

What is the Economic Burden of Alcohol-Attributable Hospitalizations among Michigan Residents?

An **alcohol-attributable hospitalization*** is any hospital stay that results from excessive alcohol consumption.

From October 2009 to September 2010, there were **11,909** alcohol-attributable hospitalizations among Michigan residents.

During this 12-month period, the estimated total charge of alcohol-attributable hospitalizations was **\$193,109,000**.

Below are charges listed by insurance type:

The median charge of an alcohol-attributable hospitalization was **\$10,760**.
