Intentions at One Month among Low-Income Women

A new CDC study using data from the <u>WIC Infant and Toddler Feeding Practices Study-2</u> was published Monday, March 7, in *Pediatrics*, the journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). The study, "<u>Maternity Care Practices and Breastfeeding Intentions at One Month among Low-Income Women</u>," reveals clients enrolled in WIC who experienced maternity care practices supportive of breastfeeding at birth were more likely to meet their prenatal breastfeeding intentions when their infants were one month old. The study population was 4,367 women recruited in 2013 from 80 WIC sites spanning 27 states, and their analyses focused on a subset of 1,080 of these women.

THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON BREASTFEEDING RATES IN A LOW-INCOME POPULATION

Data from the 2020 Los Angeles County WIC Survey were used to examine the impact of COVID-19 on breastfeeding outcomes among WIC participants.

The <u>study</u> found that compared with infants born before March 2020, the percentage of infants who received *any* breastfeeding at:

- 1 month decreased from 79.66% to 76.96% (p = 0.139).
- 3 months significantly decreased from 64.57% to 56.79% (p = 0.001)
- 6 months significantly decreased from 48.69% to 38.62% (p = 0.0035).



The percentage of infants fully breastfed at 1, 3 and 6 months significantly decreased at all time points.

Conclusions: The prevalence of any breastfeeding at 3 and 6 months and, fully breastfeeding at 1, 3 and 6 months was significantly lower among mothers who gave birth during the pandemic compared with mothers who gave birth before the pandemic. The shift to remote services delivery and the corresponding reduction in live support of WIC services owing to the pandemic may explain the decline in the breastfeeding rate. Here in Michigan, as we prepare for the post pandemic life, it is critical to ensure that breastfeeding support is met in a hybrid of remote and face-to-face settings.

PEER COUNSELOR Q & A

I spoke with a client is who is at her wit's end. Her I month old is waking frequently during the night, but doesn't seem interested in nursing. How can I help this client?

Dear Incredible PC,

Oh my, this is a tough one! As we learned during Jan Tedder's H.U.G. Your Baby training, 1 month is a big milestone for sleeping patterns! Remember, babies develop two different sleep cycles around this age (ie- Still/ Deep sleep and Active/ Light sleep). It's possible this may be less of a nursing problem and more of misunderstanding of normal baby behaviors. Let's focus on clearing the air for this parent.

Set the tone of the discussion:

Lend a listening ear. Frustrated parents need to feel heard before moving forward.

Establish a positive connection and rapport with your client. Consider telling them about your own experience with your child(ren) at this age to put them at ease.

Affirm your client's feelings with statements, such as:

"You are not alone. Many parents around your baby's age notice the same behavior."

Use probing questions, such as:

"Tell me, what have you heard about infant sleeping patterns?"

Then, ask permission to share information:

"Your baby's sleeping patterns are quite different than your own. Would it be alright if we talk through these differences together?"

Helpful tips:

Utilize the H.U.G. Your Baby website, Help Baby Sleep video, and Baby's Sleep Cycles newsletter.

It takes time for parents to learn their baby's sleeping patterns, but with your help, your clients will be experts in no time! Never forget how much you mean to the parents you serve. I'm so proud of you!


