Michigan Department of Education (MDE) Press Release – Income Eligibility Guidelines

MDE announced the household income eligibility guidelines established by the United States Department of Agriculture for Free and Reduced-Price Meals and Free Milk through the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk, and Child and Adult Care Food Programs. Visit MDE Press Release.

Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) Update

Please note that USDA has not yet released the Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-2021 FFVP grant allocations to the states. MDE cannot announce FFVP grant recipients for FY 2020-2021 until we receive notification from USDA as to the amount of money we will be awarded. MDE has also submitted several waiver requests for the FFVP for

SY 2020-2021, which would include allowing parent pick-up of FFVP snack, allowing FFVP snacks to be distributed with lunch and/or breakfast meals for off-site consumption, and allowing non-congregate FFVP snacks for students participating in off-site distance learning. Thank you for your patience and understanding. MDE will move as quickly as possible when we get more information from USDA.

Institutional Produce Safety Survey

A team of educators from Michigan State University Extension, in partnership with Fresh Systems, LLC., Michigan Food and Farming Systems, and the Wallace Center at Winrock International have developed a national survey about institutional food safety programs to inform educational initiatives for fresh produce buyers. The aim of this survey is to gather data on accepted food safety verification programs for fresh produce, awareness of the program's requirements for farms, and confidence in these verification programs.

Do you purchase fresh produce for an institution or know someone that does? Please consider taking and/or sharing a <u>Survey About Food Safety Requirements</u> <u>for Suppliers</u>. All of the questions are in multiple choice format and the survey will take an estimated time of 7 minutes to complete. Responses are anonymous and participation is completely voluntary. The survey will be open through August 31, 2020.

2021 MEGS+ CNP: SNP Application Available

Michigan Electronic Grant System Plus (MEGS+) Child Nutrition Programs (CNP): School Nutrition Programs (SNP) 2021 Application is now available.

The MEGS+ website for completing the SNP 2021 Application is at MEGS+.

Application Due Date

The table below shows the MEGS+ application deadlines based on the first month in the 2020-2021 School Year for which you may submit a claim for reimbursement in the School Nutrition Programs.

Please note a 2021 SNP Application must be submitted and approved in order to submit claims for July and August 2020.

Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

You must notify the School Nutrition Programs (SNP) unit of your intention to participate in the CEP for School Year 2020-2021 by August 31, 2020, or the first day of school, whichever is earlier. The <u>Nationwide Waiver of Community Eligibility Deadlines</u> extended the deadline for electing CEP for the upcoming school year. SNP requires the notification to occur by selecting "yes" to question number 12 and saving the *Sponsor Information Page* in the 2021 CNP: School Nutrition Program

MEGS+ Application. This selection must be made by the deadline, as a late selection cannot be approved.

The USDA CEP waiver also allowed for an expansion in the data used to calculate Identified Student Percentage (ISP). For the 2020-2021 school year, the waiver allows for school districts to use direct certification data from anytime between April 1 and June 30, instead of the normal deadline of April 1.

Districts that are 100% Free Claiming with the available data are good to complete and submit the 2021 CNP: School Nutrition Programs MEGS+ Application. The 2020 School Level CEP Eligibility Report using Spring 2020 data is now posted to the <u>CEP website</u>.

Districts that currently participate in CEP and are not at 100% Free Claiming or plan to participate for the first time need to upload enrollment documentation if they wish to use the CEP waiver and determine eligibility based on June 30 data. An Excel file with the full student enrollment from the end of SY19-20 should be uploaded into GEMS/MARS that contains the following information: UIC, last name, first name, DOB, address, student number, school building code, school name, F/R determination basis, application/household number, and McKinney Vento students. Student data should not be emailed, it needs to be uploaded using the secure GEMS/MARS link.

USDA Foods Program

USDA Foods - School Food Authorities (SFA's) must complete the *Request for USDA Foods Delivery* portion of the SNP application within MEGS+ to participate in the USDA Foods Program for **School Year 2021-2022**. When completing the SNP application within the View/Edit screen, the *Request for USDA Foods Delivery* form will be found under Program Forms. The deadline to choose to participate in the USDA Foods Program is October 15, 2020. **The SFA consortium decision is then irrevocable for School Year 2021-2022.**

Attached below you will find two documents that might assist you with making your consortium choice, those documents are the USDA Foods Consortia Services and Department of Defense (DoD) Services by Consortia. As a friendly reminder, your SFA already selected its consortium choice for SY 2020-2021 within the SY 2019-2020 MEGS+ SNP application and food ordering for the upcoming school year has already begun. New School Nutrition Program (SNP) 2021 MEGS+ Application Completion Instructions

Indirect Cost (question #13 on the Sponsor Information page):

For Public Schools and Public School Academies: Please answer "Yes" to 13d (Public School rate) - every Public School and Public School Academy has an approved unrestricted indirect cost rate and we do not need any documentation uploaded.

For Non-public Schools, RCCIs, or brand-new Public School

Academies: Please answer "No" to 13d. You will then be required to answer 13a. This answer should be "0" unless you have a negotiated indirect cost rate from another Federal Agency/Entity. Any questions about Indirect Cost rates can be directed to MDE-Fiscal@michigan.gov.

Quick guide:

- If you put a "0" for 13a., you do not need to do anything else for question #13.
- If you put anything other than "0" for 13a., you will be required to answer 13b. and 13c. by uploading supporting documentation, specifically a letter from the other Federal Agency/Entity that verifies your approved negotiated indirect cost rate.

Attachments (shown on the bottom of the View/Edit Page):

For District-wide CEP: You are not required to upload any letters or documents (unless you have a new Food Service Director).

For any RCCIs without day students (meaning you answered "No" to question #11 on the Sponsor Information Page): You must upload a document for each attachment. It can say "We are an RCCI without day students". Unfortunately, this could not be avoided so please upload the same document for each attachment.

For any RCCIs with day students (meaning you answered "Yes" to question #11 on the Sponsor Information Page): You must upload all documents and letters relating to Free and Reduced-Price Meals Applications.

For all other programs (including Partial-CEP): You must upload all documents and letters relating to Free and Reduced-Price Meals Applications.

For all Special Milk Program sponsors: You will need to upload the documents and letters relating to Free and Reduced-Price Meals Applications. You can ask your analyst if you have questions.

Professional Standards Training Tracker Tool Update Release

On July 10, FNS released updates to the Professional Standards Training Tracker Tool as part of the ongoing operations, maintenance, and enhancements of the project. The update includes the addition of reward badges to motivate school nutrition professionals and make the process of completing annual training requirements fun.

New Feature Alert: Show what you know by earning reward badges!

Users of the tool can earn a badge for each key area (Nutrition, Operations, Administration, and Communication and Marketing) by completing one or more trainings under a specific key area. Users can also earn achievement badges (Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze) by completing trainings in more than one key area. Once annual training requirements are met, users can print their certificate, which will also display the badges they have earned.

Questions of the Week

Question: I see that there are new flexibilities on hiring standards for new school food service directors (FSDs). What has changed?

Answer: Effective April 30, 2019, USDA is allowing hiring flexibilities for new FSDs in Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) with a student enrollment of 2,499 or less. Please note that the new flexibilities do not apply to new FSDs hired in LEAs with student enrollment of 2,500 or greater. Here is a summary of new flexibilities for LEAs with 2,499 students or less: Requires relevant food service experience rather than school nutrition programs experience, State Agency will allow documented volunteer or unpaid work as relevant experience, for LEAs with < 500 students, the State Agency will allow less than the required years of food service experience if the candidate meets the minimum required education.

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Question: Is the grandfathering rule still in effect for FSDs that were hired prior to July 1, 2015?

Answer: FSDs that were hired prior to July 1, 2015, were grandfathered in at the LEA size they were working in as of July 1, 2015, and were exempt from meeting any educational requirements. A grandfathered FSD may move (be hired) to an LEA of the same size or less without having to meet any educational standards. If a grandfathered FSD moves (is hired) to an LEA of a higher student enrollment than what they were grandfathered in, then the FSD must meet the new hiring

standards-- this means they must meet all educational and experience requirements of the higher LEA size and follow the current hiring standards.

Question: The final rule for Hiring Flexibilities under Professional Standards says the State Agency has the discretion to consider documented volunteer or unpaid work as relevant experience for new school nutrition programs directors in LEAs with 2,499 or fewer students. Is MDE allowing this flexibility?

Answer: Yes. This flexibility applies to LEAs with 2,499 students or fewer only.

Question: The new hiring flexibility for LEAs with 2,499 or fewer students allows a food service director to be hired who has relevant food service experience, rather than school nutrition program experience. What type of food service experience counts?

Answer: Types of acceptable food service experience could include the following: hospital, nursing home, assisted living, restaurant, catering-this is not all inclusive.

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Question: The final rule for Hiring Flexibilities under Professional Standards says the State Agency has the discretion to accept less than the required years of food service experience for a new director hired in an LEA with fewer than 500 students, as long as the director has the minimum required education. Is MDE allowing this?

Answer: Yes. In this situation it is best to contact the School Nutrition Programs office prior to hiring to ensure the potential candidate meets hiring standards.
