Administration

Indeed, all test administration practices come down to this critical question: Will the test administration lead to student results that accurately reflect a valid and reliable measure of what each student knows and is able to do compared to Michigan's Academic standards? To yield fair, reliable, accurate, and valid results, all statewide summative assessments must be administered under the same standardized conditions to all students. Standard conditions at the state, district, and school levels ensure that students have an equal opportunity to show their knowledge, skills, and abilities, and to demonstrate those opportunities through their engagement with the test. In addition, all stakeholders can have confidence in the validity of the student results when standardized test administration policies and procedures are in place.

Poor Test Security Can Affect the Validity of Test Results

Likewise, poor test security and administration practices can affect the validity of the results of the assessment being administered. For example, failure to adhere to high professional test administration and security standards, or to maintain consistency across all testing occasions and sites, may affect student performance, as well as provide an unfair advantage or disadvantage to an individual student or a group of students.

Errors Can Have Serious Consequences

Moreover, an error in test administration can impact an entire class or school. This can lead to serious consequences that may include test invalidation, student re-testing, parent notification of misadministration, additional required training of staff, and the inability of the test administrator(s) to administer assessments in the future. Districts and buildings can also take formal disciplinary action against staff involved in unethical testing behavior.

The Assessment Integrity Guide

The Office of Educational Assessment and Accountability (OEAA) provides educators with detailed information about required test administration practices, policies, and procedures. This information is found in the Assessment Integrity Guide document that is available on each assessment's web page. In addition, educators responsible for the administration of each state assessment must thoroughly read the Test Administration Manual (TAM) and/or test directions.

Last Chance! Michigan School Testing Conference is Next Week

This is the last week to register for the Michigan School Testing Conference (MSTC). This year's virtual conference, "Learn, Share and Discover," offers valuable workshops and clinics over three days, February 22-24, 2022. This conference is an essential resource to support your testing program.

The MSTC will offer a series of up to seven clinics every morning and afternoon. Testing and assessment topics include accountability, testing security and protocols, assessment strategies and best practices, test-specific updates, and more. The presenters include the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) staff, the Michigan Assessment Consortium (MAC), and educators from schools, districts, and ISDs. These presenters are eager to support your testing program with their knowledge and expertise.

The main conference registration fee is \$200, and attendees can earn SCECHs for an additional \$25 fee. MI-Access Grade Level and Alignment Changes for Science

The MI-Access science assessment is changing in 2022. These changes in MI-Access science grade level and content alignments have been under consideration in past years and are now a reality for Spring 2022.

Starting this spring, MI-Access Functional Independence, Supported Independence, and Participation science assessments will be given in grades 5, 8, and 11 (formerly given in grades 4, 7, and 11).

This change aligns the grade levels at which both Michigan's general assessment (M-STEP) and the alternate assessment (MI-Access) are given.

All MI-Access science assessments are aligned to the alternate content expectations (essential elements) that were finalized in the spring of 2020. Each assessment measures the corresponding essential elements' level of complexity (range):

- MI Access Functional Independence = High Range
- MI Access Supported Independence = Medium Range
- MI-Access Participation = Low Range

MI-Access science is no longer aligned to the 2007 extended benchmarks.

At the main MI-Access page, click the red "Michigan's alternate content expectations" link (top of the page). Then click on the "science and social studies" link and follow the individual grade level alternate content expectations links.

Note: Individualized Education Program (IEP) teams should consider making amendments to IEPs to reflect these changes for 2022.

WHAT'S NEW

College Board Training

All test coordinators are required to complete the online College Board training each spring, even if they completed the training in the fall of 2021 or in prior years. On March 2, 2022, test coordinators for the SAT with Essay, PSAT 10, and PSAT 8/9 will receive an email with a link to access the required training. When the training becomes available, beginning on March 2, it can be accessed <u>online</u> (http://professionaltraining.collegeboard.org).

The Michigan-specific training is divided into three modules: one for coordinators, one for proctors, and one for SSD coordinators. The user must select their role-specific training. While there are separate role selections, users should note that the "SSD coordinator" training module is the same as the "coordinator training" module. Any SSD coordinator who is acting as a proctor on test day should complete the proctor training rather than the coordinator training. The proctor module is specific to test day activities related to proctor responsibilities.

The coordinator is responsible for training test day staff. This table describes options for coordinators to accomplish this staff training. Use of the online training requires a College Board Professional Account. If necessary, an account can be created on the <u>College Board website</u> (www.collegeboard.org).

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REMINDERS

Accommodation Request Deadline is February 22

The deadline to request College Board accommodations, state allowed accommodations, and English learner (EL) extended time support in the College Board SSD Online system is February 22, 2022. Accommodated testing materials will be sent to schools based on the students in the pending and approved status in SSD Online as of February 22. Accommodated materials can only be used if the student has an approval in SSD Online.

English Learner Supports

There are three EL supports available to eligible students for the Michigan-provided assessments: time and one-half (+50% extended time), translated test directions, and use of a word-to-word bilingual dictionary. (EL supports are not currently available for Advanced Placement tests, weekend SAT, or the PSAT/NMSQT). The use of EL supports may not be appropriate for all EL students. To determine if providing EL supports is appropriate, refer to the <u>Supports & Accommodations Guidance Document</u> (https://www.michigan.gov/documents/mde/Michigan_ Accommodations_Manual.final_480016_7.pdf).

The use of translated test directions and bilingual dictionaries does not require College Board approval. Time and one-half must be requested in SSD Online by February 22; these requests will be automatically approved and will require no documentation to be submitted.

Translated test directions will be available in PDF format for schools to download and print for test day the week of February 21. Printed translated test directions will not be shipped to schools. Access the Testing Supports for English Learners for SAT with Essay on the <u>Michigan Merit Examination web page</u> (www.michigan.gov/mme) and the Testing Supports for English Learners for PSAT 10 and Testing Supports for English Learners for PSAT 8/9 on the <u>PSAT web page</u> (www.michigan.gov/psat).

Note: The translated test directions are not Michigan-specific; however, they will provide all relevant directions for students. The provided directions use only the standard timing script, so test coordinators and proctors are to make sure students who are also using the time and one-half (+50%) support pay attention to the timing instructions provided verbally and written on the board.

Students who are identified as English Learner (EL) in the Michigan Student Data System (MSDS); have been enrolled in U.S. schools for 12 months or less at the time of taking a state assessment; and are eligible to only take the math sections of the SAT, PSAT 10, or PSAT 8/9 will use the **EL-Math Only** state allowed accommodation. A math-only version of the assessment will not be shipped. Students will use a lime test book but only can be administered the math section.

ACT WorkKeys Test Materials Shipments

Note: The initial window to submit student data for pre-identification barcode labels and to order ACT WorkKeys standard-time and accommodations materials for the initial test dates (April 14-27, 2022) has closed.

The quantities of standard time ACT WorkKeys materials your school will receive is based on your school's pre-ID student counts pulled from the OEAA Secure Site as of 5:00 p.m. on February 16, 2022, minus the accommodations counts entered on the **Initial Material Order** page.

Secure and non-secure standard time and accommodations materials will be shipped for delivery in either the week of **March 21, 2022**, or **March 28, 2022**, as selected by the school on the Manage Participation screen in PearsonAccess^{next}. The standard time and accommodations materials will be shipped in separate sets of boxes and may be delivered on different days within the selected delivery week.

Test materials will be shipped to the WorkKeys Coordinator's mailing address (not the building address) that is listed in <u>Educational Entity Master</u> (<u>EEM</u>) (www.michigan.gov/eem) as of February 15, 2022. FedEx tracking information will be available beginning March 18, 2022 on the **Material Order Reports** page on the <u>Office of Educational Assessment and</u> Accountability (OEAA) Secure Site

(www.michigan.gov/oeaa-secure). You can access the Material Order Summary Report under the Assessment Registration menu and the sub-menu of Material Orders.

If you do not receive your test materials by April 1, 2022, call ACT at 800-553-6244, ext. 2800 for resolution.

If your order did not include the correct quantities of the following materials, call ACT for resolution:

- Test Administration Forms
- Site Headers
- Return polymailers, colored return labels, and/or FedEx return labels

Within 24 hours of receiving the shipment(s), compare the packing list to the materials received, using the guidelines found in the <u>ACT Test Coordinator</u> <u>Information Manual</u> (https://www.act.org/content/ dam/act/secured/documents/pdfs/state-district-testcoordinator-paper-test.pdf). Ordering Additional ACT WorkKeys Test Materials

If, after checking in your test materials, you find the number of students scheduled to test April 14 – 27, 2022 exceeds the number of test materials received, order additional ACT WorkKeys materials through the <u>OEAA Secure Site</u> (www.michigan.gov/oeaa-secure), from **March 22 through April 7, 2022** at **5:00 p.m. ET.** Do not submit materials orders in PearsonAccess^{next}.

Instructions for the **Additional Material Order** function can be found on the <u>Secure</u> <u>Site Training web page</u> (www.michigan.gov/ securesitetraining).

If a new student arrives in your school after February 16, pre-ID their student data in the <u>OEAA Secure Site</u> and print a barcode label locally, using the blank page of labels that ACT will include with your test materials, or a white label you have purchased elsewhere.

Student Preparation – Go for Platinum!

Encourage students to understand the types of questions they will see on the WorkKeys test, since these differ from other types of exams. Students and teachers can access **free** <u>practice questions</u> from all three tests, ranging from easier content (Level 3) to the most difficult (Level 7). Teachers and students may use these practice questions as Questions of the Day or as warm-up activities in the weeks leading up to test day. Students can also create a user account and take **free** full-length <u>online practice tests</u> (https://testregistration. org/rsp/Login.do?event=go&realm=20770563). This allows students to pace themselves in real-time test scenarios and receive scores indicating how they may perform on the WorkKeys tests.
