Happy New Year! I hope that 2006 has been a good year for you so far. One brand new project plus an expanding one promise a bright year for the Parent Participation Program (PPP).

First, we are proud to implement Michigan's *Family-to-Family Health Education and Information* (F2F) grant. Our inaugural advisory meeting on Feb. 27 will bring together a broad array of agency partners. They include some entities we are collaborating with for the first time.

Secondly, we are part CSHCS's effort to expand the medical home concept in Michigan. A pilot project in the Grand Rapids area supports children with special needs transitioning from the pediatric to adult health care system. Key players include Dr. Wendy Burdo-Hartman, who also is leading a project on adolescent transition to adult providers. In the Detroit area, Dr. Tisa Johnson is head of medical home training in her practice and at Henry Ford Health System clinics.

Throughout the year, I look forward to keeping you informed of progress on those and other health issues of interest to families of children with special needs.♥

PPP Update

Statewide training sessions for parents of children with special needs start in spring. Topics include health and education, transition to adult mental health systems, mental health skills development and medical home.

The first one provides lifeskills training for families of children and youth with mental health disorders. It is set for March 29 in Taylor.

Four Health Resource Parent Trainings will cover public health care coverage, strategies for effective communication with health care providers, and educating youth on health care decision-making. All sessions are offered through Michigan's new *Family-to-Family Health Information and Education Center*. For a schedule, phone 1-800-359-3722.♥

CSHCS Update

A survey of CSHCS family satisfaction with Private Duty Nursing (PDN) shows a mix of positive and negative experiences. PDN is a Medicaid benefit that CSHCS had administered. As of Feb. 1, MDCH's Medical Services Administration oversees it.

Among positives, more than 90 percent of the 22 families who responded feel that their child's nurse maintains confidentiality, is willing to provide care the way the parent wants, and interacts acceptably with family members.

Among negatives, more than 70 percent of the 22 families who responded disagreed that there are always enough nurses available for them to use all PDN hours approved for the month. More than a third of respondents disagreed that new nurses are trained by an experienced nurse before providing care for their child, and that their nursing agency's supervisory staff is helpful in resolving a problem with their nurse.

CSHCS mailed the fourpage survey in October to the 230 CSHCS families receiving PDN. As of early December, 22 families in 14 Michigan counties returned it.♥ A letter about **changes in the Payment Agreement** (PA) **policy** went to every CSHCS family in December. Changes created payments for some families while considerably lowering them for others. Modified PAs are no longer offered. Also, new PAs do not refund families who pay more for CSHCS coverage than the program spends on the program member.

Noted CSHCS Director Kathleen A. Stiffler, "Michigan's economy forced us to make very difficult decisions. At each decision step, we reminded ourselves of the importance of keeping medical coverage available to all CSHCS clients. For many, CSHCS is their only option to pay for part or all of the services they need."♥
