1. Call to Order – Brian Ahmedani

a. Roll Call

Brian Ahmedani called the September 2023 Michigan Suicide Prevention Commission Meeting to order at 10:31 AM.

The roll was taken, and a quorum of members were not present.

2. Public Comment

Celeste Kanpurwala provided public comment.

3. Review and Adopt Previous Meeting Minutes – All

June 2023 and August 2023 meeting minutes could not be approved due to a lack of quorum.

4. MDHHS Updates

a. Behavioral Health and Forensic Programs – Debra Pinals

i. MiCAL/988 Implementation – Krista Hausermann

Dr. Debra Pinals provided an update on MiCAL and 988.

- Krista Hausermann, Rachel Zaguskin, and Jill Smith presented at last month's CIT Conference in Detroit. The 988 Team also presented at the School Safety and Mental Health Commission in August and was invited to present at the OSS/MDDHHS Learning Event in September and October. Dr. Pinals also mentioned how 988 will be presenting with the University of Michigan as part of their Suicide Awareness Week the first week in October, and on October 18th, 2023, 988 will hold a booth at the All-Needs Community Fair in Detroit.
- Marketing efforts: 988 launched an awareness campaign on the first of the month for September Suicide Prevention Month. Dr. Pinals also outlined some of the work that is being done with special populations, specifically LGBTQ+ and aging and elderly

adults. At the end of August, WILX 10 published an article about Frontline Strong: [Michigan crisis program addresses first responders mental health \(wilx.com\)](https://www.wilx.com/story/news/local/2023/08/28/michigan-crisis-program-addresses-first-responders-mental-health/7048212002/)

- Dr. Pinals also mentioned that MDHHS is preparing the legislative request for funding for 988 for FY25 but finding stable and diversified funding is still a priority for Michigan. Dr Pinals also outlined how MDHHS is adding 18 more CCBHC sites. 988 is starting efforts to increase partnerships with existing and new CCBHCs to enhance referrals including mobile crisis referrals.
- Data: In June 2023, Michigan answered the 6th highest number of calls, and of those six states, we had the second-best answer rate.
- **July 2023 988 Vibrant Report Metrics:**
 - Calls Received: 7,330
 - Calls Answered: 6,517
 - In-State Answer Rate (Vibrant Report): 89%
- **MDHHS Report Metrics: July 2022-July 2023**
 - Total Received: 86,192
 - Total Calls Answered: 76,004

b. Injury Violence Prevention Section

- i. Preventing Suicide in Michigan Men (PRiSMM) – Kristen Smith
Dr. Kristen Smith shared that a newsletter was sent out at the end of August, early September, with updates of all of the events and activities that are happening in Michigan for Suicide Prevention Month.

Dr. Smith will share the training portal link with Rachel Zaguskin to forward on to the Commissioners to request a SafeTalk.

A published proclamation from the State of Michigan recognizing National Suicide Prevention week was also mentioned and will be shared with Commissioners.

- ii. Transforming Youth Suicide Prevention (TYSP) - Lindsay DeCamp
Lindsay DeCamp provided an update about a grant proposal application for the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention that the Injury and Violence Prevention team had applied to back in May that had focused on older adults. Lindsay shared that the application was not selected.

Lindsay also shared an update for her program Transforming Youth Suicide Prevent. The program will be able to fund up to four new local outreach suicide survivor teams or LOSS Teams. The kickoff meeting/educational webinar will take place virtually on September 21st from 10:00 AM – 11:30 AM. Applications will be open later this month and applications will be selected in early 2024.

Lindsay also shared that a save the date flyer is now available for the annual Community Technical Assistance (CTAC) Conference. The conference will be taking place May 1-May 3 in Gaylord, Michigan.

5. Old Business

- a. Statewide Summit Planning – Rachel Zaguskin and Nancy Buyle
Nancy Buyle shared that the planning committee met this week to discuss plans for the Statewide Summit. The committee stressed that they are actively looking for a venue to hold the summit. Nancy outlined the initial discussion that was had regarding the drafted agenda and stated that once the venue for the event is selected more thorough planning for the Statewide Summit will be conducted.
- b. LGBTQ+ Media Campaign Metric Updates – Rachel Zaguskin
Rachel Zaguskin shared the metric results from the Commission funded LGBTQ+ Media Campaign that was run in June for Pride Month.
 - The campaign ran during the month of June on Facebook, Instagram, Mobile and Reddit
 - The campaign resulted in 4,953,873 impressions, 11,002 clicks, and 8,583 total pageviews.

- c. USPTF Nomination of Collaborative Care – Bill Beecroft
Dr. Bill Beecroft updated the Commission about the drafted application for the US Preventive Services Task Force in order to recognize the collaborative care process as a preventative service. This would better assist in identifying people at risk and who may actively be suicidal. Dr. Beecroft mentioned how he is actively seeking out letters of support for this application. The nomination period is the first week in November.

6. New Business

- a. Suicide Prevention Line Item – Nancy Buyle
Nancy provided an update about adding suicide prevention as a line item on the state budget. Nancy and Carol Zuniga met earlier this month to initiate a discussion and talk about the processes that would need to be taken and who would need to be brought into future discussions in order to move forward with this action item. Nancy and Carol stated that defining and identifying the details of priority areas that need to be supported would be their first step. Nancy and Carol stated that updates on this action item will be provided to Commissioners at future meetings.

7. Other Updates

- a. Policy Update – Corbin Standley
Dr. Corbin Standley was unable to make September's meeting. His policy update will be forwarded to Commissioner's separately following this meeting.
- b. Other Updates
Dr. Brian Ahmedani shared with Commissioners that Henry Ford will be hosting the 5th Zero Suicide International Summit in Liverpool next summer. Brian also provided an update on MiMind, a Blue Cross initiative that is helping Henry Ford roll out suicide prevention screening and treatment in primary care and behavioral health settings all over the state of Michigan at participating provider organizations.

Cathy Frank shared an update that American Sign Language is now an available option in the 988 roll out.

11. Call to Order – Nancy Buyle

a. Roll Call

Nancy Buyle called the August 2023 Michigan Suicide Prevention Commission Meeting to order at 10:31 AM.

The roll was taken, and a quorum of members was not present.

12. Public Comment

Kyra Fisher provided public comment.

13. Review and Adopt Previous Meeting Minutes – All

A quorum was not present.

14. MDHHS Updates

a. Behavioral Health and Forensic Programs – Debra Pinalis

i. MiCAL/988 Implementation – Krista Hausermann

Krista Hausermann began her updates by referencing the 988 Year in Review Newsletter that was sent out to Commissioners in July, which detailed the first year of 988's implementation in Michigan. Krista confirmed that it covered key updates and achievements since 988 became active in Michigan on July 16th, 2023. She emphasized the importance of understanding the type of callers 988 was receiving. Not all callers were in crisis; many were in distress. However, the expectation was that the level of crisis among 988 callers would increase over time. This shift would ideally divert some callers who previously dialed 911 for behavioral health issues towards 988 and potentially reduce unnecessary emergency department visits.

Krista then shared some statistics from the first year of 988 in Michigan: over 69,000 calls from over 41,000 unique callers, with the average speed of answer of 18.8 seconds. She highlighted the need to expand the crisis service components, ensuring 988 had additional resources to refer callers to when they needed more than phone support.

Krista outlined one of the key goals for the upcoming year was to analyze situations where 911 was activated when it could have been mobile crisis instead of law enforcement, with the aim of increasing the use of mobile crisis in such scenarios. Krista also reported on the application for a SAMHSA grant for 988 operational funding. This funding would enable the development of 988 chat and text services, with plans to start in FY24 and fully roll out in FY25. She also mentioned MDHHS' work on tailoring 988 to specialty populations. They would collaborate with stakeholders, agencies, and individuals with lived experience focused on these populations, conducting research to develop care coordination processes, identify resources, and provide the necessary training for 988 staff. Krista stated that the listening session with LGBTQ+ youth has been concluded and the next listening session focusing on aging and elderly adults has been initiated. She also briefly touched on the 988 Awareness Media Campaign that will be launched for September's Suicide Prevention Month and the launch of the 988 Michigan Specific Toolkit that can be found at [988 MiCAL Partner Toolkit \(michigan.gov\)](https://www.michigan.gov/988MiCALPartnerToolkit).

Krista briefly touched on crisis stabilization units (CSUs), indicating progress in drafting certification rules, anticipated for public review in September. The pilot CSUs were operational and working on certification readiness.

b. Injury Violence Prevention Section

i. Preventing Suicide in Michigan Men (PRiSMM) – Kristen Smith

Dr. Kristen Smith provided a brief overview of the Preventing Suicide in Michigan Men (PRiSMM) program, highlighting its progress during the summer. She mentioned that they were concluding year three of their five-year award and working on an annual report, which would be available in the fall, including evaluation metrics and details.

Dr. Smith noted the 2nd anniversary of Man Therapy Michigan and its shift towards outreach to construction companies and trade schools in Michigan. She reported having 120 construction companies and 10 trade schools engaged in toolbox talks to change culture within these organizations. Man Therapy Michigan was also creating a heat map of their 600+ partners in Michigan to identify gaps.

Dr. Smith also reported that the Michigan Department of Corrections recently completed training for over 200 mental health professionals in assessing and managing suicide risk. Upcoming plans involved direct care training for ancillary staff to implement gatekeeper training. They were also establishing connections with organizations in other state corrections systems to collaborate on suicide prevention efforts.

Dr. Smith highlighted ongoing programs, such as Henry Ford Health System's quality improvement collaborative on zero suicide and telehealth symposium by Central Michigan University. She also mentioned their plans to focus on SafeTalk training in non-traditional communities in year four,

seeking suggestions for locations such as faith communities, dispensaries, and minority communities.

Dr. Smith also touched on counseling access to lethal means initiatives, the second tempos training, and the upcoming Suicide Prevention Month newsletter. Dr. Smith encouraged sharing event and training information for inclusion in the newsletter and asked that Commissioner's reach out to Megan Scott at megan.scottscottm27@michigan.gov by no later than Monday, August 21, 2023.

- ii. Transforming Youth Suicide Prevention (TYSP) - Lindsay DeCamp MDHHS Updates continued with Lindsay DeCamp providing updates on the Transforming Youth Suicide Prevention (TYSP) program. Lindsay DeCamp mentioned that they were in the final year of their five-year grant cycle and were already planning for the next application cycle, although the details of the new application were not yet available.

Lindsay then shared updates from the program partners at the University of Michigan. The University of Michigan served as the technical assistance lead for the network. They were collaborating with multiple healthcare systems across Michigan, including various locations within those systems. Their focus was on implementing the Zero Suicide framework, particularly tailored for the youth population. Lindsay mentioned that the U of M team had recently published a paper in the "Suicide and Life-Threatening Behavior" journal, and she would share it with the group via Rachel who will forward it onward.

Lindsay continued by discussing their work with the child welfare population through two ISP (Injury Surveillance Program) initiatives led by the University of Michigan. They had completed curriculum development comprising five modules, which would become mandatory for students pursuing the child welfare certificate in social work schools across Michigan. The rollout of this curriculum was expected in the winter semester of early 2024, aiming to equip social workers with suicide prevention training at an earlier stage. Lindsay then shared information about an upcoming presentation at the Loss Conference in Ohio. Michigan had been invited to present on the statewide implementation of LOSS (Local Outreach to Suicide Survivors) teams. Lindsay herself was asked to present from a statewide perspective, while one of their LOSS team leads would contribute to a panel discussion, shedding light on the county-level implementation. The presentation was scheduled for October.

In response to Kristen's mention of Suicide Prevention Month, Lindsay noted that they had submitted a proclamation related to the event. It was currently undergoing approval processes, with hopes of it being approved before September 1st. Upon approval, they planned to share it with their list serves and potentially issue a press release. Lindsay concluded her update by emphasizing the significant progress made in TYSP and the continued efforts to promote suicide prevention.

Lindsay and Kristen hold a community of practice meeting quarterly to provide a space for suicide prevention coalitions to come together and talk about things like challenges, successes, and share ideas. If you would like to participate in the meetings, please reach out to Lindsay or Dr. Smith to receive an invitation.

15. Subcommittee Workgroup Updates – Rachel Zaguskin

Rachel Zaguskin (MDHHS) reported that both the Death Scene Investigation Form Workgroup and the Licensure Workgroup Meetings will temporarily be paused during James Bell's leave. Workgroup meetings will resume in November.

16. Old Business

a. Statewide Summit Planning – Rachel Zaguskin

Rachel Zaguskin shared the drafted Summit Proposal with the Commissioners. Rachel outlined the goal of the Statewide Summit and its mission to highlight the work that Commissioners has done. Lindsay shared that MPHI is currently in the processes of looking at venues. Rachel had stated that the expected date for the Summit would be August of 2024, but no date has been solidified. The Statewide Summit Proposal will be shared out with the Commissioners after the meeting.

Nancy Buyle, Barb Smith, Carol Zuniga, and Kevin Fischer voiced their interest in being apart of the Commission's Statewide Summit Planning Committee.

Some initial feedback from Commissioners was to have at minimum three learning tracks, incorporating education and information for a wider audience, and John Joseph suggested that MSP be invited to the Summit.

Commissioners had asked to review the proposal and provide feedback, comments, and suggestions to Rachel Zaguskin by the end of the month so that she can compile everyone's feedback and Commissioners could revisit the discussion at September's meeting.

b. USPTF Nomination of Collaborative Care – Bill Beecroft

This agenda item has been moved September's meeting.

Nancy Buyle motioned to develop a proposal to request legislation for a line item in Michigan's state budget to fund suicide prevention. Deb Brinson mentioned the importance of working with the governor's office to get this line item into her budget that is currently being worked on. Carol and Nancy will provide more information on the development and progress of this agenda item at September's meeting.

17. New Business

18. Other Updates

a. Policy Update – Corbin Standley

Dr. Corbin Standley reported that there have been a few updates since Junes Commission meeting in terms of policy.

Dr. Corbin Standley began his update by highlighting recent legislative achievements related to firearms and suicide prevention. He mentioned the successful passage of two new bills, Public Acts 117 and 118, in July, which prohibit mental health professionals from engaging in conversion therapy with minors and outline disciplinary actions for violations.

Dr. Standley emphasized the significance of these bills and the years of effort invested in their advocacy. He briefly touched on the complexities surrounding conversion therapy for adults, citing issues related to consent. He credited Representatives Brabeck and Hoskins for introducing and successfully passing these bills into law in July.

Dr. Standley also provided updates on other pending legislation, including Senator Anthony's bill, which seeks equitable coverage for mental health by insurance companies, and bills related to school safety and mental health reauthorization. Additionally, he discussed a proposed amendment to the Save Our Students Act, aiming to add the "OK to say" program to student ID cards in public schools, further enhancing access to mental health resources.

On the federal level, Dr. Standley mentioned three bills of interest, notably the "Pursuing Equity in Mental Health Act," which seeks funding for research, outreach programs, and training to address disparities in mental health and suicide prevention. The other two bills that are both supported and being monitored are related to maternal mental health – Black Maternal Health Momnibus Act and Data to Save Moms Act.

Dr. Corbin Standley will continue to monitor the progress of these bills and continue advocating for mental health and suicide prevention initiatives.

b. Other Updates

Barb Smith shared that November 18th is Survivor Suicide Loss Day and on November 17th they will host some events for Survivor Day.

Kevin Fischer provided an updated on the success of the International CIT Conference in Detroit. Kevin also mentioned that NAMI Walk will take place on September 16th at Wayne State University in Detroit and on October 14th at Davenport University in Grand Rapids.

The Commission also discussed the most recent CDC report released that stated that suicide rates are currently at an all-time high.

Dr. Corbin Standley provided an update on behalf of the Michigan Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. They will be hosting a number of walks in September and October throughout the state of Michigan. Dr. Standley stated that one walk will be taking place on October 7th in Ferndale. The foundation will also be hosting some Survivor Day events in November that are free.

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MINUTES

Agenda Items:

1. Call to Order – Brian Ahmedani

a. Roll Call

Brian Ahmedani called the June 2023 Michigan Suicide Prevention Commission Meeting to order at 10:30 AM.

The roll was taken, and a quorum of members were present.

b. New Member Introduction

Members of the Suicide Prevention Commission introduced themselves to the public.

2. Public Comment

Janeisha Taylor provided public comment.

3. Review and Adopt Previous Meeting Minutes – All

Nancy Buyle motioned to approve the March 2023 and May 2023 Michigan Suicide Prevention Commission Meeting minutes. Adelle Cadieux seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

4. MDHHS Updates

a. Behavioral Health and Forensic Programs – Debra Pinals

Dr. Debra Pinals (MDHHS) reported there was an opening ceremony with Governor Whitmer for the new build of Caro Hospital. There is also a new state hospital coming to the Hawthorn Center campus. It will be a combined hospital of Walter Reuther and Hawthorn. DHHS is also working hard on community services to help build out the continuum of care with some policy development for psychiatric residential facilities.

There was a record high number of calls in the month of May with 7182 calls, with an answer rate at about 90% since December.

The department is also looking to identify ongoing funding for FY24 and needs continue to grow.

- i. MiCAL/988 Implementation – Krista Hausermann
Krista Hausermann (MDHHS) provided a snapshot of the distressed data from last month. There was an increase in texts and calls for the month of May. Krista’s report has been attached to the minutes.
- b. Injury Violence Prevention Section – Jennifer DeLaCruz/Pat Smith
No report.
 - i. Transforming Youth Suicide Prevention (TYSP) - Lindsay DeCamp
Lindsay DeCamp (MDHHS) reported this is the last year of this cohort of funding and the group is thinking ahead to the new application from SAMHSA which will secure another five years of the grant.
 - ii. Preventing Suicide in Michigan Men (PRiSMM) – Kristen Smith
Dr. Kristen Smith (MDHHS) reported the PRiSMM program is working very hard to put together trainings for community members. The next Tool for Evaluating the Media Portrayals of Suicide (TEMPOS) webinar will be held on June 21.

The department has been working with the Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC) to assist clinicians with assessing and managing suicide risk within the correction system. The next phase is to review policies and procedures tied to a recent Zero suicide workforce survey.

The department has been awarded a supplement to an existing grant to complete a syndromic surveillance project. The group is building a dashboard for surveillance syndromic data.

5. Subcommittee Workgroup Updates – Rachel Zaguskin

Rachel Zaguskin (MDHHS) reported the Death Scene Investigation Form Workgroup did meet this month. The group reviewed what was discussed with the meeting with Michigan State Police and compiled questions for follow up. The workgroup also wants to see a demonstration of the current system and how to better incorporate the updated form within their system.

The Licensure workgroup is looking to draft a letter to the legislature drafting what would be needed. The group will come back together and discuss who will be leading the drafting of that letter.

6. Presentation: 988/911 Collaboration in Michigan

Jill Smith (Common Ground) and Amanda Girard (MiCAL) provided an overview of the 988/911 Collaboration in Michigan. Also included in the presentation was Cynthia Homant (MSP) and Brianna Foley (MPHI). The group shared an overview of a 988 call and defined an emergency intervention. The presentation has been attached to the minutes.

7. Old Business

- a. Statewide Summit Planning – Nancy Buyle
Nancy Buyle reported there has been conversation with the School Safety Mental Health Commission to discuss scope of the summit. More information to follow.

8. New Business

- a. Suicide Prevention Commission Budget Overview – James Bell III
Dr. James Bell III (MDHHS) reported the Commission received \$250,000 from 2020 to 2024 to support the work and mission of the Commission. With that, we have spent some of this funding on personnel and support of travel. There is a remaining \$94,000 available to support the Commission's work, including meetings and the potential summit. The Commission needs to spend the funding by December 30, 2024.
- b. USPTF Nomination of Collaborative Care – Bill Beecroft
Dr. Bill Beecroft reported enough research has been completed to prepare a support letter, but the USPTF requires a nomination for new topic. A new report will be released after this year that will be in support of this effort. The goal is to have something in place with the department by October that would align with this letter.

Nancy Buyle motioned the Commission develop a proposal to request the legislature consider developing a funded department of suicide prevention. Dr. Cathy Frank seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

9. Other Updates

- a. Policy Update – Corbin Standley
Corbin Standley reported there has been a lot of great legislative success around firearm legislation during this session. Some of those include:
 - Passage of licensure and background checks, purchasing firearms and expanding to include more types of firearms;
 - Penalties for storing and leaving your firearm within access of a minor; and,
 - Sales and tax exemptions for firearm safety devices.
