



# Zika in Michigan

## Are Michigan residents still at risk?



Mosquitoes able to transmit Zika have not been found in Michigan; *local transmission has not occurred.*

All cases of Zika in the state of Michigan have been **travel-related**. Within Michigan, residents cannot be infected with Zika by mosquitoes. While the Zika risk internationally is decreasing, Michigan residents can still acquire Zika through:



Traveling to an area with active Zika transmission



Sexual transmission with a partner who had a recent Zika infection

## What are Zika symptoms?

In most people, illness is mild. Common symptoms are:



Fever



Rash



Joint Pain



Red Eyes

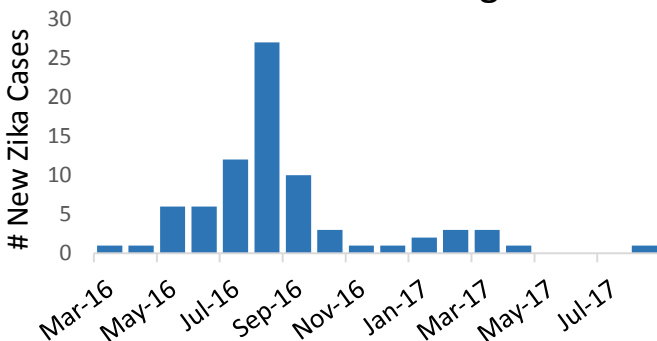

## How should Michigan residents respond to Zika?

If you may have been exposed to Zika and are experiencing Zika symptoms, **notify your doctor** to receive proper testing and counseling.

If you are traveling to an active Zika area, take appropriate precautions to **prevent mosquito bites**.



If you are pregnant or trying to become pregnant, **avoid traveling to active Zika regions**. If you or your partner recently traveled to a region with active Zika transmission, **notify your doctor as soon as possible**. Use condoms for the remainder of your pregnancy. If you experience Zika symptoms, get tested for Zika virus infection.
