SUBJECT: 2021 Immunization Requirements for Children Entering Kindergarten and 7th Grade, or Enrolling in a New School District in Grades 1-12

Act Now, add to your registration and back to school information packets. Please share this important information with all staff who will be working with immunization records of children at your facility.

Immunizations are one of the most effective and scientifically proven measures to protect children from harmful diseases and death. Since 1978, Michigan law has required that each student have an up-to-date certificate of immunization at the time of registration (or no later than the first day of school) for entry into kindergarten and 7th grade, and for enrollment into a new school district, grades 1-12.

Any student who fails to meet the below mentioned immunization requirements shall not be admitted or participate in school classes.

For a student to attend school in Michigan, the Michigan Public Health Code requires parent(s)/legal guardian(s) to have one of the following on file with the school:

1. A valid, current immunization record.

[Note: *Provisional Status Vaccines*. In the event the child has received at least one dose of a required vaccine and the next dose is not yet due, the school is required to follow up with the child to ensure s/he has received the required follow-up doses of the vaccine and is up-to-date for all other required vaccines.]

2. A medical doctor's (M.D./D.O.) signed State of Michigan 2021 Medical Contraindication Form, which states the medical contraindication(s), the vaccines involved, and the time period the child is not able to get the vaccines.
3. A current, certified State of Michigan 2021 Nonmedical Immunization Waiver Form required under Michigan Administrative Rules.
[Note: When a parent or legal guardian holds a religious or other objection that prevents a child from receiving vaccines, a 2021 Nonmedical Immunization Waiver Form is required to be completed, signed, and certified at the local health department. The local health department will provide education from a health professional on the risks of vaccine-preventable diseases and the benefits/potential risks (risks consisting mostly of moderate side effects) of vaccination. Health professionals will address questions and concerns prior to signing the current State of Michigan 2021 Nonmedical Immunization Waiver Form.]

Proper maintenance of up-to-date immunization records, including waivers, is critical and required to be on file for all students. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services or the local health department may conduct an audit in the event of an outbreak and/or cases of non-compliance.

The Michigan Care Improvement Registry/School Information Reporting System (MCIR/SIRS) links immunization records contained within the MCIR for students entered on the MCIR/SIRS school roster. All enrolled students in kindergarten and 7th grade, as well as any students newly enrolled to a school district, can be placed on the roster to meet school immunization reporting requirements. Consent is required to enter data into MCIR/SIRS or to share MCIR data maintained by the school.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) "Consent Form for Disclosure" template can be modified to include your school information. The FERPA "Consent Form for Disclosure" template and additional guidance on immunization reporting can be found at www.mcir.org under School & Childcare, then click on Reporting to the Health Department.

Once the FERPA "Consent Form for Disclosure" is signed and returned to the attending school, data can be added to MCIR/SIRS in compliance with FERPA regulations. Without a "Consent Form for Disclosure", the school cannot enter immunization data into MCIR/SIRS. Data includes immunization records and waivers.

If a student is 18-years or older, they are considered an "eligible student" who may provide their own "Consent Form for Disclosure" of information from their education records. Please review the enclosed Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) regarding "FERPA No Consent" Checkbox in MCIR/SIRS and Forms.

If a FERPA "Consent Form for Disclosure" has not been received, or is not on file, for a student:

1. The “No FERPA” consent box in MCIR/SIRS must be checked.
2. Viewing existing immunization information in the MCIR/SIRS system does not violate FERPA and children can remain on the school roster. Schools must be compliant with FERPA if the immunization data in MCIR becomes part of the school records or shared in any way.
3. If there is no FERPA consent on file, and the provider-entered data indicates that the student has not completed the required school immunizations, additional immunization data should not be entered into MCIR/SIRS and the immunization information should be reported to the local health department using the “Immunization Reporting Form for Students with No FERPA Consent” document.

The immunization status for a “No Consent Student” must still be reported to the local health department using the “Immunization Reporting Form for Students with No FERPA Consent”. To protect student privacy, this form should only contain aggregate non-identifiable information for students who do not have a consent on file. **Those students being reported on this form should be removed from the student roster in MCIR/SIRS, so they are not reported twice.** The completed “Immunization Reporting Form for Students with No FERPA Consent” form must be submitted to the local health department each November and February when the MCIR/SIRS report is completed. The local health department will add aggregate data following school closure.

Districts should contact their local health department for other means of school immunization reporting if MCIR/SIRS is not available.

Thank you for your continued support and cooperation to ensure Michigan’s children are properly immunized to avoid the ongoing threat of illness associated with vaccine-preventable diseases.

Information regarding Local Health Departments (LHD):

Pupil Membership Count Day:

- Students excluded from school due to immunization non-compliance on “Pupil Membership Count Day” may still be counted for purposes of State School Aid if they physically return to school within 30 calendar days from the date of “Pupil Membership Count Day.”
- Students excluded from school entry due to an incomplete immunization record may be granted an excused absence by the Michigan Department of Education (MDE), if permitted, by the local school district Board of Education.

Information about school immunization reporting dates:

- The **November 1, 2021** report includes all newly-enrolled students and all kindergartners, and all 7th graders from **January 1, 2021 through September 30, 2021**.
- The **February 1, 2022** report includes the November roster, plus any students starting from **October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021**.
- The LHD will monitor the progress, timeliness, and accuracy of your school(s) immunization compliance reporting.

Information regarding The State School Aid Act:

- The State School Aid Act (P.A. 94 of 1979) Section 388.1767 requires that school districts shall submit an immunization report of complete, appropriately waived, or with a provisional immunization record by November 1, 2021, and meet a 90 percent compliancy of the entering students, as listed above.
- School districts not in compliance will be subject to 5 percent of their State School Aid funds being withheld.
- By February 1, 2022, school districts shall submit an immunization report of complete, appropriately waived, or with a provisional immunization record, and meet a minimum of **95 percent** of the entering students, as listed above, to avoid the implementation of 5 percent withholding.

- Submission of immunization records prior to the November and February deadlines will allow your LHD time to review the submitted information and assist with data entry corrections.

Information regarding The Revised School Code:

- The Revised School Code, Section 380.1177(a)
- The Revised School Code, Act 451 of 1976, requires the MDE, in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), to develop information for Michigan schools to address notification of families with children enrolled in grades 6, 9, and 12, about the risk and prevention of Meningococcal Meningitis and Human Papillomavirus Diseases.

Timeline for MCIR/SIRS Reporting

January – December: Build your roster, assure that appropriate reporting period and grade is marked for each student. Use current grade, or roundup for kindergarten in the Spring and Summer of 2021 – all students will be advanced automatically on August 1st.

October: Childcare closes the report period by going into IP Status and clicking on the “close period” button on October 2nd. (The button will not be highlighted, and you will not be able to close the period if you are not at 90% compliancy.) Continue to update immunization records until you reach at least 90% compliancy.

November 1st: School closes the report period by going into IP Status and clicking on the close period button. (The button will not be highlighted, and you will not be able to close the period if you have not obtained at least 90% compliancy). Complete vision report for all kindergarten students. Continue to update immunization records until you reach at least 90% compliancy.

February 1st: School closes the report period by going into IP Status and clicking on the “close **February 1st**: School closes the report period by going into IP Status and clicking on the “close period” button. (The button will not be highlighted, and you will not be able to close the period if you are not at 95% compliancy). Continue to update immunization records until you reach at least 95% compliancy. Contact your local health department or the help desk if you have any questions about reporting.

Information for Schools on Influenza and Vaccines



Updated February 2021

What is influenza or “the flu”?

The flu is a potentially-severe respiratory illness caused by flu viruses that infects the nose, throat, and lungs. There are many different flu viruses that can make people sick. The flu is very contagious and spreads easily by coughing and sneezing. Millions of people get the flu every year. Many people get very sick, and some even die.

What are the symptoms of the flu?

People who have the flu often get sick very quickly and can have symptoms that include a high fever, cough, sore throat, muscle or body aches, fatigue or chills. Some people who have the flu have NO symptoms at all, but they can still spread the flu to others.

Is flu vaccine recommended for children in schools?

YES. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) recommend that all children 6 months of age and older receive flu vaccine every year to help them stay healthy.

➤ **DID YOU KNOW? Flu vaccine is the BEST way to protect children and adults from getting the flu. It also protects against complications if you do get the flu.**

How can students and staff be protected from the flu?

Students and staff can protect themselves by getting a flu vaccine and encouraging others to get vaccinated—parents, teachers, secretaries, and other support staff. The flu vaccine protects against the flu by creating antibodies that fight against different flu viruses.

➤ **DID YOU KNOW? Every year, schools in Michigan close because too many students and staff are out sick with the flu.**

What kinds of flu vaccine can students get?

Both the flu shot and nasal spray flu vaccine will be available for school-aged children. Consult with a healthcare provider to determine which flu vaccine is best for your child.

➤ **DID YOU KNOW? The decision to recommend flu vaccines is an example of using science and data to help improve the public’s health.**

How often should a flu vaccine be given?

Flu vaccines change from year to year, so children and adults need to get a flu vaccine every year to be protected. A healthcare provider can help determine if a child needs one or two doses of flu vaccine. CDC recommends that every person should get a flu vaccine by the end of October.

➤ **DID YOU KNOW? It is safer to get the flu vaccine than it is to get the flu. Don’t underestimate the health risks from flu!**

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) makes recommendations for who should receive the flu vaccine each year. Visit www.cdc.gov/flu for more information. “FERPA No Consent” Checkbox in MCIR/SIRS and Forms

Frequently Asked Questions: Information for Schools

Why is this important?

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) protects the release of a student’s personal data. Any student’s vaccine and/or waiver status is protected by FERPA, including entry of such data by school personnel in the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR) under the School Immunization Reporting System (SIRS). Parental consent must be obtained before a school can enter a student’s personally identifiable information (PII) and immunization data into MCIR/SIRS (i.e., vaccine and/or waiver data provided by a parent/guardian and entered by a school in MCIR/SIRS). An **unchecked FERPA box** in MCIR/SIRS indicates parent/guardian permission to enter PII and vaccine and/or waiver data in MCIR/SIRS for sharing with local health departments (LHDs). It is anticipated that most parents will provide permission. School data in MCIR/SIRS will not be visible in MCIR to the Health Care Provider (HCP). Vaccine data entered by HCPs are not affected by FERPA and can be viewed by schools, Local Health Departments (LHDs), and other HCPs.

Who does this apply to?

This applies to parents of children who are enrolling in a public or private school:

- Kindergarten, 7th grade, and any newly enrolled student into the school district.
- School personnel must send the form, “Consent for Disclosure of Immunization Information to Local and State Health Departments,” to these students’ homes for parent/guardian signatures and then collect all those forms.
- Parents or guardians who give permission to share a student’s immunization record will have an **unchecked FERPA No Consent box**. This indicates that a parent or guardian has provided consent for schools to enter PII and vaccination data into MCIR/SIRS to be shared with the State and LHDs.
- FERPA is an active consent or opt in process. This means schools do not need to collect a document that states the parent does not want to share immunization information with the State or LHD. If a consent form is not collected, the school will need to check the “FERPA No Consent” box in MCIR/SIRS, and the immunization information will not be shared with the State and LHDs.

Does the “Consent for Disclosure of Immunization Information to Local and State Health Departments” form need to be redone with each assessment year?

After initial submission to the school, there is no need to complete this form every year. However, this form needs to stay with the student’s file. For example, when a child moves from elementary school to middle school, the middle school will need to have that form in the student’s file.

Does this replace the waiver document?

No, parents/guardians seeking to claim a nonmedical waiver are still required to participate in an immunization-focused discussion with LHD staff. During the discussion, parents/guardians can bring up any immunization-related questions and concerns they may have. The staff will present evidence-

based information regarding the risks of vaccine-preventable diseases and the benefits/potential risks (risks consisting mostly of moderate side effects) of vaccination. This rule preserves the ability to obtain a nonmedical waiver following the completion of the required educational session.

What if school personnel fail to receive from a parent/guardian the signed consent form, or receive a signed consent form which prohibits authorization of sharing a child’s immunization data?

When a parent/guardian does not give permission for the school to share PII and immunization data in MCIR/SIRS, the MCIR/SIRS “FERPA No Consent” checkbox should be utilized. Immunization information, including waiver data, will be reported using aggregate numbers on the “MDHHS Immunization Reporting Form for Students with no FERPA Consent” to the local health department.

The school MCIR/SIRS user will take the following steps:


1. Log into MCIR/SIRS
2. Search for student
3. On student information page, click **Edit Information** hyperlink (screenshot 1)
4. Edit school information for the student by **checking the “FERPA No Consent” checkbox**
5. Save the change by clicking the **Submit** button

The “FERPA No Consent” checkbox with a checkmark should now be visible.



Does the school still generate reports for the LHD?

The school will have the option to check a box called “FERPA excluded” when generating the following reports: IP-100 Detail, Incompletes, Provisionals and Waivers. All children who have the “FERPA No Consent” box checked on the General Information Screen will not display on these reports. Their totals will be included in the aggregate numbers.

SUBJECT: Vision Screening and Reporting for Kindergarten



The screening of children's hearing and vision prior to the start of Kindergarten is required in Michigan. Several laws mandate the screening, confirmation of screening, and the reporting of these screenings.

Public Health Code Act 368 of 1978, Section 9307 states that "a parent, guardian, or person in loco parentis applying to have a child registered for the first time in a kindergarten or first grade in a school in this state **shall present to school officials, at the time of registration or not later than the first day of school,** a certificate of hearing and vision testing or screening or statements of exception under Section 9311".

The Revised School Code (Act 451 of 1976, section 380.1177) requires that parents of children entering kindergarten **present a statement to school officials** confirming that they have received the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services Vision Screening **OR** a statement, signed by a licensed eye care practitioner or medical/osteopathic physician (**optometrist or ophthalmologist**), indicating that a child's eyes have been examined at least once after age three and **before initial school entry** may also be presented. **School officials are required to enter vision screening data into the MCIR/SIRS system** for all kindergarten new entrants by November 1 of each year.

Please note the following points regarding Kindergarten Hearing and Vision Screening in Michigan:

- **Parents** are responsible for getting their child's hearing and vision screened prior to the first day of Kindergarten
- **Schools** facilitate the screenings by communicating the requirement to parents
- Local public health departments offer free screenings for all children in their service area
- Schools can facilitate the screenings by including the local health department screening staff during Round-Ups or registration days, if available
- Vision screening statements from the local health department, a licensed eye care practitioner (**optometrist or ophthalmologist**) or medical/osteopathic physician are acceptable
- Hearing screening statements from the local health department, primary care provider, or pediatrician are acceptable
- Screenings are available at no charge to families through your local health department
- Screenings should take place no more than 6 months prior to the start of school
- Students should be allowed access to school even if the parent did not have the screening completed. Parents should have the screening completed within the first week of school
- **School officials** enter the vision screenings onto the immunization data entry screen in the MCIR no later than November 1 of each school year
- November 1 is the deadline to report that the screenings have been completed prior to the first day of school
- A separate report to MDHHS is no longer required
- Schools and screening sites should ensure the following when scheduling their screening day:
 - Have available a quiet room with table and appropriate chairs for either preschool or school-age screening. Hearing screenings must be conducted in a quiet environment
 - Have available a room with adequate space, outlets, air flow, etc.
 - Screenings should never be conducted in bathrooms or rooms where other events are taking place or where unsafe conditions exist

- Observers (including parents) must not communicate with children during the screening to prevent leading responses which can result in false negatives
- Failure to ensure the above necessities will result in being asked to reschedule the screening date

Consent for Disclosure of Personally Identifiable Information and Immunization Information to Local and State Health Departments

Immunizations are an important part of keeping our children healthy. Schools and State and Local health departments must monitor immunization levels to ensure that all communities are protected from potentially life-threatening diseases and, if necessary, respond promptly to an emerging public health threat. It is important that disease threats be minimized through the monitoring of students being immunized.

Sharing immunization and personally identifiable information including the student's name, Date of Birth, gender, and address with local and state health departments will help to keep your child safe from vaccine preventable diseases. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. § 1232g, requires written parental consent before personally identifiable information and immunization information from your child's education records is disclosed to the health department. If your child is 18 or over, he or she is an "eligible student" and must provide consent for disclosures of information from his or her education records.

You may withdraw your consent to share this information in writing at any time.

Vaccines Required for School Entry in Michigan

Whenever children are in group settings there is a chance for disease to spread. Children must follow vaccine laws in order to attend school. These laws are the minimum standard for preventing disease outbreaks in group settings. The best way to protect children from serious diseases is to follow the recommended vaccination schedule at [cdc.gov/vaccines](https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines). When following the recommended schedule children are fully protected and any school vaccination requirements are met.

Parents and guardians choosing to decline vaccines must obtain a certified non-medical waiver from a local health department. Nonmedical Waiver Rule for Childhood Immunizations in School and Licensed Childcare Programs: Information for Parents/Guardians

In early 2015, Michigan instituted an administrative rule change on nonmedical waivers for childhood immunizations. Parents/guardians seeking to obtain a nonmedical immunization waiver for their child/children who are enrolled in school or licensed childcare programs are required to attend an educational session, where they are provided with information about vaccine-preventable diseases and vaccinations.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Why is this rule important?

High nonmedical waiver rates can leave communities susceptible to diseases such as measles, chickenpox, and pertussis (whooping cough) by undermining community or “herd” immunity. Herd immunity protects vulnerable children who cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons and children with compromised immune systems. Herd immunity can also slow the spread of disease if a high proportion of individuals in that community are immune to the disease. Immunization is one of the most effective ways to protect children from serious diseases and even death.

Who does this rule apply to?

The rule applies to parents/guardians seeking a nonmedical immunization waiver for their child/children who are enrolling in public or private:

- Licensed childcare, preschool, and Head Start programs
- Kindergarten, 7th grade, and any newly enrolled student into the school district

How does this rule affect parents/guardians?

Parents/guardians seeking to claim a nonmedical waiver are required to participate in an immunization-focused discussion with county health department staff. During the discussion, parents/guardians can bring up any immunization-related questions and concerns they may have. The staff will present evidence-based information regarding the risks of vaccine-preventable diseases and the benefits/potential risks (risks consisting mostly of moderate side effects) of vaccination. This rule preserves the ability of parents/guardians to obtain a nonmedical waiver following the completion of this required educational session.

What is a nonmedical immunization waiver?

A nonmedical waiver is a written statement by parents/guardians describing their religious or philosophical (other) objections to specific vaccine/vaccines. An official State of Michigan Nonmedical Waiver Form will be provided by the county health department.

Will the County Health Department make a copy of the waiver?

The county health department may make a copy of the waiver for their records and provide the parent/guardian with the original. Making a copy of the form is not a violation of the Family Educational Rights Privacy Act (FERPA), because the waiver education is conducted at the county health department before the parent/guardian provides the certified State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form to the school. This form is an official State of Michigan Department of Health and Human Services document that records the waiver visit for the county health department.

What is considered a certified nonmedical waiver?

A certified nonmedical waiver is the State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form. Any new waivers issued should have the revision date of January 10, 2021. A certified nonmedical waiver will:

- Display the county health department's information/stamp.
- Include the child's: name, date of birth, address, name of school/childcare program, telephone number (optional), vaccines being waived with the reason, signed date, as well as signatures of the parent/guardian, and of the county health department authorizing agent completing the immunization education.

A county health department will not issue a waiver without both signatures, as it would be considered an incomplete and invalid waiver.

Waiver forms that are altered in any fashion (including information on the form that may be crossed out) or forms that are not an official MDHHS certified waiver form cannot be accepted by schools/childcare programs.

Can a parent/guardian obtain a certified nonmedical waiver form from a school, childcare program, or healthcare provider?

No, a certified nonmedical State of Michigan waiver can only be obtained at a county health department.

How does a parent/guardian obtain a certified nonmedical waiver?

Parents/guardians are required to contact their county health department to receive immunization waiver education and a current certified State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form.

What if my child has a medical contraindication to a vaccine?

If your child has a medical reason (that is, a true medical contraindication or precaution) for not receiving a vaccine, a physician (MD/DO) must sign the State of Michigan Medical Contraindication Form.

What documentation are parents/guardians required to submit to their school or childcare program?

1. Parents/guardians are required to submit one of the following documents:

- A complete immunization record **or**
- A physician (MD/DO)-signed State of Michigan Medical Contraindication Form **or**
- A current, certified State of Michigan Nonmedical Immunization Waiver Form

2. If one of the above forms is not submitted, students can be excluded from school or childcare based on the public health code, unless students are in a provisional category. (Children in the provisional category are defined as those who have received 1 or more doses of vaccine but need to wait the recommended time to receive the next dose.)

Norma de Exención No Médica para Inmunizaciones Infantiles en la Escuela y Programas Certificados de Cuidado Infantil: Información para Padres/Tutores

A principios del 2015, Michigan instituyó un cambio a una norma administrativa sobre exenciones no médicas para inmunizaciones infantiles. Se les requiere a los padres/tutores que están tratando de obtener una exención no médica de inmunizaciones para su(s) hijo(s) que esté(n) inscrito(s) en la escuela o en programas certificados de cuidado infantil, asistir a una sesión educativa, donde se les proporciona información sobre vacunaciones y enfermedades prevenibles con vacunas.

Preguntas Frecuentes:

¿Por qué es importante esta norma?

Las altas tasas de exenciones no médicas pueden dejar a las comunidades susceptibles a enfermedades tales como el sarampión, la varicela y la tos ferina, al socavar la inmunidad comunitaria o inmunidad colectiva. Dicha inmunidad colectiva protege a niños vulnerables que no pueden ser vacunados por razones médicas y a niños con sistemas inmunológicos comprometidos. ¿A quién aplica esta norma?

- Programas certificados de cuidado infantil, preescolar, y Head Start
- Jardín de Infancia, 7mo grado, y todo estudiante recién inscrito en el distrito escolar

¿Cómo afecta esta norma a los padres/tutores?

Se les requiere a los padres/tutores que busquen una exención no médica participar en una discusión enfocada en las inmunizaciones con el personal del departamento de salud del condado. Durante la discusión, los padres/tutores pueden hacer cualquier pregunta relacionada con las inmunizaciones y mencionar cualquier preocupación que puedan tener. El personal presentará información basada en evidencias con respecto a los riesgos de las enfermedades prevenibles con vacunas y a los beneficios/riesgos potenciales (riesgos que mayormente consisten en efectos secundarios leves) de las vacunas. Esta norma preserva la habilidad de los padres/tutores de obtener una exención no médica después de que hayan culminado esta sesión educativa requerida.

¿Qué es una exención no médica a las inmunizaciones?

Una exención no médica es una declaración escrita por parte de los padres/tutores que describe sus objeciones religiosas o filosóficas (u otras) a una vacuna o vacunas en particular. El departamento de

salud del condado proporcionará un Formulario oficial de Exención No Médica del Estado de Michigan.

¿Hará el Departamento de Salud del Condado una copia de la exención?

El departamento de salud del condado puede elaborar una copia de la exención para sus registros y proveerles a los padres/tutores el original. El elaborar una copia del formulario no es una violación de la Ley de Derechos y Privacidad Educativa Familiar (FERPA), ya que la educación sobre la exención es llevada a cabo en el departamento de salud del condado antes de que el padre/tutor le proporcione a la escuela el Formulario certificado de Exención de Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan. Este formulario es un documento oficial del Departamento de Salud y Servicios Humanos del Estado de Michigan que registra la visita sobre exención para el departamento de salud del condado.

¿Qué se considera una exención no médica certificada?

Una exención no médica certificada es el Formulario de Exención de Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan. Toda nueva exención emitida debe llevar la fecha de revisión del 10 de enero de 2021. Una exención no médica certificada deberá:

- Mostrar la información/sello del departamento de salud del condado.
- Incluir el nombre, fecha de nacimiento, dirección, nombre de la escuela/programa de cuidado infantil, número de teléfono (opcional) del niño, además de las vacunas que se hayan evitado, con la razón, fecha de la firma, así como las firmas del padre/tutor y del agente autorizante del departamento de salud del condado que llevó a cabo la educación sobre las inmunizaciones.

Un departamento de salud del condado no emitirá una exención sin ambas firmas, ya que sería considerada una exención incompleta e inválida.

Los formularios de exención que sean alterados de alguna manera (incluyendo información en el formulario que haya sido tachada) o formularios que no sean un formulario oficial de exención certificada del MDHHS no podrán ser aceptados por las escuelas/programas de cuidado infantil.

¿Puede un padre/tutor obtener un formulario certificado de exención no médica de una escuela, programa de cuidado infantil, o proveedor médico?

No, una exención certificada no médica del Estado de Michigan sólo se puede obtener en un departamento de salud del condado.

¿Cómo obtiene un padre/tutor una exención no médica certificada?

Se les requiere a los padres/tutores contactar a su departamento de salud del condado para recibir una educación sobre exención a las inmunizaciones y un Formulario actual certificado de Exención a Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan.

¿Qué sucede si mi hijo(a) tiene una contraindicación médica a una vacuna?

Si su hijo(a) tiene una razón médica (es decir, una verdadera contraindicación o precaución médica) para no recibir una vacuna, un médico (MD/DO) deberá firmar el Formulario de Contraindicación Médica del Estado de Michigan.

¿Qué documentación se les requiere a los padres/tutores presentarle a su escuela o programa de cuidado infantil?

1. Se les requiere a los padres/tutores presentar uno de los siguientes documentos:
 - Un registro completo de inmunizaciones o
 - Un Formulario de Contraindicación Médica del Estado de Michigan firmado por un médico (MD/DO) o
 - Un Formulario actual certificado de Exención No Médica a las Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan
2. Si no se presenta uno de los formularios arriba mencionados, los estudiantes pueden ser excluidos de la escuela o del cuidado infantil en base al código de salud pública, a menos que los estudiantes estén en una categoría provisional. (Se define a los niños en categoría provisional como aquellos que hayan recibido 1 o más dosis de vacunas, pero necesitan esperar el tiempo recomendado para recibir la siguiente dosis.)

What is considered a certified nonmedical waiver?

A certified nonmedical waiver is the State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form. Any new waivers issued should have the revision date of January 10, 2021. A certified nonmedical waiver will:

- Display the county health department's information/stamp
- Include the child's: name, date of birth, address, name of school/childcare program, telephone number (optional), vaccines being waived with the reason, signed date, as well as signatures of the parent/guardian and of the county health department authorizing agent completing the immunization education

A county health department will not issue a waiver without both signatures, as it would be considered an incomplete and invalid waiver.

Waiver forms that are altered in any fashion (including information on the form that may be crossed out) or forms that are not an official Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) certified waiver form cannot be accepted by schools/childcare programs.

Can a parent/guardian obtain a certified nonmedical waiver form from a school, childcare program, or healthcare provider?

No, a certified State of Michigan nonmedical waiver can only be obtained at a county health department.

1. Contact their county health department to receive immunization waiver education and to obtain a certified State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form.
2. Submit the certified State of Michigan Immunization Waiver Form to the school or childcare program attended by their child/children.

Waiver forms that are altered in any fashion (including information on the form that may be crossed out) cannot be accepted by schools or childcare programs.

What if a child has a medical contraindication to a vaccine?

The rule change did not affect the healthcare provider completing the medical contraindication form. A current State of Michigan Medical Contraindication Form (available at doctors' offices) must be completed and signed by a physician (MD/DO) and submitted to the school or childcare program.

What documentation are parents/guardians required to submit to the school or childcare program attended by their child/children?

Parents/guardians are required to submit:

- A complete immunization record **or**
- A physician (MD/DO)-signed State of Michigan Medical Contraindication Form **or**
- A current, certified State of Michigan Nonmedical Immunization Waiver Form

Students without a completed immunization record and/or a certified waiver form are subject to exclusion from school or childcare unless the student is in a "provisional" category. Children in the provisional category are defined as those who have received 1 or more doses of vaccine but need to wait the recommended time to receive the next dose.

Se les requiere a los padres/tutores que tratan de conseguir una exención no médica, participar en una discusión enfocada en las inmunizaciones con el personal del departamento de salud del condado. Durante la discusión, los padres/tutores pueden hacer cualquier pregunta relacionada con las inmunizaciones y mencionar cualquier preocupación que puedan tener. El personal presentará información basada en evidencias con respecto a los riesgos de las enfermedades prevenibles con vacunas y a los beneficios/riesgos potenciales (riesgos que mayormente consisten en efectos secundarios leves) de las vacunas. Esta norma preserva la habilidad de los padres/tutores de obtener una exención no médica después de que hayan culminado esta sesión educativa requerida.

¿Qué es una exención no médica a las inmunizaciones?

Una exención no médica es una declaración escrita por parte de los padres/tutores que describe sus objeciones religiosas o filosóficas (u otras) a una vacuna o vacunas en particular. El departamento de salud del condado proporcionará un Formulario oficial de Exención No Médica del Estado de Michigan.

¿Cómo afecta esta norma a las escuelas y a los programas certificados de cuidado infantil de Michigan?

- La norma requiere que las escuelas y programas de cuidado infantil remitan a los padres/tutores que busquen una exención no médica para inmunizaciones al departamento de salud del condado para obtener una educación sobre exención de inmunizaciones y certificación de exención.
- Las escuelas y programas de cuidado infantil sólo aceptar un Formulario actual, no alterado y certificado de Exención de inmunización del Estado de Michigan.

¿Qué se considera una exención no médica certificada?

Una exención no médica certificada es el Formulario de Exención de Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan. Toda nueva exención emitida debe llevar la fecha de revisión del 10 de enero de 2021. Una exención no médica certificada deberá:

- Mostrar la información/sello del departamento de salud del condado.
- Incluir el nombre, fecha de nacimiento, dirección, nombre de la escuela/programa de cuidado infantil, número de teléfono (opcional) del niño, además de las vacunas que se hayan evitado, con la razón, fecha de la firma, así como las firmas del padre/tutor y del agente autorizante del departamento de salud del condado que llevó a cabo la educación sobre las inmunizaciones.

Un departamento de salud del condado no emitirá una exención sin ambas firmas, ya que sería considerada una exención incompleta e inválida.

Los formularios de exención que sean alterados de alguna manera (incluyendo información en el formulario que haya sido tachada) o formularios que no sean un formulario oficial de exención certificada del MDHHS no podrán ser aceptados por las escuelas/programas de cuidado infantil.

¿Puede un padre/tutor obtener un formulario certificado de exención no médica de una escuela, programa de cuidado infantil, o proveedor médico?

No, una exención certificada no médica del Estado de Michigan sólo se puede obtener en un departamento de salud del condado.

¿Cómo obtiene un padre/tutor una exención no médica certificada?

En base a la norma, ya no se les permite más a los padres/tutores presentarle a la escuela o programa de cuidado infantil al cual asista su hijo(s), un Formulario no certificado de Exención a Inmunizaciones.

Se les requiere a los padres/tutores:

1. contactar a su departamento de salud del condado para recibir una educación sobre exención a las inmunizaciones y un Formulario certificado de Exención a Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan.
2. Presentarle a la escuela o programa certificado de cuidado infantil al cual asista su hijo(s) el Formulario certificado de Exención a Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan.

Los formularios de exención que sean alterados de alguna manera (incluyendo información en el formulario que haya sido tachada) no podrán ser aceptados por las escuelas/programas de cuidado infantil.

¿Qué sucede si un niño tiene una contraindicación médica a una vacuna?

El cambio de norma no afectó que el proveedor médico completara el formulario de contraindicación médica. Se debe llenar un Formulario actual de Contraindicación Médica (disponibles en los consultorios médicos) y ser firmado por un médico (MD/DO) y presentado a la escuela o programa de cuidado infantil.

¿Qué documentación se les requiere a los padres/tutores presentarle a su escuela o programa de cuidado infantil?

Se les requiere a los padres/tutores presentar uno de los siguientes documentos:

- Un registro completo de inmunizaciones o
- Un Formulario de Contraindicación Médica del Estado de Michigan firmado por un médico (MD/DO) o
- Un Formulario actual certificado de Exención No Médica a las Inmunizaciones del Estado de Michigan

Si no se presenta uno de los formularios arriba mencionados, los estudiantes pueden ser excluidos de la escuela o del cuidado infantil en base al código de salud pública, a menos que los estudiantes estén en una categoría provisional. (Se define a los niños en categoría provisional como aquellos que hayan recibido 1 o más dosis de vacunas, pero necesitan esperar el tiempo recomendado para recibir la siguiente dosis.)
