Gov. Whitmer's Protect Michigan Commission, MDHHS, MTA and local churches to announce new partnership Wednesday that 'will make it easier than ever' to get COVID-19 shots in underserved Flint, Genesee County communities

PMC, local churches to deploy COVID 'Street Teams' in neighborhoods and high-traffic sites including MTA's Downtown Transfer Center; MTA's Rides to Wellness program also expanding free transportation to all Genesee County residents for vaccinations

Members of Flint's new COVID-19 "Street Team"

WHAT:

LIVE press conference where PMC, the Michigan Dept. of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) and MTA joined by Flint-area health and faith leaders will announce the kickoff of Flint's new grassroots "Street Team" vaccination outreach enrollment campaign that "will make it easier than ever" for Flintarea residents to get COVID-19 vaccinations. The PMC will work in partnership with neighborhood leaders and ministers to deploy COVID-19 "Street Teams" in various locations around the city. The locations in Flint and surrounding communities in Genesee County will be determined by Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) data which show where residents are least likely to be vaccinated. The enrollment campaign will run 4 hours per day, 5 days per week. The campaign will operate on a rolling schedule in neighborhoods and at high traffic areas such as Meijer, Walmart, downtown Flint, the Mass Transportation Authority's Downtown Transfer Center, Aldi, Sav-A-Lot, North Flint Plaza and Dollar General stores. PMC in partnership with local leaders have recruited, hired and trained the team of PMC COVID "Street Team" canvas workers who had to be at least 18 years old. The team's goal is to generate at least 50 enrollments per-person, per-day on the 5-day schedule at sites including clinics at Curative Labs on Saginaw Street, which is operating out of the Diplomat Pharmacy Building, Mott Community College, Our Lady of Guadalupe, Flint Northwestern, Grand Blanc High School, mobile clinics and local pharmacies.

In addition, MTA will announce an expanded partnership through its Rides to Wellness service that includes free door-to-door transportation to COVID-19 vaccination sites throughout Genesee County for all residents. MTA also will announce its plans to include expanded service to Mott Community College's new vaccination clinic.

In further support of the Flint-area's grassroots campaign, PMC will introduce **Christina Zerka**, who is studying biology at UM-Flint and is the founder of **Flint's Save Summer 2021 campaign**. Zerka has volunteered to serve as one of the state's new Protect Michigan Commission COVID-19 student ambassadors. The teens are urging their peers to get vaccinated and continue to practice preventative measures such as properly wearing masks, social distancing and frequent handwashing to reduce the spread of the virus until the vast majority of people have been vaccinated.

INFO:

Gov. Whitmer created the <u>Protect Michigan Commission</u> in January. The appointees represent a diverse array of industries, professions and backgrounds. Housed within MDHHS, they are charged with helping to ensure every Michigander has a plan to get vaccinated against COVID-19.
