Spring 2021 Student Data Files and Select M-STEP and MI-Access Student-level Reports Available

Note: The COVID-19 pandemic created significant challenges to instruction during the 2020-21 school year. As a result, the data from the Spring 2021 M-STEP assessments should be used with caution and in combination with other local assessment data (including benchmark assessment data) to confirm and interpret the results of individual students.

Reminder: Spring 2021 test results are embargoed until the public release of Spring 2021 assessment results later this summer. Districts and schools will be notified through the Spotlight when the embargo has been lifted.

Important: While **individual** student results may be shared with parents at this time, it is not permissible to share any school-, district-, or state-level results with parents, the community, or other external parties until the embargo is lifted by the Michigan Department of Education. School board meetings are considered open meetings; therefore, the sharing of embargoed assessment results at these meetings is not permissible until the embargo is lifted.

To download your school's student data files, go to the Report menu and select **Student Test Scores**. The student data files contain only student-level data.

Currently Available Student-level Reports

Select student-level reports for M-STEP and Ml-Access for the Spring 2021 administrations are now available in the Dynamic Score Reporting Site, which is accessed through the OEAA Secure Site. Additional reports, including those for grade 8 PSAT 8/9 and SAT with Essay as well as aggregate reports, will be released as they become available over the next several weeks.

M-STEP and MI-Access Student-level Reports

M-STEP (without science data) and MI-Access reports currently available include:

- Individual Student Reports
- Student Roster Reports
- Student Overview (MI-Access only)

To access your school's student-level reports, log into the OEAA Secure Site and select the **Reports** tab, then select **Dynamic Score Reports** in the drop-down menu. Next, select the Test Cycle, ISD, District, and School for your search criteria. Then, by selecting **Search** you will be directed to the Dynamic Score Reporting Site where you can view your reports.

Upcoming reports not yet released:

- M-STEP science reports are not yet available
- Parent Reports and M-STEP Student Overview Reports will be available later this month
- PSAT 8/9 and SAT with Essay Individual Student Reports and Student Roster Reports will be available later this month
- Printed Parent Reports and Student Record Labels will arrive in schools in early September

New in 2021

- Read by Grade 3 Indicator: Michigan's Read by Grade 3 Law (MCL.2801.280.f) requires grade 3 M-STEP English language arts results to be used to flag students who are eligible for retention. Student tests are flagged as follows:
 - » Meets Requirements: Scale score 1272 or above; student meets the requirements of the Read by Grade 3 law for promotion to grade 4
 - » Needs Supports: Scale sore between 1253 and 1271; student needs additional reading supports
 - » Eligible for Retention: Scale score 1252 or below; student is eligible for retention in grade 3

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Spotlight on Student Assessment and Accountability

- Performance Indicator Labels: English language arts and mathematics performance indicator labels have changed for the Spring 2021 results. This is only a change in the labels; calculations of subscore performance have not changed from prior administrations.
 - » Above Standard indicates the student's performance on the standards that make up the claim is above the overall content standard or proficiency cut.
 - » At/Near Standard indicates the student's performance on the standards that make up the claim is at or near the overall content standard or proficiency cut.
 - » Below Standard indicates the student's performance on the standards that make up the claim is below the overall content standard or proficiency cut

Spring 2021 MI-Access Scoring Guides Posted

The Spring 2021 MI-Access Scoring Guides have been posted to the MI-Access web page (www.michigan.gov/mi-access) in the Functional Independence section. These guides are released after every testing cycle to provide educators with detailed information on the Expressing Ideas (writing/drawing) part of the English language arts assessment.

The MI-Access Scoring Guides provide examples of released items accompanied by samples of student

responses. The guides are grade-specific and provide technical information on how each of these items are scored. The items provide a complete range of scoring possibilities with a scoring rationale behind the final score determination.

Are you interested in learning how to develop and implement performance assessments in your district/school? Join the Office of Educational Assessment and



Accountability (OEAA) as we work with the Michigan Assessment Consortium to develop performance assessments that are aligned to Michigan's academic standards and model essential skills in mathematics and English language arts (ELA) in grades 3-8.

Preferred candidates for the Michigan Performance Assessment Cadre (MiPAC):

- have experience teaching mathematics or English language arts (ELA) in grades 3-5 and/ or grades 6-8
- have experience with/understanding of Michigan academic standards
- are employed in either general or special education

Educators with experience outside of general education or who work with students with disabilities are enthusiastically encouraged to apply.

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You will:

- learn about the Michigan model essential skills for mathematics and ELA
- engage in a process to develop performance assessments and rubrics
- · collaborate with peers from other districts
- practice using a rubric and calibrating the scoring of performance assessments
- take part in a research agenda focused on measuring student competencies through performance assessments
- (pending) earn up to 50 SCECH credits or alternative graduate credits

Participants are expected to attend and contribute to approximately 50 hours of job-embedded facilitated professional learning and assessment development over the 2021-22 academic year.

We anticipate virtual sessions will be scheduled in blocks of two-hour weekly engagements to meet designated project milestones. These sessions include:

- collaboration with grade-span teachers in developing a performance assessment and corresponding rubric aligned to the state model competencies, with guidance and resources provided
- administration and collection of student responses for one performance assessment, revising items and rubrics as necessary for them to become part of a library of models
- collaboration with grade-span teachers in scoring student work that results from implementation of the performance assessment
- participation in project evaluation activities, such as observation, focus groups, and surveys

Formative

How Can Assessment Be Used to Accelerate Student Learning?

Interim Summative

As this school year begins, it might be tempting to remediate any learning your students missed last year during the pandemic. However, this may not be the most beneficial approach for your students. The Michigan Assessment Consortium and the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) offer these suggestions for assessment practices as you begin planning your instruction this year.

- Prioritize current grade-level standards, rather than attempt to re-teach the previous year's content, to keep students moving forward in their learning.
- Assess student understanding of key concepts by using diagnostic and instructionally embedded assessments (IEAs) and fill in gaps in learning as needed.
- Use the formative assessment process during daily instruction as the primary method of assessment to support and advance student learning.
- Monitor students' social, physical, and emotional well-being to make sure they are prepared for learning in the new school year.

Focusing on a smaller set of prioritized standards in the beginning of the year can help students rapidly learn new foundational grade-level content. It is important to remember that focusing on a list of prioritized standards does not remove a teacher's responsibility to teach the other current grade-level standards, nor does it remove other standards; instead focusing on prioritized standards assigns the other standards to a supporting role. Also, by law spring summative assessments assess the depth and breadth of Michigan's state standards, so it is imperative that all current grade-level standards are taught over the course of the school year.

Teachers will have to assess student readiness using the formative assessment process to move students on to more challenging curriculum as the school year gets under way. In their paper Pre-Assessment: Promises and Cautions (PRE-ASSESSMENT: Promises and Cautions (uky.edu), Guskey and McTighe (2016) offer three important guidelines to be considered when implementing these assessments.

- 1. Clarify your purpose for using the assessment(s) and share the purpose with your students, so they become invested in their learning.
- 2. Determine how the information gleaned from the assessment will be used. Knowing how the data will be used and what actions will be taken as a result are critical considerations for moving student learning forward.
- 3. Use assessment judiciously and efficiently. Assess only when it is necessary to know what students have mastered and what gaps still remain. Instruction should still be at the forefront of daily classroom activities.

Careful planning and implementation of a variety of assessments to advance student learning, and determining where additional supports are needed, will help to get your students back on track and learning forward toward success.

REMINDERS

Fall 2021 Testing

Recent legislation signed by Governor Whitmer contains language that requires districts to make available the PSAT 8/9 for Grade 9, PSAT/NMSQT for Grades 10 and 11, and SAT for Grade 12 in Fall 2021.

- Students who were unable to take the assessment in Spring 2021 are eligible to take the applicable fall assessment.
- Students who took a College Board assessment in Spring 2021 and request to take the test again are eligible to take the applicable fall assessment.
- Students may participate but are not required to take Fall 2021 assessments.
- Results from Fall 2021 assessments will not be included in accountability reporting.
- The SAT Essay is not available in Fall 2021.
- Schools must order assessments in the College Board test ordering site for Fall 2021 testing.

Spring 2022 testing for state accountability will be required whether students test in Fall 2021 or not.

ACT WorkKeys Score Reports

If you have not yet received your reports, ensure your mailing information in the Educational Entity Master (EEM) system is current. If your information is out of date, contact your district's authorized EEM user to update the EEM system as soon as possible. If you are not sure who the authorized EEM user is, use the District and School Contact page on the OEAA Secure Site (www.michigan.gov/oeaa-secure) to retrieve the name and contact information for your district.

Nonpublic schools that want to update their EEM information can call 517-241-5385 or email <u>nonpublicschools@michigan.gov</u> with their updates.

If your school:

- was closed at the time of delivery, the package(s) will be shipped to the WorkKeys Test Coordinator at the mailing address listed in EEM
- is permanently closed, the package(s) will be shipped to the District Assessment Coordinator at the mailing address listed in EEM.

REMINDER: The Spring 2021 ACT WorkKeys reports and data are **embargoed** until the public release of the assessment results. Districts and schools will be notified through the Spotlight on Student Assessment and Accountability Newsletter when the embargo has been lifted.
